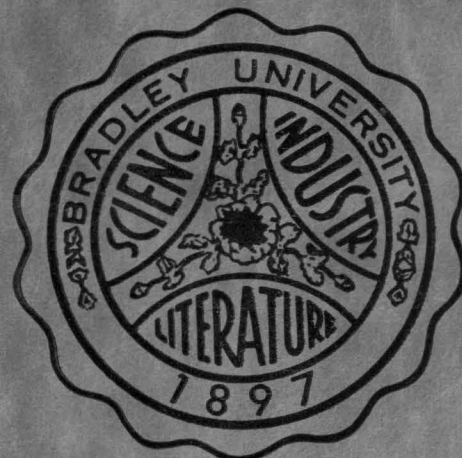

Know ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That Bradley Colony of Kappa Delta Rho, a voluntary association of students at Bradley University at Peoria, Illinois, hereinafter designated as the Local, does hereby petition the National Fraternity of Kappa Delta Rho, Inc., founded at Middlebury College in 1905 and incorporated under the Membership Corporation Law of New York State under date of February 10, 1954, hereinafter designated as the Corporation to become a Chapter of said Corporation with all rights and privileges pertaining thereto and subject to the Constitution, By-Laws and regulations of said Corporation.

It is mutually understood that this Petition requires affirmative action by the Corporation's Board of Directors and by two thirds of its Chapters before being accepted as provided in the Constitution and By-Laws. For that reason, this Petition shall remain in force for a period of three months or until June 1, 1966. If accepted, installation of the Chapter shall take place at a time and place to be mutually agreed upon.

Whereas it is the desire of the National Fraternity of Kappa Delta Rho, Inc., to work with the Administration of the various universities where its Chapters are located, it is requested that a copy of this Petition be filed with a representative of the Bradley University within twenty-four hours of the signing thereof.

A list of the present active members of the Local with their home address is attached hereto and made a part of this Petition.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF this Petition has been duly executed under date of March 1, 1966 in behalf of Bradley Colony of Kappa Delta Rho by its duly elected officers.


To The Men of Kappa Delta Rho:


To The Men of Kappa Delta Rho:

A HISTORY OF BRADLEY UNIVERSITY

January 12, 1963, marked an end as well as a beginning to an era in the history of Bradley University. On that historic date, Bradley Hall, the first building on the campus, was totally destroyed in a \$2,000,000 fire.

Now, just two years later, Bradley Hall has been reconstructed and Bradley University has rededicated its principles to an even greater emphasis on academic excellence. Reconstructed Bradley Hall has been another step in the University's extensive building program that includes 10 major new buildings in the past decade.

Bradley Polytechnic Institute was established in 1897 as a result of the generosity of Mrs. Lydia Moss Bradley, a woman of wealth and vision, who had as her advisors several of the most distinguished American educators of her time. The original Bradley gift to start the institution is said to be one of the largest single contributions that any educational institution had ever received up to that time. Bradley was founded in affiliation with the University of Chicago, and the principal campus buildings, Bradley Hall included, were modeled after those on the original Chicago campus.

The Bradley plan, which represented the best thinking of a group of the ablest and best known educators of the day, provided for the establishment of an institution which would pioneer in the harmonious combination of preparation "both for life and earning a living." Upon commencement of classes on October 4, 1897, Bradley was a four-year academy offering an additional two years of college work.

After watching with great interest and pride the first decade in the life of the institution, Mrs. Bradley died in 1908 at the age of ninety-one. She bequeathed her entire estate as endowment for Bradley, supplementing the earlier gifts from her large fortune for the original buildings and endowment.

Steady expansion of the institution continued in its curricula and enrollment. In 1920 the four-year college program was begun, leading to the A. B. and B. S. degrees, and the academy was discontinued. In 1946 Bradley was accredited as an institution granting the master's degree and became Bradley University.

Since that time Bradley University has been organized to include seven colleges: the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, the College of Applied Sciences, the College of Business Administration, the College of Engineering, the College of Education, Peoria College (for pre-professional and two-year terminal students), and the Evening College. The University also includes the Graduate School, the School of Art, the School of Speech Therapy, the School of International Studies and the Summer Session.

Medium sized, progressive, and non sectarian, Bradley is located in a quiet residential area of Peoria, Illinois--a city of over 100,000 midway between Chicago and St. Louis. Situated on a hilltop in the beautiful bluff district of Peoria, the University occupies 18 city blocks and boasts 30 major buildings, most of them modern, air-conditioned structures.

The total enrollment--including those taking courses on a part-time, evening, summer, correspondence, and extension basis--is approximately 7,000 students. However, in order to maintain the ideal curricular and extra-curricular facilities at Bradley, the full-time day enrollment

is limited to 4,000 students. The present student body includes students from 40 states and 21 foreign countries.

Extra curricular activities are also highly valued and carefully planned at Bradley to provide the student with a complete education that includes ample social contacts. ~~Fif~~teen national fraternities and seven sororities combine with more than 60 other undergraduate organizations to offer each student a variety of potential interests.

