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MINUTES 1919 CONVENTION AT GAMMA.

First meeting, November 7, 1919, at 7:30 p. m.

The G. C. opened the convention with the usual ceremonies.

Brother Lobdell, welcomed the convention to Gamma. The G. C. responded as did Bros. Valentine, Alpha; Duffies, Beta; Fuller, Delta, and Thurston, Epsilon.

Roll call of chapters:

Alpha—Fellows, Hall, Homer and Valentine.

Beta—McKee, Duffies.

Gamma—Springman, Hawthorne.

Delta—Fuller, Davis.

Epsilon—Thurston, Harding.

The Grand officers present were:

G. C.—Ewart, Delta.

G. P.—Fisher, Beta.

G. Pp.—Johnston, Beta.

G. Q.—Lobdell, Gamma.

The nominating committee was appointed and consisted of: Fellows, McKee, Springman, Thurston and Fuller. The names submitted were:

G. C.—Ewart, Delta; Walker, Gamma; Shaw, Alpha.

G. T.—Wolford, Epsilon.

G. Pp.—Johnston, Beta.

G. P.—Towers, Gamma.

G. Q.—Wright, Alpha.

Results:—Ewart 6, Walker 2, Shaw 2.

Unanimous ballot for Wolford, Johnston, Towers and Wright.

The minutes of the last convention were read and accepted. The date of the installation of Epsilon Chapter is to be added.

G. Q. report: \$111.46 on hand. Total when all have paid to be \$186.46.

G. Pp. report: \$21.82 on hand to get out the next three issues of the Scroll. Motion made and seconded that each chapter is to pay in advance for each issue of the Scroll that is to be sent to it at the rate of 25c per copy. Carried.

Report of Purchasing Committee (audited by Schlobohm and Gilchrist): Net gain of \$97.00. Moved and seconded that this report be tabled until Bro. Bolgiano could be gotten in touch with. Carried.

The amendment to the constitution (The G. Pp. is to hold office for three years), carried.

The amendment to the National Constitution (Each chapter shall pay National Dues on the basis of each active member in the fraternity on December 1, 1917, and on the basis of each member in the fraternity present in the college on December 1, 1918), carried.

Time and Place Committee appointed: Hall, Duffies, Hawthorne, Davis and Harding.

Committee on Extension: Ottman, Johnston and Ayers.

Bro. McKee reported for Bro. Ortner on question of Fraternity Seal (for chapters).

Motion made and seconded that committee be appointed to look into matter of chapter seal. Carried.

McKee, Hall and Ottman were appointed.

Bro. Kimball admitted at 9:30 p. m. and generously applauded.

Committee on Fraternity History: Kimball, Duffies, Springman, Fuller and Thurston.

Committee on Ritual: Davison, Fisher and Lobdell.

Committee on amendment for election of officers: McKee and Duffies.

Committee on statement of Principles: Davison, Ewart, Johnston, McKee, Lobdell and Thurston.

Bro. Johnston suggested that (1) National Constitution be printed up in book form and to be given to each initiate; (2) That a National initiation fee be paid by each initiate.

Bro. Lobdell invited all the brothers to a feed tomorrow night at 7 p. m.

Adjourned.

November 8, 1919, at 10:30 a. m.

The meeting was opened by Bro. Ewart in the usual manner.

Bro. Callahan reported for the Song Committee. Moved and seconded that the committee continue in its work of collecting songs and publish them at its discretion. Carried.

Moved and seconded that Executive Committee be given power to act on Bro. Bolgiano's report. Carried.

Moved and seconded that a surplus be always kept on hand. Carried. Moved and seconded that 10% of net gains of Purchasing Committee be given them as a compensation. Carried.

Bro. Ottman reported for the Extension Committee. He suggested that we proceed slowly in getting new chapters and that we have a set form for the admission of a new chapter. Accepted.

Moved and seconded that Bros. Schlobohm and Gilchrist continue as auditors to the Purchasing Committee. Carried.

Report of History Committee: Each chapter is to choose

an Alumni member to write up its history, which is to be published in the Scroll before next spring. Accepted.

