Facts Concerning Gettysburg College

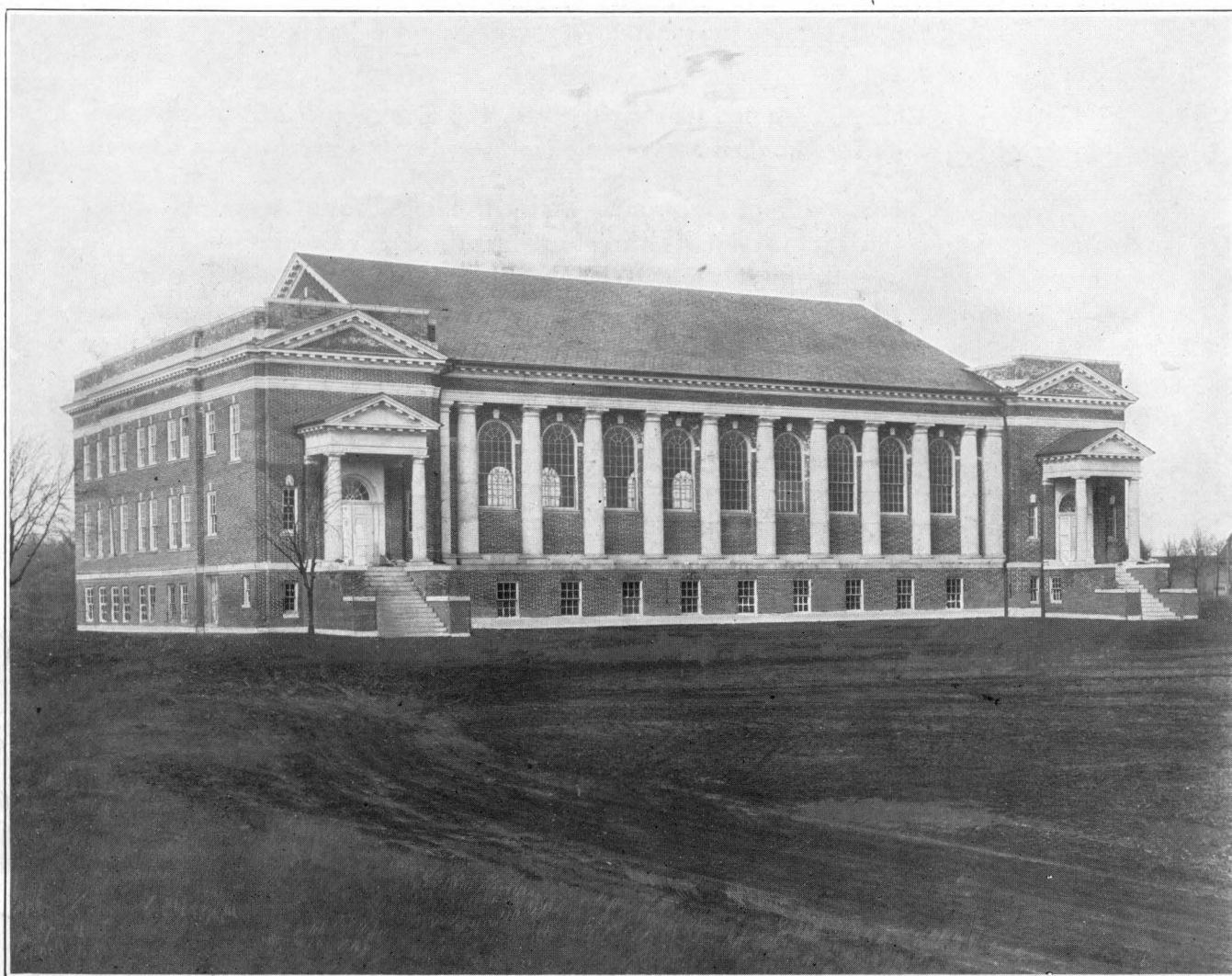
Gettysburg College obtained its charter from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania April 7, 1832. Its founding was closely connected with the Lutheran Church.

The College began without endowment and with limited equipment. However the progressive spirit of its presidents, directors, faculties, and alumni brought, thru enthusiastic endeavors, the establishment of a million dollar fund. Good administration has given Gettysburg the best of modern equipment. The most recent additions are a new science hall and a new gymnasium, both buildings having been dedicated to alumni renowned in their fields.

Gettysburg's scholastic attitude is one of quality. It has elected to prepare a student body of seven hundred men for high professional attainment. Constant adherence to this idea of scholarship has gained for the College a class A rating from The Association of American Universities and from the University of Illinois. It is also placed on a similar level by the Department of Public Instruction of Pennsylvania.

The campus is historically situated on the outskirts of the town, which is so well known for its part in the great Battle of the Civil War.

Campus and Buildings

The seven buildings, including dormitories, recitation hall, President's house, chapel and old gymnasium and also five fraternity houses, are scattered picturesquely about the spacious campus in such a way that they form a crude circle. The Y. M. C. A., Breidenbaugh Science Hall and Eddie Plank Memorial Gymnasium are situated outside of this circle.

The Eddie Plank Memorial Gymnasium has now been completed and stands as a tribute to one of the best known and best loved men who ever enrolled at Gettysburg College.