Famed for its athletic program which annually places its basketball and baseball teams among the best in the nation, Bradley participates in the powerful Missouri Valley Conference. Intra-mural and inter-fraternity competition in all sports are popular pastimes of most Bradley students.

To further the goal of the broadest and most complete education possible, a strong Air Force ROTC unit and a well-known lecture series are promoted by the University for the benefit of every member of the Bradley faculty.

Because of the large and varied curriculum, a student may choose a tight area of concentration or one that provides a broad general education. The University operates as a unit and its colleges, schools and departments serve one another in making individual courses available. The faculty-student ratio remains at 1:17, affording each student an *opportunity* to obtain the important counsel so necessary for success in today's business and professional worlds.

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The Fraternity System at Bradley University

The fraternity system started on Bradley's campus in 1916 with Lambda Chi Alpha. Since then the following fraternities have established themselves on campus:

THE INTERFRATERNITY COUNCIL OF BRADLEY UNIVERSITY

CONSTITUTION JUNE, 1965

Preamble

Realizing that in order to promote and perpetuate the best interests of Bradley University, and fraternity relations in general, and to inspire higher idealism and tolerance of mind and spirit, cooperation must be fundamental to all fraternity life, and fraternity influence should be potent in all University activities, we the amatory chapters of this council, do hereby ordain and establish this Constitution and By-Laws.

Article I Name

This organization shall be known as the Men's Interfraternity Council of Bradley University. Hereafter, in this Constitution and By-Laws, the Men's Interfraternity Council of Bradley University shall be referred to simply as the IFC.

Article II Purpose

The purpose of the IFC shall be to promote the interests of Bradley University; to promote a friendly spirit among social fraternities; to formulate rushing rules and other regulations relating to fraternity activities; to promote the welfare and interest of the fraternities associated in IFC and to constitute the supreme governing body of Interfraternity Relations.

Article III Powers

Section 1. The IFC shall have the power to enforce its own rules and regulations and shall be responsible to the governing bodies above it as outlined by the University organization plan.

Section 2. The infraction of this Constitution or these By-Laws may be punished in such a manner as may be prescribed by the By-Laws.

Article IV Members

The IFC shall be composed of those fraternities who are full members and those who have been voted partial membership.

Article V Organization

Section 1. The Officers of the IFC shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Sports Chairman. No one House may have more than one IFC officer at any one time.

Section 2. The officers shall be elected by a majority of the IFC by secret ballot. The President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Sports Chairman shall hold office for one year. No one person may be President of his house and President of the IFC simultaneously. The Treasurer's Office shall be designated as a two year term.

Sub-section 1. At the end of the Treasurer's first year in office, a vote of confidence shall be called for by the President.

a. If a majority vote is not obtained, an election may be called for to complete the remaining term of office.

Sub-section 2. Candidates for the office of IFC Treasurer should be prospective Sophomores or Juniors.

Section 3. The President of the IFC shall be elected at the end of the first semester period, and shall serve his term commencing from that time.

Sub-section 1. The President of the IFC will not be a voting member of the body, except in the case of a tie.

a. The President's fraternity shall have a representative to represent it on the IFC.

Sub-section 2. All other officers shall be elected at the first regular meeting following the election of the IFC President.

a. Nominations having been accepted from the floor at the last regular meeting preceding the scheduled election.

b. These officers shall also serve as representatives of their respective houses.

Section 4. All officers must attend all meetings of the IFC. Any officer who accumulates two unexcused absences shall automatically lose his office.

Section 5. Vacancies in any of the offices shall be filled in the second regular meeting following their vacancies. The same procedure is to be used to fill vacancies as is used to elect officers.

Section 6. The IFC shall be composed of only one representative of each house as appointed or elected from that house, and must be sophomore standing or above.

Sub-section 1. The Representatives must have achieved a 4.25 grade point average the previous semester.

Sub-section 2. All Representatives must attend all IFC meetings. Any Rep. who accumulates two unexcused absences per/semester shall automatically lose his position as Representative.

Sub-section 3. Substitute Representatives shall not be allowed to vote at meetings.

Sub-section 4. An IFC Representative cannot concurrently hold any of the following:

a. Any All-School Office (four Senate Offices)

- b. A Senior Board Position on SBA
- c. Editor or Photo Editor of the Anage or Scout
- d. Treasurer, Social Chairman, or House Manager of their respective houses.
- e. By 2/3 vote of the IFC these restrictions may be waived for individual cases.

Section 7. A Faculty advisor to the IFC shall be elected at the beginning of the first semester (or fall); nominations having been accepted from the floor at the last regular meeting preceding the election.

Section 8. The IFC Faculty Advisor's term of office shall be for one year. He may be re-elected to the position.

Section 9. The duties of the officers of the IFC shall be as described in Sturgis Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure unless otherwise specified in the Constitution or By-Laws.

Article VI Amendments

Section 1. This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the IFC by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the regular members provided that the proposed amendment be presented at least one regular meeting prior to said vote.