Report of Chapter Committee: The G. C. is to appoint an Alumnus (lawyer) to draft the charter. He is to report to the Executive Committee and they are to act without waiting for the next convention. Accepted.

Report of the Ritual Committee: Bro. Davison suggested that "horse play" be applied in such a way as to teach a lesson, and that nothing is to be done to destroy the initiate's confidence. He also suggested that a committee be appointed to gather rituals from different chapters and to draw up some recommendation for the next convention. Accepted.

Report from the Elections Committee: Bro. McKee suggested that an "Interlocking" system be adopted. The officers are to hold office for two years and assume their duties immediately at the close of the convention at which they are elected.

Adjourned at 12:35 p. m.

November 8, 1919, at 1:30 p. m.

The meeting was opened in the usual way by the G. C.

It was moved and seconded that 25c be charged against each active member and alumnus for the first issue of the Scroll. The payment to be made by each chapter with the payment for the next issue as soon as possible. It was amended and seconded that the next issue of the Scroll be sent free to all alumni and then for it to be run on a regular subscription basis.

Recess so that a picture might be taken.

Moved and seconded that a "sister" pin be adopted. Carried.

Discussion on the Constitution especially as to the statement of principles contained therein. Led by Bro. Davison and comment by Bro. Kimball.

Bro. McKee was appointed chairman of the Committee on Rooming for the brothers who move from one chapter to another.

Bro. Duffies and Haugh were appointed a Committee to select a fraternity hat band.

It was moved and seconded that the traveling expenses of the different traveling delegates to the National Convention be pooled among the chapters sending delegates. Carried.

A standing vote of thanks was given to the Gamma chapter for the way in which the delegates were entertained.

It was decided to hold the next convention at Epsilon on the second Friday and Saturday in November, 1920.

A standing vote of thanks was given to Prof. Ewart for the thought that was spent in preparing the material for the

convention and for the way in which he conducted the meetings.

Adjourned at 6:10 p. m.

OUR 1919 CONVENTION

Prof. F. C. Ewart, Delta.

The Convention held at New York State Teachers' College, Albany, on Nov. 7th and 8th, was the largest in the history of the Fraternity. This was due not simply to the fact that we welcomed for the first time the new Chapter from Franklin College, Indiana, but to the large attendance from other Chapters. There were eight from Alpha, four from Beta and four from Delta.

The Empire State Express brought nine of these from Epsilon, Beta and Delta and the hours of travel together gave a fine opportunity for getting acquainted. We were met at Albany by Brother Springman and taken at once to the College where an excellent supper was awaiting us. Right here let me say that the Brothers at Gamma cared for us all through the Convention in fine style. We knew that they had been unable to secure a fraternity house and we wondered how they could entertain us. They solved that problem in fine shape: for we all had our meals together around a large table in a private dining-room of the College Cafeteria and at night we were cared for in the homes and rooms of the Brothers. Our sessions were held in the Faculty Room of the College and committees met in different classrooms.

It was a delight to welcome to our number the delegates from Epsilon, which, as a local fraternity in Franklin College, has been carrying out Kappa Delta Rho ideals for ten years before becoming one of us. We are hoping that before another Convention they will have been instrumental in securing another Indiana chapter, at Purdue University.

Just before the close of the first session we had the pleasure of welcoming Brother Kimball, one of the three Brothers who first conceived the idea of Kappa Delta Rho. We have long felt the need of an authentic history of our Fraternity. He has consented to write an account of the early days and historians have been appointed in each chapter to supplement that with the history of each particular chapter.

The sessions were long and strenuous, lasting until nearly

seven o'clock Saturday night. The condition of the National Fraternity is very encouraging. Under the efficient leadership of Brother Johnston, The Scroll has taken its rightful place in our work and will increase in usefulness as the alumni and active members show an interest in it and make it a medium for the exchange of ideas. The report of the Purchasing Committee by Brother Bolgiano showed the results of his untiring efforts and the benefits to the Fraternity of getting our supplies through a central purchasing committee. The Committee upon a Collection of Kappa Delta Rho Songs urges each Chapter to compose or adopt suitable songs and send them in to the chairman of the committee, Brother Callahan of Delta; for few things will add more to our fellowship than such a collection.

