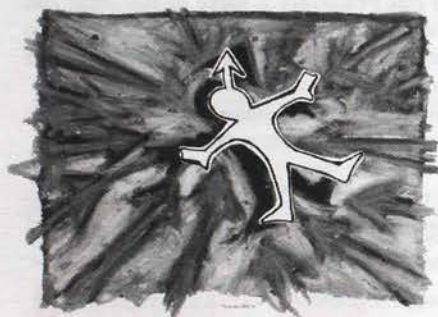

Letter from the President and Executive Director

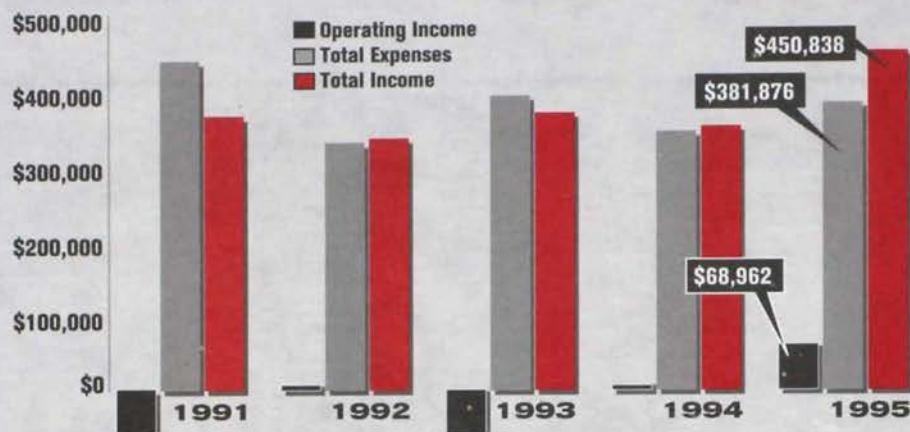
The fraternity is on a five year upswing and there's no sign of slowing

Fellow Brothers, It gives us great pleasure to report to you the status of our fraternity. The fiscal year ending June 30th ended a year of **record results** for Kappa Delta Rho.

The stringent fiscal controls implemented nearly two years ago continue to have a positive impact on our financial results. Operating

will meet again during the fall to prepare a presentation at the February 1996 Board meeting.

Throughout the National Fraternity, other initiatives are underway. The Education committee continues work on the development of a member education program. In addition, the standards committee continues to work to develop a

Revenue for the year increased 28% in large part due to: an increase in rush numbers, higher per man fees, and an aggressive reduction in accounts receivable. Operating income increased from \$6,966 to \$68,962. Even after an adjustment for the transfer of scholarship and chapter loan funds to the foundation in the amount of \$52,139, the beginning fund balance of [-\$23,161] was reduced to [-\$6,338].

The Kappa Delta Rho Foundation also enjoyed a record year. The number of individual donors increased 33% from 843 to 1124. Overall unrestricted donations increased 22% from \$76,639 to \$93,465.

For the first time in the history of Kappa Delta Rho, the National Fraternity formed a national housing corporation. Kappa Delta Rho Properties, Inc. was incorporated in March and on June 2nd successfully closed on the purchase of a chapter house on the Indiana University campus. This is a milestone event in the history of our organization. There is now hope for a successful future for NU Chapter. In addition, we have redefined the capabilities of the National Fraternity to aid its chapters and alumni.

The Board of Directors for Kappa Delta Rho Properties, Inc. include: Al Wrigley, Zeta '55; Bill Paris, Eta '87; Wes Litzinger, Zeta '74; Randy Saunders, Sigma '79 and Mike Mueller, Eta '95.

While the Fraternity, the Foundation and Kappa Delta Rho Properties all enjoyed a very good year, we are constantly aware of the significant challenges facing our organization as we move into the future. With this in mind, the National Fraternity appointed a Long Range Planning Task Force at its February meeting. This task force met prior to the Convention and

new, more concise risk management policy. The Constitution Committee is hard at work reviewing the Constitution and Ritual. Regional Senators continue to fan out across the country to aid various chapters. Initiatives are also underway to recruit and involve groups of alumni as support groups for chapters which lack any alumni support of their own.