Section 2. The President of the IFC shall represent that body in the Student Senate. In the event that the President is concurrently holding a Senate seat, the President shall appoint from the Council a representative to the Student Senate.

Article VII Voting

Section 1. Each regular member of the IFC shall have only one vote. Substitute representatives shall be allowed at the meetings when it is found necessary.

Section 2. There will be no voting by proxy at the meetings.

Article VIII Meetings

Section 1. The regular meeting of the IFC shall take place once every two weeks beginning the first Monday that academic classes begin.

Section 2. Special meetings may be called by direction of the Faculty Adviser, The President of the IFC, or by a signed petition to the President of the IFC by a majority of the members. In the case of a special meeting, the secretary of the IFC shall be responsible for notifying all members, regular and partial, immediately.

Section 3. A fine of five dollars shall be levied against each fraternity not present before the office and committee reports of the regular meetings as de-

fined in Article VIII, Section 1. Fines shall be payable at the next regularly scheduled meeting. For every regular meeting that the fine is not paid by the offending fraternity an additional fine of one dollar shall be imposed.

Article IX
Executive Board

Section 1. The Executive Board of the IFC shall be made up of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Faculty Adviser. The Chairman of the Board will be the Vice-President.

Sub-section 1. The Executive Board shall be scheduled to meet on the weeks between regular IFC meetings.

Article X
President's Council

Section 1. The President of the IFC shall have the power to decide whether business shall come before the IFC or the President's Council.

Sub-section 1. The President of the IFC shall be a member of the President's Council.

Sub-section 2. The President of the IFC shall also be the Chairman of the President's Council.

Article XI
Quorum

A quorum for the transaction of business of the IFC shall consist of three-fourths ($3/4$) of the regular membership of the Council.

Article XII
Advisor

The Faculty Advisory shall be a voting member of the IFC and an ex-officio member of all IFC Committees.

BY-LAWS

Article I Order of Business

The order of business shall be as follows:

1. Calling the meeting to order
2. Calling the roll
3. Reading and approving the minutes of the previous meeting
4. Oral reading of the agenda
5. Reports of officers and committees
6. Unfinished business
7. New business
8. Depledging and Pledging reports
9. Announcements
10. Adjournment.

Article II Committees

Section 1. All committees shall be chaired by IFC Representatives as appointed by the IFC President upon application and according to preference when able. The Vice-President of the IFC shall be responsible for the coordination and reports of all committees.

Sub-section 1. It shall be the chairman's duty to call meetings of representatives of all houses or a committee chosen by him in conjunction with the purpose of the committee.

Sub-section 2. The chairman shall be required to make regular reports to the IFC, both oral and at least two written.

a. All IFC committee action and decisions must be approved by the IFC.

Sub-section 3. All standing committees shall be required to meet once a week unless otherwise specified by the Vice-President of the IFC upon a written request for exception.

Sub-section 4. The standing committees of the IFC shall include the following:

 2. Pledge
 3. Scholarship
 4. Rush
 5. Political
 6. Public Relations
 7. Financial
 8. Sports Council
 9. Trophies
 10. IFC Court
 11. Rules and Constitution
 12. IFC-Pan Hal. Committee
 13. Crack Week
 14. Evaluation

b. And/or any other committees or functions dictated by necessity.

Article III Membership

Procedure for attaining probationary and regular membership.

Section 1. Policy -- Those groups who wish to share in the responsibilities and privileges of membership in the Interfraternity Council shall conform to the procedures outlined in this By-Law.

Sub-section 1. Any group of individuals desiring membership in the IFC must first petition for membership in the IFC.

Section 2. Probationary Membership -- A group desiring probationary membership shall submit a letter of recommendation from the President's Council along with a letter to the Interfraternity Council requesting probationary membership attaching a roster of their officers and members, a brief statement of history, purposes and intentions of the group (whether the organization will be a local fraternity or a colony of a national fraternity), and a copy of the organization's Constitution and By-Laws. Along with these stipulations a group must fulfill the following requirements, before it petitions for probationary membership in the IFC.

Sub-section 1. The group must be classified as a special interest group for at least two full semesters.

Sub-section 2. A progress report must be submitted every month for the two semesters prior to petitioning for probationary status.

Sub-section 3. The group must maintain a 4.25 over-all grade point average for the two semesters prior to the petitioning.

Sub-section 4. A petitioning group must have a minimum membership of fifteen (15), ten (10) of which must be active members.

On receiving the request of the petitioning group, the Interfraternity Council shall hear the recommendation of the President's Council and shall then, in closed session of the voting representatives only, decide to reject or approve the petition. If approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote, and the University, the Interfraternity Council shall admit the new organization to all the privileges and obligations of Interfraternity membership except voting and holding major offices.

Sub-section 1. The President's Council shall assume the position of an advisory council to the Interfraternity Council.

Sub-section 2. Any group recognized by a 2/3 vote of the Interfraternity Council must represent themselves at all IFC meetings and shall be considered probationary members.

