COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY HISTORY

Columbia College offers a rigorous and coherent curriculum to a small number of men within a major university. College students may participate in courses in the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, the School of Law, the College of Physicians and Surgeons, the School of the Arts, the Graduate School of Architecture and Planning, and other divisions of the University; they also sometimes act in off-Broadway plays, offer administrative help to welfare candidates, or hold positions in New York publicity firms. But a career in Columbia College centers on the work in general education and in the academic department of one's major.

This acadmeic program has been evolving for a long time. In 1754, King George II granted a charter to a group of New York citizens to found King's College, dedicated to instruction in "the Learned Languages and the Liberal Arts and Sciences." In its early days, first in a room at Trinity Church and then in its own building, the College taught such students as Alexander Hamilton, John Jay, Robert Livingston, and Gouverneur Morris. After the Revolution, kings became unfashionable, and New York State issued the College a new charter with a more patriotic name - Columbia. In 1857, Columbia College followed the growing New York City to 49th Street and Madison Avenue, and during its forty years at that site added to its body the Schools of Law, Engineering, Architecture, and the Graduate Faculties. 1897, these schools moved to a new site on Morningside Heights in upper Manhattan. The leading architects of the day, McKim, Mead, and White, designed an open central enclave six blocks long, with a sweep of steps at the center leading up to a majestic domed and colonnaded library. It remains one of the best urban spaces in New York.

COLONY HISTORY TO DATE

Starting with an idea and a great deal of hard work and dedication, the Columbia University colony of Kappa Delta Rho was officially recognized at a colonization ceremony held September 26, 1981 in Ferris Booth Hall. The members of Rho chapter from Lafayette (sponsors) conducted the ceremony. Others in attendance included Richard Nolan, executive secretary, and members of Beta Alpha colony from C.W.Post.

Following the proceedings, a party was held to celebrate the occasion. To complete the evening, several members and guests "tapered-off" at Trader Vic's, a favorite Columbia Colony watering hole.

The colony held its first official meeting on April 14, 1981. Officers and founders, Wayne Cowan, president; Ed Lijo, 1st vice president; Mark Berti, 2nd vice president; Carl Franzetti, secretary, and Mike Statti, treasurer, were elected April 15th. In the six short months since its inception the colony has successfully enriched the lives of its members and enhanced the social atmosphere at C.U.

Several parties, brunches and get-togethers were held so members sould spend some time together and discuss plans for the fall. K.D.R. enjoyed its initial success in intermurals by advancing to the semifinal round of the soccer tournament.

During the past fall semester, several parties were held to better acquaint the student body with our fraternity. Our pledges were introduced at a semi-formal cocktail hour held in the suite of two of our members. Our philanthropic project was an all day swim-a-thon with the proceeds (\$387.00) being donated to the Harry Chapin World Hunger Fund. Other colony achievements include placing second in the interfraternity football tournament along with many victories in the College intramural program. The brotherhoods present grade point average is maintained at 3.05.