Finally, as mandated at the 1994 Convention, an additional major initiative is underway to address the situation regarding the Alpha

Chapter at Middlebury College. Representatives of the National Fraternity, the Alpha Chapter and the Alpha Chapter Alumni Corporation met in New York in October 1994 and June 1995 to discuss the situation. Representatives of both the undergraduate group and alumni group were invited to attend this year's leadership school. We have an aggressive schedule, but hope to have a proposed resolution brought before the 1996 National Convention Assembly.

We are excited about the prospects for the future of our Fraternity. The Fraternity system, in general, remains under attack by society. While we feel the attacks, as a whole, are unfairly directed solely at the Fraternity movement, we can take the opportunity for self analysis. To do this means we take a harsh look at who we are and where we are going. We get our house in order, and offer the types of programs and opportunities which will permit our chapters, members and alumni to prosper.

The last several issues of the Quill and Scroll have discussed the challenges facing our Fraternity and the harsh steps taken to bring fiscal focus to our operation. While still heavily in debt, obligations have been reduced by approximately 30%. The budget provides for continued reduction of debt while gradually increasing the level of staff and alumni support.

By working together, we are all helping to make our Fraternity a force at the local and National level. We encourage each of you to join the effort. Support your chapter. Support the Fraternity through the Foundation annual fund.

We wish you good success this year and look forward to another successful year.

Foundation President's Report

THE GOOD NEWS IS ... THE KAPPA Delta Rho Foundation Annual Fund Campaign had a very successful year. The total number of contributors increased 33% to 1124 from 843. Total unrestricted dollars donated increased 22% to \$93,465 from \$76,639. Overall giving increased 10% to \$104,668 from \$91,605. The Trustees are very grateful for the loyal support of our alumni and undergraduates.

The Foundation is at a strategic turning point. The beginning of our long-range planning indicates that we must strengthen our base of giving. Why? Because we must be in a better position to give greater support to our scholarship and leadership programs as we approach the year 2000 and our centennial

year in 2005. Many of our alumni do not know why the Foundation exists or its purpose. Simply put, it is a 501 (c)(3) educational foundation that utilizes your tax deductible contributions to award more scholarships to undergraduates, and to provide greater funding for leadership programs. Restricted contributions and bequests are utilized to increase the endowment to generate income to support these same purposes. The programs we support include: the annual Williams Leadership School, Leadership consultants, regional conclaves, regional senator's program, chapter operational manuals, to name just a few.

To increase awareness about the foundation, we established a new undergraduate giving

society, the Order of the Peregrine Falcon. Since its inception in July, twenty undergraduates have joined the society. With their \$35 annual contribution they receive a beautifully designed certificate and membership pin. We are very confident that members of this society will continue their pattern of giving long after they graduate from college.

Last year, Robert Corrie, Beta '53, our Treasurer, told our National Convention that "KDR is forever." As we look forward to 2005, we know that KDR will be forever because of the commitment of time, talent, and treasure from all 17,000 of our alumni. Believe it or not, **YOU** are the future of KDR!

Outstanding Alumni Awards

This year, the National Fraternity was pleased to recognize two alumni with the Outstanding Alumni Award. The Outstanding Alumni Award is presented to alumni who have shown through their commitment of time, effort and resources a dedication to Kappa Delta Rho above and beyond the call of duty.

ROBERT D. CORRIE, BETA CHAPTER, CORNELL UNIVERSITY '53

BROTHER CORRIE GRADUATED FROM CORNELL IN 1953. Since that time, he has served as a Director of the National Fraternity, a Trustee of the Kappa Delta Rho Educational Foundation, a Trustee of the Kappa Delta Rho Foundation, as well as filling a variety of officer positions within each organization.