Sub-section 3. All probationary members are regulated by the IFC Constitution and they may participate in events of the IFC as allowed by the regular members of the IFC.

b. And/or any other committees or functions dictated by necessity.

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Sub-section 3. All probationary members are regulated by the IFC Constitution and they may participate in events of the IFC as allowed by the regular members of the IFC.

Sub-section 4. A partial member must remain in this status 18 weeks before they may become eligible for regular member status.

Sub-section 5. Probationary membership may be discontinued if, after 4 semesters, the petitioning group has not achieved regular membership.

Section 3. Regular Membership -- To achieve regular membership, a probationary group must conform to the Constitution, By-Laws, and Standing Rules of the Inter-Fraternity Council and fulfill the following requirements:

Sub-section 1. Submit Progress Reports in form, frequency and content. Factors included in each report should be:

- a. The number of members, active and pledge;
- b. The adequacy of the group's finances;
- c. Progress being made toward providing a permanent meeting place and /or provision of living accommodations for members.

Sub-section 2. A colony, or local fraternity, must have a minimum membership of 25 men, of which more than half must be actives.

Sub-section 3. Maintain a group scholastic standing above the All-Men's average for the previous semester.

Sub-section 4. Submit copies of any published pledge manual, news bulletin, or magazine of the organization.

Sub-section 5. Submit semesterly financial statements including a statement of assets and liabilities showing assets of \$1,500.00 or more; a statement of income and expenses; and whether residential accommodations are being offered.

Sub-section 6. Submit a letter or letters signed by alumni or adult sponsors who endorse the group and give assurance of their continuing interest, guidance, and support to the group.

Sub-section 7. Have a record of satisfactory attendance at meetings of the Council.

Sub-section 8. Submit a letter, in the case of a Colony of the National Fraternity, from the national president or executive secretary thereof, stating the attitude of the national officer toward expansion at Bradley University, toward the petitioning group, and giving assurance that no chapter will be installed nor any charter granted until the group has achieved membership in the IFC and has the approval of the University.

Sub-section 9. The IFC, upon considering an organization, may question such things as fraternal ideas, pledging programs, and other matters of this nature.

Sub-section 10. Submit a letter from the Dean of Students Office stating that admission to regular membership has the approval of the University.

Sub-section 11. The IFC is also free to make any restrictions or exceptions in regards to sub-sections if it feels it will be necessary in accepting an organization for regular membership in the Council by a 3/4 vote.

When the requirements outlined are fulfilled to the satisfaction of the Interfraternity Council as indicated by a three-fourths (3/4) vote of the total membership thereof, the probationary group will be admitted to regular membership.

Article IV Rushing

Section 1. An assistant rush chairman shall be elected at the second regular meeting in the months of October and March, respectively for the Spring and Fall rush. He shall serve as Chairman for the semester following his election as assistant. Nominations for this office shall be accepted at the regular meeting prior to the election and at the constituted election meeting.

Section 2. The dates on which fall rushing will commence and end shall be set by the IFC before the completion of the Spring semester. Dates for the second semester rush will be established during the Fall semester.

Section 3. Any full-time male Bradley University student, carrying 12 hours of academic study, or any incoming student in good standing (4 point previous semester) with the University may be considered a prospective rushee.

Sub-section 1. A Bradley University student in the second semester of his freshman year, or upper classman standing, must have a 4 point grade average his previous semester in order to pledge an IFC fraternity.

Section 4. The IFC rush committee shall make copies of the rush rules available for all rushees and fraternity men.

Section 5. Infractions of the rushing rules shall be handled in the following manner: The fraternity involved shall be prosecuted under Article XIII of the By-Laws; the rushee shall be ineligible to pledge any fraternity on the B.U. campus for one semester following such infraction.

Section 6. Any house with less than fifty (50) members, actives and pledges, may have "open" rushing privileges.

Article V Pledging

Section 1. Fraternity invitations to pledge must be extended in writing to the rushee.

Section 2. There shall be no summer pledging.

Section 3. No man shall be considered pledged to a fraternity, nor may he wear a fraternity pledge pin until he has signed the pledge registration roster at the designated time during rush.

Section 4. A pledge registration fee of two dollars (\$2.00) shall be levied on each member fraternity for each pledge, this amount to be collected by the IFC Treasurer. It shall be the responsibility of each fraternity to collect said amount from the pledge.

Section 5. A pledge who is depledged or voluntarily depledges is not eligible to repledge another fraternity until the following semester.

Section 6. In the event a pledge is dropped from the fraternity or breaks his pledgeship voluntarily, the fraternity must report this at the next regularly scheduled IFC meeting. The President shall then notify all fraternities of the action.

Section 7. All Pledges other than upperclassmen must serve as pledges until the end of the semester of which they pledged.

Section 8. Any upperclassmen may pledge only 9 weeks.

Article VI Initiation

Section 1. No upperclassmen shall be initiated into a B.U. fraternity unless nine weeks have transpired between his registration as a pledge and his initiation.