The Breidenbaugh Science Hall is very near completion. It is being fitted with the most approved appliances and will be well adapted for use in the teaching of the sciences.

Although not yet under construction a new library will be forthcoming as the result of an endowment from a prominent York minister.

Replacing the old Nixon Athletic Field we now have a \$20,000 Memorial Athletic Field, dedicated to those Gettysburg men who gave their lives for their country in the past war.

On the site of the old chemistry laboratory a memorial gateway is to be built in the near future which will add greatly to the beauty of the campus.

The Fraternity Situation at Gettysburg

At the present time, there are nine national fraternities on the campus. In 1924 there were four locals at Gettysburg College. In the same year, Theta Kappa Nu established a chapter, Phi Sigma Kappa the following year, and Tau Kappa Epsilon in 1926. At the present time Theta Phi Fraternity is petitioning Kappa Delta Rho Fraternity.

The attitude taken by the present administration and faculty toward Greek letter fraternities is very favorable. The faculty regulates and controls the number of dances to be held by each fraternity during the collegiate year. The college requires of each fraternity a high scholastic standing, and only freshmen with an average of C can be admitted to a Greek letter society.

The Inter-Fraternity Council is composed of a senior and junior member from each fraternity. The council meets monthly, and acts as a medium of exchange for ideas, and various inter-fraternity activities. Each year a migratory dance is held, at which time, every fraternity house is open and groups or couples migrate from one house to another. This shows the fraternity spirit that is prevalent on our campus. The inter-fraternity council also approves or disapproves petitions of a local fraternity to a national, and their consent must first be obtained before any procedure is undertaken.

A spirit of friendly rivalry exists among the fraternities that is very seldom seen on other campuses. A rivalry which respects and adheres to all council decrees.

History of Theta Phi Fraternity

The year 1909 saw the birth of a new fraternity at Gettysburg. The organizers were men well represented both in the various college activities, and in their respective classes. They were men who have a very good standing in both the business and professional world.

Theta Phi was founded to uphold the standards of the college, to promote fellowship, and for mutual improvement in manly development and social conduct.

It was not a hasty conclusion to which these men came, to combine themselves into a fraternity, but the result of four years of thought and consideration. Their observation at Gettysburg College, during these years, convinced them that another fraternity was needed. With this in view eight men were enlisted consisting of five seniors, one junior, one sophomore and one freshman.

The Fraternity has made rapid strides to success. Every year men were secured who were of a high caliber. It has not been the object of this fraternity to enlarge its membership with incompetent men but rather to strengthen both morally and intellectually. Only after a discussion as to his personality, Christian character and chastity, has a man been given any consideration at all.

The fraternity has had a continuous existence. During the world war, the fraternity thrived, even though many of its members enlisted, and failed to return.

The fraternity has always worked in perfect harmony with the inter-fraternity council and the faculty. Its position as a local fraternity has in no way interfered with the development of the fraternity.

Theta Phi Real Estate

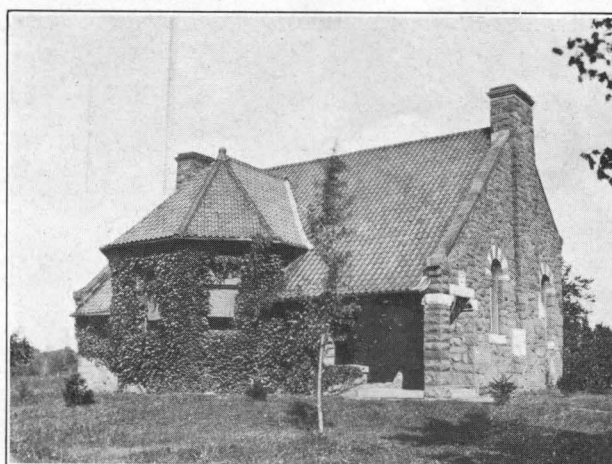
Theta Phi Fraternity own two homes. The one house at the present time is rented to the Gamma Phi Sorority. This house is located on the campus, and about one hundred and fifty feet from Gladfelter Hall, which contains the class rooms. It is very close to the new "gym", and opposite the Phi Kappa Psi house.

The present house is separated from the campus, by Lincoln Avenue, and directly opposite the house is the new gymnasium. The college infirmary is next door, and we have very easy access to Memorial Field which lies diagonally opposite.

The present house is being paid for by the active chapter, and alumni. It was purchased in 1925, and since that time the principal has diminished very noticeably.

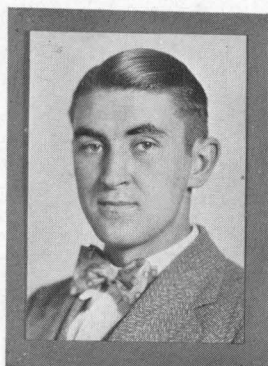


PRESENT HOUSE



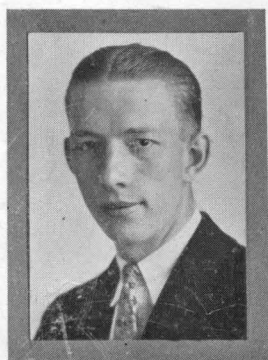
FORMER HOUSE