The Fraternity owes Brother Corrie an enormous debt of gratitude for his years of service. Even beginning in the late 1950's, with no headquarter's staff at the time, all the initiation certificates and processing of plaques and checks took place out of Bob's Den in Garden City, New York. Most recently, he returned as Treasurer of the Kappa Delta Rho Educational Foundation. Bob dedicated himself to reorganizing the Treasurer's position and ensuring that all necessary filings were completed in a timely manner.

At the time of presentation, President Edgeworth showed great emotion as he



announced Bob's award and confessed that it was only a token acknowledgement of the Fraternity's enormous debt to Brother Corrie for his lifelong commitment to Kappa Delta Rho.

RAY C. HUNT, JR. RHO CHAPTER, LAFAYETTE COLLEGE '53

BROTHER HUNT GRADUATED FROM LAFAYETTE COLLEGE in 1953. Since the late 1980s Brother Hunt has helped guide our Fraternity toward the future. First serving as a Director and later as Vice President of Finance for the National Fraternity. Ray became reinvolved with the Fraternity when he agreed to serve as a Trustee of the Kappa Delta Rho Foundation in 1994. Since that time, Brother Hunt became the Vice President of Investments for the Foundation.

As Vice President of Investments, Brother Hunt was instrumental in implementing an actively functioning Investment Committee which serves to Manage the endowment.

The dedication and commitment of Brother Hunt have permitted Kappa Delta Rho and the Kappa Delta Rho Foundation to evolve to a higher level of service and expertise. When presenting Brother Hunt with his award, Paul Downes, President of the Kappa Delta Rho Foundation expressed the deep appreciation felt by all the Trustees for the commitment shown by Brother Hunt and their desire to emulate his example.

Nu's New Home Marks a Milestone

Purchasing a House on the Indiana Campus Holds New Opportunities for National and the Local Chapter

The founding of Kappa Delta Rho Properties, a national house corporation marks a milestone in our 90-year history. With its inception, the national fraternity explores the uncharted territories of real estate ownership, lease agreements, and purchasing options.

Modeled after other national organizations, Kappa Delta Rho Properties is intended to be the mechanism that, according to executive director, Bill Paris, "will give the fraternity the muscle we need to be competitive."

The first entry on its agenda was on June 2, 1995 when it closed on a house for the Nu Chapter at Indiana University.

Nu Chapter has moved nearly a dozen times since it was chartered on the Indiana University campus in 1926. By the late 1980s it found itself without an official chapter house—a potentially dangerous situation on a campus as "house-oriented" as Indiana University, explains Nu Chapter Alumni Corp president, Jim Oliver. Fortunately for Kappa Delta Rho, due to last year's strong rush, the chapter doubled its numbers even without the draw of a chapter house.

Nu Chapter's new home, and the Corporation's first-ever purchase, has

rooms for 72 men, a rec room, dining room, formal room, and a backyard with recreational amenities such as a basketball and sand volleyball court.

The Corporation will provide an opportunity to "reopen dormant chapters as well as open new chapters on campuses where housing is an issue," explains Paris. It will also provide a means to further expand Kappa Delta Rho's success as a national organization.

Staying Healthy

Everything a Man Needs to Know to Stay Fit in Today's World

Good Health means taking care of your body and mind and practicing healthy habits, understanding your body and recognizing warning signs of illness. But, for many men health is not usually a high priority.

Today, most of the diseases and mishaps that cut life short in the United States effect men much greater than women. The average woman lives seven years longer than the average man. And, the gap is widening; in 1940, it was less than 4½ years. In fact, for every 100 women who die between the ages of 4 and 64, 170 men die. At most stages of life, a man is 88 percent more likely to die of heart disease, 45 percent more likely to die of cancer, 18 percent more likely to die of stroke, 69 percent likely to die of pneumonia or influenza, and almost eight times more likely to die of AIDS.