Section 2. An upperclassman is any student of at least sophomore standing in the University.

Section 3. No man shall be initiated into a B.U. fraternity unless he has attained at least a 4.00 grade point or the equivalent, and has passed 12 hours the immediate preceding semester.

Section 4. The grades of all initiates must be cleared through the Dean of Student's office prior to the beginning of the initiation.

Section 5. Upon initiation of new members, fraternities shall submit a report of such action and the names of the men initiated to the IFC at the next regular meeting following the initiation.

Article VII Interfraternity Athletics

Section 1. The Interfraternity athletics shall be governed by the IFC Sports Council and the IFC Sports Council Constitution.

Section 2. Interpretation of this Constitution and all decisions of the IFC Sports Council shall be appellate to the IFC.

Section 3. The Sports director shall be elected and shall receive \$25.00.

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Article XIII
Amendments

These By-Laws shall be amended by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Council (regular members) providing that the proposed amendment(s) be presented at any regular or special meeting prior to said vote.

Article XIII
IFC Supreme Court

Section 1. Purpose -- It shall be the purpose of the Interfraternity Supreme Court to hear and decide all cases which come under its jurisdiction.

Section 2. Powers -- The Interfraternity Supreme Court shall have the right and power to:

Sub-section 1. Decide all cases concerning IFC member fraternities who have allegedly violated any University policy or regulation.

Sub-section 2. Decide all cases concerning fraternity violations of IFC rules and regulations.

Section 3. Decisions -- All decisions concerning violations of University or IFC rules and regulations are subject to appeal to the Student Supreme Court or the Dean of Students.

Section 4. Membership -- The composition of the Interfraternity Supreme Court shall include the following:

Sub-section 1. The Interfraternity Supreme Court shall be composed of five undergraduate justices. They shall hold this office for a period of one year.

Sub-section 2. All justices shall have a minimum grade point of 4.0 or above and shall be of at least junior standing.

Sub-section 3. All candidates for membership shall be reviewed by a committee consisting of the Executive Council of the IFC and the faculty adviser of the IFC. This committee shall submit a list of recommendations to the President of the IFC who shall make the appointments, subject to approval of the IFC.

Section 5. Organization

Sub-section 1. No member fraternity shall have more than one individual serving as a justice or attorney general.

Sub-section 2. One of the members of the Interfraternity Supreme Court shall be appointed Chief Justice by the President of the IFC. It shall be the duty of the Chief Justice to preside at all sessions of the court.

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Sub-section 3. The Chief Justice shall appoint an undergraduate to act as Recorder. It shall be his duty to keep a careful record of the proceedings of the Interfraternity Supreme Court. After a case has been completed, he shall transfer the minutes to a bound record book.

Sub-section 4. There shall be an Attorney General of the Court who shall meet all the requirements of a justice. The Attorney General shall be appointed by the IFC President.

Section 6. Vacancies -- All vacancies which might arise shall be filled by appointment by the President of the IFC with the approval of the IFC.

Section 7. Meetings -- The Interfraternity Supreme Court shall meet when requested by the Chief Justice or by a request of 2/3 of the members of the IFC.

Section 8. Quorum -- When the Interfraternity Supreme Court is hearing and discussing cases before them, all justices must be present.

Article XIV Special Interest Groups

Policy of the IFC towards Special Interest Groups that align themselves with the idea of social fraternities, that are not attempting to become probationary members in the IFC.

Section 1. It shall be the purpose of this amendment to maintain respect for the meaning of the IFC.

Sub-section 1. The member fraternities of the IFC do hereby not recognize any special interest group that alliges herself with the ideans of a social fraternity, and that is not attempting to become a probationary member of the Interfraternity Council.

Sub-section 2. Any member of the IFC shall be fined heavily for recognizing a special interest group of this nature in any form of Athletic or Social activity.

Sub-section 3. It shall be understood that if a special interest group that alliges itself with the idea of a social fraternity (and is not recognized by the IFC) is paired or grouped with an IFC fraternity within an IFC classification while participating in activities (i.e., Homecoming Stunt Show, Homecoming House Dec, Campus Carnival) which the IFC would feel is a cause for loss of respect for the IFC, the membership of the IFC shall consider this action, and may deem it grounds to completaly withdraw from that activity.

Article XV Parliamentary Authority

Stungs Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure shall govern IN ALL CASES NOT GOVERNED BY THE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

HISTORY
of
BRADLEY COLONY
of
KAPPA DELTA RHO

Kappa Delta Rho of Bradley University started its climb to a solid organization in September, 1962. Steve Schilson, an active member of Kappa Delta Rho National Fraternity, transferred from the University of Illinois and founded the group. It is interesting to note that many of the early members were all residents of the Newman Club. This is one of the main reason for the harmony of the group because many of the men were living and working together before Kappa Delta Rho came to Bradley.