The afternoon session on Saturday was devoted pretty largely to the consideration of a report of a committee of which Brother Davison of Alpha was chairman, appointed to consider the Statement of Principles found in our Constitution. Early in this session, as the sun appeared, we repaired to the front of the College for some snap-shots of the Brothers attending the Convention. Perhaps the explanation for the happy faces in these pictures was partially due to the fact that the photographers were fair "co-eds" commandeered for the occasion by Brother Springman.

It was voted to hold the next Convention at Franklin College, Franklin, Ind., next November. As the Fraternity grows, the inequality of distance from the various Chapters to the place of meeting of the Convention will be felt the more and so it was decided that the railroad expenses of the delegates be pooled and divided evenly among the visiting Chapters. The expense of entertainment is borne by the Chapter with which the Convention is held.

It was not my privilege to remain in Albany for the banquet given by the Gamma Chapter on Saturday evening, but from all reports it must have been a most delightful affair.

The prospects are good for at least one or two new chapters this year. Alumni can be of great help in putting the Grand Officers in touch with the right men in different institutions.

Report on Application for Charter of Chi Alpha Pi Fraternity at Penn State College.

The Chi Alpha Pi Fraternity of Pennsylvania State College, State College, Pa., applied for a charter of Kappa Delta Rho on December first. After considerable correspondence, an investigating committee, consisting of Brother W. I. Myers, ex-G. C., and Brother F. C. Ewert, G. C., visited State College. In their report they recommended that a charter be granted and the Chapters voted unanimously to grant it. The Installation will take place Friday, Feb. 6th.

The report of the investigating committee follows:

Dear Brothers:

The Chi Alpha Pi Fraternity of Pennsylvania State College, State College, Pa., has applied for a charter of Kappa Delta Rho. It was organized in October, 1917, and was granted a charter by Pennsylvania State College on Dec. 12th, 1917. It now has twenty-three active members and six alumni or ex-members.

The preamble to their Constitution reads as follows: "We, the members of this Fraternity, in order to engage in pursuits which will reflect to the good name of the college, to ally men of one type—men who, by close association, will mutually benefit one another—to inspire its members to higher attainment of scholarship, Christian manliness and greater endeavors, do ordain and establish this constitution for the Chi Alpha Pi."

Their Statement of Principles is as follows: "The primary objects of our affiliations are Friendship, Fellowship

and Fraternity. There can be no conflict with Church or Creed because our Fraternity does not oppose any church or religion. It does not seek to formulate a creed, yet no one can become a member of the Chi Alpha Pi unless he believes and has faith in God, which implies faith in man.

Our purposes are of a fraternal and friendly character, and our aim is to instill a good will among all men, and among and between the members of the Fraternity. We teach that friendship means universal brotherhood, and that the Golden Rule is the greatest illustration of friendship."

The present active membership is represented in the following activities: seven different extra-curricular clubs; four different musical organizations; Rifle Club, Class Track, Tennis and Wrestling; Intra-Mural Council; Eta Kappa Nu Honorary Electrical Fraternity; Honor Roll for Scholarship.

Their President took a summer course at Cornell and boarded in the home of two of the members of the Beta Chapter and thus came to know of Kappa Delta Rho. Three of the leaders attended a Penn State-Cornell game this Fall and visited the Beta Chapter House to talk over the matter of petitioning for a charter.

After the petition was received but before the visiting committee went to State College to investigate, we corresponded with three members of the Penn State Faculty and with a prominent business man of the town.

The following is the letter sent by Prof. A. R. Warnock, Dean of Men: "I am answering your letter of Nov. 28th in which you ask my opinion of the Chi Alpha Pi Fraternity of Pennsylvania State College. This local fraternity has a good standing in the College; it has a reasonably good reputation in scholarship, although it is not the first, and its members are influential in the student body. Their chapter is in excellent shape and should be strong next year. Their president is a very good type of leader. I think they could safely be recommended for a charter in a national fraternity."