In November, 1962 a president, vice president, secretary and treasure were elected, and this group started meeting regularly in the Student Center. The size of our group at first fluctuated, but has risen steadily since September, 1963 and now stands at twenty.

December 15, 1962 we were visited by the Vice President and a Board Member from the National Fraternity. At that meeting our problems and plans were discussed and ideas were presented for our success. A petition was forwarded to the National, in September, 1963 and on November 24, 1963 we became the Bradley Colony of Kappa Delta Rho.

In January, 1964 we moved to our chapter house at 1501 Fredonia Avenue. With the signing of a three year lease, we have established a permanent residence on Campus.

Upon securing our chapter house, our plans were shifted into high gear. But most important, we established rules that

enabled us to live with one another in harmony.

Some of the major events concerning our social life have now become traditions of the house. Each fall we have our annual pledge dance to which men from all the Midwestern Chapters receive invitations. In the winter is our Winter Ball or formal and Spring Weekend is our major spring social event. There are also various minor events such as exchanges, record dances, hayrides, bowling parties, etc. We strive for the program that blends the proper amount of social and scholastic.

The history of our rush is a story of success in itself when you consider the competition. The men we pledge each semester prove to be outstanding. Their qualities are expressed in the grades they receive and the desire and work they show towards the house. Since we have held rush in the house, we have pledged 33 men. This is a remarkable number when you take into consideration the fact that our competitors are searching for the quality of men that we have pledged.

Most of the success of our pledges lie in the fact that we use a mature pledge program. Each pledge is treated as a college man and not a high school kid. From the first day of pledging we place trust and honor in their hands, and we expect the same in return. Thus far we have yet to be disappointed. The Dean of Men himself has often

remarked on the high caliber of our pledge program.

Scholastically, we have a history that we can be more than proud of. Last semester our pledges were fifth out of fifteen fraternities while the actives were twelfth. This, however, was the lowest the actives have ever been. The two semesters before the last, the actives were first among the fraternities. Our overall house average has always been in the top five and we were second as a house two semesters ago. This plus the fact that we have never been charged with a violation of any regulation concerning social functions is a good reason that we are in high standing with the University.

At the time of this writing, we are a junior member of the I.F.C. This means that we participate in all activities yet do not have a vote. This does not mean that we do not work with and for the I.F.C. This semester one of the brothers is Scholastic Chairman for the I.F.C., and many other brothers are working on various committees. There is little doubt in our minds that by next semester we will be full members in the I.F.C.

CONSTITUTION

of Gamma Alpha Chapter of Kappa Delta Rho, Inc.

ARTICLE I - NAME

Section 1. The name of this organization shall be Gamma Alpha Chapter of Kappa Delta Rho, Inc.

Article II - PURPOSES

Section 1. The primary purposes of the Chapter shall be the promotion of good fellowship among its members and the advancement of truth, justice and virtue as exemplified by our Latin motto: "Honor Super Omnia."

Section 2. It shall be the policy of the Chapter to cooperate with the educational and administrative authorities of Bradley University and with other fraternities organized for purposes similar to its own in all movements tending to further the purposes and ideals hereinbefore set forth.

Article III - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership of the Chapter shall be divided into three classes: undergraduate, graduate, and honorary.

Section 2. The undergraduate membership of the Chapter shall consist of those male students of high moral character who are duly enrolled candidates for the Bachelor's degree at Bradley University. Those men designated as pledges are probationary members of the Chapter.

Section 3. Graduate members of the Chapter shall be former undergraduate members, both graduated and non-graduated.

Section 4. The honorary membership shall consist of outstanding faculty members or other men of good repute elected by the undergraduate members of the Chapter with the approval of the National Directors, and initiated into honorary membership as provided in Article III, Section 10, of the National Constitution. An honorary member may be elected at any authorized meeting of the undergraduate members by means of a secret ballot in which there is not more than one negative vote cast. Honorary members shall not vote or hold office in the Chapter except in an advisory capacity.

Section 5. A member of another chapter who enters Bradley University may transfer his membership to the Chapter if, on a balloting taken at an authorized meeting of the Chapter, not more than one negative vote is cast.

Section 6. Initiation of a member into the Fraternity shall be accomplished only if, at a balloting upon his name at an authorized meeting of undergraduate members of the Chapter, there be not more than one negative vote cast.

Section 7. To be eligible for initiation into the Fraternity, a pledge shall have satisfactorily completed the various pledge requirements, and shall have attained, for the semester before initiation, a scholastic average of 4.0.

Section 8. Initiation into the Fraternity shall be in all cases in accordance with the ritual most recently authorized by the National Convention. All new members shall agree in writing at the time of initiation to abide by the Laws of the Fraternity.

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Article IV - SUSPENSIONS AND EXPULSIONS

Section 1. A member who disregards his obligation to the Chapter may be suspended from the Chapter. Suspension requires the affirmative vote of three-quarters of all members of the Chapter, assembled at a regular Chapter meeting. Notification of such action will be submitted immediately to the National President, the Dean of Men, and the member's parents.