Upon the strength of such recommendations as this, Brother W. I. Myers of Beta and myself went to State College last week. Before visiting the Chapter House we had personal interviews with three members of the Faculty, all of which were favorable. We found the Fraternity housed in a very attractive home which was built for a fraternity house. The location upon a corner near the center of the town and only five minutes from the College could scarcely be improved. We spent many hours with the boys talking things over. They wear well, for we liked them better the longer we knew them. They evidently have a serious purpose besides that of mere fellowship. We were impressed with the fact that they seem to have arrived independently

at approximately our own ideals. We recommend that a charter be granted.

Editorials

The meetings were held on scheduled time, and all business was promptly and efficiently attended to, the discussions being full of pep and to the point. Each chapter had a delegation right on the job and the various committees appointed transacted their business very quickly and satisfactorily. Many alumni attended, especially from Alpha, and their interest and knowledge of fraternity affairs helped to make the convention a most profitable success. Prof. Ewart, of Delta, who had done such faithful and productive work in the preceding year, was re-elected, thus insuring a continuance of the successful work already started. The Gamma banquet, held on Saturday night, was an inspiration, both to the mind and stomach, and those who attended can now readily understand why the Gamma chapter has been so successful, and why they exert such a tremendous influence at State College. There is no doubt that the members of the faculty, even though not members of Kappa Delta Rho, are solidly behind the chapter there, and are willing in any way to help the fellows in Gamma. The brothers of Kappa Delta Rho thank their Albany brothers for their hospitality and generosity, not only in connection with the convention itself, but also for the thoughtfulness and entertainment outside of the regular business sessions. It is certain that the 1919 convention will serve as a model for the future; it began a new era for Kappa Delta Rho.

The second issue of The Scroll, under the guidance of the present editor, appears late, as did the first number. The

editor has no excuse to offer and he will not try to make any. He made a promise and fell down on the job, his only explanation will be a warning; all chapters not having their write-ups in at the required times, will not be represented in future issues, and hereafter the brothers who do not pay in advance, or if active, their chapters pay in advance for them, will receive no copies of The Scroll. That's fair and final.

After the foregoing paragraph the editor cannot help thanking the chapters and brothers who did so materially aid in publishing this issue. The editor wishes to especially thank the chapters that had their money in on time, and some even paid far in advance, that the editor might make more definite plans for the future. Such co-operation is the source of inspiration and diligence, and breeds success. With this real teamwork there can be no failure. Two brothers had such faith in the future of Kappa Delta Rho and The Scroll that they paid for life subscriptions. The editor hopes that they live to a ripe old age.

In the last number of The Scroll a questionnaire was printed on the reverse side of the last directory page. This was done to save money, as printing it on a separate page would have required the additional expense of four pages, while to have it printed on a separate sheet would have wasted the last page and would also have made it much easier to mislay the questionnaire. Many answered the questions on a separate sheet and thus kept their directories intact. Some of the brothers have not been heard from, so the editor is having additional questionnaires printed and will send them to these brothers in a personal letter. The March number will be devoted to the brothers who were in the service of their country, so it is hoped that all brothers will be prompt in sending in their records. This number should be complete in every detail. The June number will be devoted to a history of the fraternity, and of each individual chapter. At the last convention it was voted that a committee be appointed to take care of this matter, and that the full history be published in The Scroll. The September issue will be devoted chiefly to a revised directory.

This number of The Scroll is being sent to all the alumni, whether they have subscribed or not. At the convention the chapters voted to send the first two issues to all brothers, the chapters to stand the expense of their members who had

not subscribed. This seemed only fair, as some of the alumni may not have received a copy of the first issue, and it would also prove to the skeptical that The Scroll means business. When they see that the chapters and the editor are trying to do their parts it is hoped that the backward brothers will come forward and do their share, at least by subscribing and sending in their records. The editor has received many letters, both helpful and encouraging, and will do his best to answer them, in time. If The Scroll could stand the expense, the editor would publish extracts from all these letters, because they would be as inspiring to the fraternity at large as they are to him. Please write in and constructively criticize The Scroll, and also boost it among the Kappa Delts, both far and near.