Section 2. Continued flagrant acts which violate the high ideals of Kappa Delta Rho will be cause for a member to be suspended or expelled from the Fraternity. The National President shall be notified by the Chapter of a member whose behavior would appear to warrant such drastic action. Upon receipt of an affirmative reply from the National President, a three-quarters vote of all members of the Chapter at a regular Chapter meeting will effect such action as is authorized by the President. Notification of the action taken will be submitted immediately to the National President. Notification of affirmative action will also be submitted to the Dean of Men and to the member's parents.

ARTICLE V - AMENDMENTS

Section 1. This Constitution may be amended at any regular Chapter meeting by a three-fourths vote of the members present. The proposed amendment shall be moved at the next previous regular Chapter meeting, and shall be posted on the Chapter bulletin board in the interim.

Section 2. All individual members of the Chapter shall be governed by the provisions of this Constitution, and by By-Laws as are adopted by the Chapter, as well as by the Constitution and By-Laws of the National Fraternity of Kappa Delta Rho, Inc.

BY-LAWS
of Gamma Alpha Chapter of Kappa Delta Rho, Inc.

BY-LAW I - OFFICERS AND DUTIES

Section 1. The Consul shall be the presiding officer. He shall have completed his second year of undergraduate work. He shall promote the general welfare of the Chapter. He shall appoint committees not otherwise provided for. He shall call such meetings as will ensure the proper functioning of the Chapter. He shall be responsible for the execution of the policies and procedures determined by the National Chapter for the good of the Fraternity.

Section 2. The Senior Tribune shall perform the duties of the Consul in his absence or incapacity. He shall have completed his second year of undergraduate work. He shall be an ex-officio member of all committees, and shall be responsible for their proper functioning. He shall be the Rush Chairman.

Section 3. The Junior Tribune shall perform the duties of the Senior Tribune in his absence or incapacity. He shall be the Pledge Trainer, and Chairman of the Pledge Training Committee.

Section 4. The Praetor shall be the secretary. He shall maintain the Chapter roll. He shall record in permanent fashion the minutes of all regular and special meetings. He shall handle all official correspondence of the Chapter, except as noted in By-Law I, Section 5.

Section 5. The Propaetor shall assist the National Chapter in the publication of all periodicals that the Fraternity may issue. He shall publish a Chapter newspaper for the graduate members at least once a semester. He shall be responsible for the public relations of the Chapter. He shall correspond with graduate members.

Section 6. The Quaestor shall be the treasurer. He shall collect dues and pay all bills approved by the Executive Committee. He shall keep an accurate record of all money received and disbursed. He shall prepare an annual budget on a semester basis, to be approved by the Chapter, and shall make monthly financial reports. He shall select several assistants from whom will be selected his successor by virtue of the assistant's demonstrated ability in the job.

Section 7. The Pontifex shall be the Chaplain and shall be in charge of the manners and morals of the Chapter.

Section 8. The Centurion shall be the door keeper at Chapter meetings. He shall answer to the presence or absence of all members at roll call. He shall see that the Chapter house is secured properly each night and at vacations, and that all lights are extinguished.

Section 9. The Custodian shall be responsible for the maintenance of the Chapter House and grounds.

Section 10. The Steward shall be responsible for the kitchen and dining facilities in the Chapter. He shall see that meals are properly prepared and served. He shall be responsible for those employees or members necessary for carrying out these duties.

Section 11. The Scholarship Chairman shall maintain records of members and pledges' grades. He shall maintain quiet hours in the Chapter house. He shall arrange tutoring, study tables, and all conceivable means to achieve the minimum scholastic goal of being above the all-men's average. He shall maintain examination files.

Section 12. The Expansion Secretary shall maintain correspondence with the National Expansion Director in the interest of Fraternity development and expansion.

Section 13. The Senators shall be graduate or honorary members, elected by the Chapter. They shall advise the Chapter when so requested, or when they desire. They will be three in number.

Section 14. The Social Chairman shall be responsible for an organized social program designed for the relaxation of the members from the rigors of academic life, as well as for instruction in acceptable social behavior.

BY-LAW II - COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Consul, the Senior Tribune, the Junior Tribune, the Quaestor, and the Custodian. The Steward shall be an ex-officio member. They shall oversee the affairs of the Chapter, and shall be responsible for the continued growth and progress of the Chapter.

Section 2. The Advisory Committee shall consist of two elected undergraduate members who shall be completing three years of study. They shall look after the conduct of the individual members, and admonish them publicly or privately when it is deemed advisable.

Section 3. The Rush Committee shall consist of the Senior Tribune, Chairman, and three other members elected by the Chapter. They shall be responsible for all matters pertaining to rush.

Section 4. The Pledge Training Committee shall consist of the Junior Tribune, Chairman, and three other members elected by the Chapter. They shall be responsible for the preparation of all pledges for initiation into the Fraternity, in accordance with those regulations established by the National Chapter and the Chapter.

Section 5. The Budget Committee shall consist of the Quaestor, the retiring Quaestor, the Custodian, and the Steward. It shall meet at the end of the semester to draw up the budget for the following period.

Section 6. The Social Committee shall consist of the Social Chairman and two members. It shall be responsible for an organized, well-rounded social program.

Section 7. The Consul may appoint such committees as may be necessary for the proper management of the Chapter.

BY-LAW III - FINANCES

Section 1. There shall be a National initiation fee established by vote of the National Convention. There may be a Chapter initiation fee in addition to the National fee. These fees shall be paid by the neophyte prior to the initiation ceremony.

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Section 2. The Quaestor shall collect such monies, established by a three-fourths vote of the undergraduate members, as may be necessary for the proper operation of the Chapter. The Quaestor will issue a bill to each member on the first day of each month, September through May. Bills are due and payable on or before the tenth of each month.

Section 3. Financial stability is possible only if the Chapter house is filled to capacity. No man will live outside the house, unless he should choose to pay the room portion of his house bill. Members wishing to live out of the house must petition the Chapter and receive a three-fourths vote on said petition at a regular Chapter meeting.

Section 4. Any member or pledge incapable of paying a bill by the due date must report such fact to the Executive Committee, and in writing declare his arrangements for payment. Failure to do so will make the member liable under Article IV, Section 1, of the Chapter Constitution.

Section 5. The Quaestor shall maintain a Chapter Loan Fund for any member who cannot pay all of his monthly bill. Each member must contribute a stipulated amount to the fund. By the end of each month the Quaestor shall have secured the signature of each delinquent member on an I. O. U. for the amount of the debt. There shall be no accounts receivable at the end of a month.

Section 6. There shall be a 5% penalty assessed for late payment of the house bill.

BY - LAW IV - ELECTIONS

Section 1. All officers shall be elected at the second regular meeting in February and shall serve for one year.

Section 2. A slate of nominations shall be presented to the Chapter at the next previous regular meeting to the election date. The floor will be open for nominations for each office at this time, as well as immediately prior to the voting for each office.

Section 3. The nominee receiving a majority of the votes cast by secret ballot shall be the new officer. If all nominees for an office fail to receive a majority of those present and voting, those two with the greatest number of votes will be voted upon again.

Section 4. Officers shall be elected in the following order: Consul, Senior Tribune, Junior Tribune, Quaestor, Custodian, Steward, Praetor, Propraetor, Pontifex, Centurion, Scholarship Chairman, Social Chairman, and Expansion Chairman.

Section 5. At the third regular meeting in February, the elections shall be held for the Senators, the Advisory Committee, the Rushing Committee, the Pledging Committee, and the Social Committee.

Section 6. An officer may be impeached by a three-fourths vote of all members of the Chapter at a regular meeting.

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BY - LAW V - MEETINGS

Section 1. In accordance with National By-Law I, Section 18, Regular Chapter meetings shall be held at least once in two weeks while the university is in session.

Section 2. The first regular Chapter meeting of each month shall be a Formal Meeting. The Formal Meeting shall be opened in accordance with the opening order prescribed in the ritual manual.

Section 3. All meetings shall be governed in accordance with the rules of parliamentary procedure as set forth in "Robert's Rules of Order."

BY - LAW VI - GENERAL

Section 1. The Chapter is authorized by the National Directors to pass such House Rules and supplementary motions for the proper and necessary functioning of the Chapter which are not in conflict with the National Constitution and By-Laws, or and other pertinent regulations.

BY - LAW VII - AMENDMENTS

Section 1. These By-Laws may be ammended by a three-fourths vote of the members at any regular Chapter meeting. The proposed amendment shall be moved at the next previous regular meeting, and shall be posted on the Chapter bulletin board in the interim.

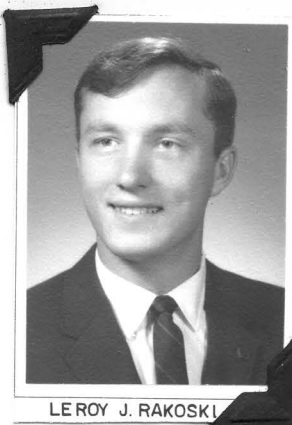

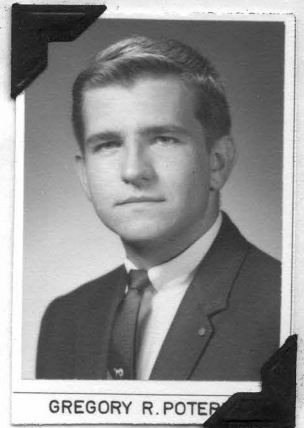

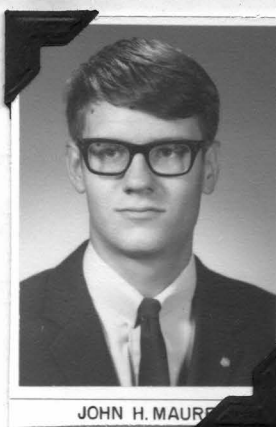