Men are more likely to die younger than women in part because they live dangerously. Men are more likely to drive recklessly, try dangerous stunts, and follow through with suicide threats. Additionally, as boys become adults, they usually feel themselves getting bigger and more powerful. With this, they may begin to feel invincible and strong enough to control the world around them. Because of this sense of control, attention to nutrition, fitness and even routine check ups may be lacking. And therein lies the problem.

Most women get used to seeing a physician regularly from young adulthood on, whether it's for routine gynecological exams, to obtain contraceptives, or because of pregnancy. Most men never develop a similar pattern of preventive health care and as a result learn very little about their own bodies and about how to do routine preventive checks that could prolong their lives. In fact:

- Three out of every ten men say they have not been to a doctor in a year or more.
- One-third of all men aged 45 to 64 have never had their cholesterol checked, even though heart disease kills more men than any other disease.
- Only 22 percent of men aged 40 or older say they had a digital rectal exam during the previous year. Yet health authorities recommend one a year starting at 40.
- One out of every two men over the age of 50 doesn't know the warning signs of prostate or colorectal cancer, and one out of five says he would be embarrassed to discuss them with a health care provider.
- More than half of all men who have experienced sexual potency problems don't talk about them with a doctor.

Given the above, if you are a typical man, you are probably in need of a check-up. The American Cancer Society and others make the following recommendations for men's routine health care:

Starting at age 20 ...

- Blood pressure checked at least every two years.
- A comprehensive eye exam every two to four years.

- Exams for cancers of the lymph nodes, mouth, skin, testes, and thyroid every three years.
- Total and HDL ("good") cholesterol measured at least every five years.
- A tetanus-diphtheria booster every ten years.

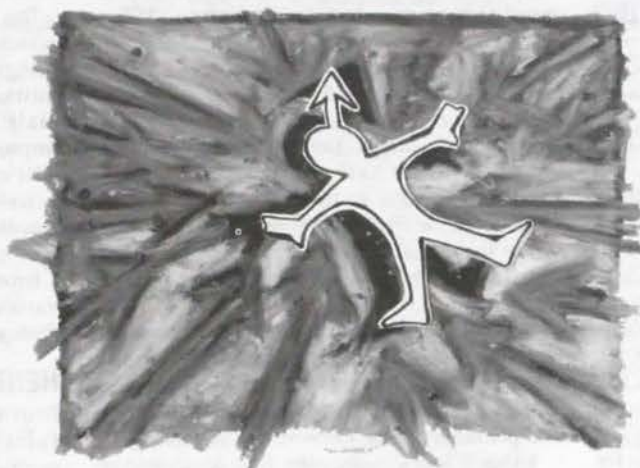
During your 40s ... all of the above, and:

- The cancer exams every year.
- A digital rectal exam (For prostate and rectal cancer).

Starting at age 50 ... all of the above, and:

- A yearly prostate-specific antigen (PSA) test.
- A yearly stool test (for colon and rectal cancer).
- A sigmoidoscopy (or colon cancer) every three to five years.

Besides physical exams and regular checkups, to maintain good health, men should follow these recommendations:

- Don't smoke. It's the single greatest preventable cause of disease and death.
- Have a Physical. Find a health care provider you trust and have a check up. If there is something that needs attention, it's only going to get more serious, more painful, and more expensive if you wait.
- Do Self-Exams. Ask your health care provider to show you how to do simple, regular self-examinations for skin and testicular cancer and conduct them regularly.
- Learn About Your Health. Sit down with a good book on men's health and educate yourself more about your body. The more you know about your body and your health, the more proactive you can be to maintaining your healthy way of life.
- Reduce Stress. Stress isn't just an emotional feeling. It has a physiological impact on the body. When you are under stress, you may experience faster heart beats, excessive perspiration or headaches. Follow the nutrition guidelines below, exercise, and avoid caffeine and alcohol.
- Practice Safer Sex. Sexually Transmitted Diseases are not solely the concern of men under 25. Safer sex is important to your health and to the health of those you love ... besides, it's fun! Be

creative and find fun and sexy ways to tell that special someone that you care. And, if you are planning to have vaginal, anal, or oral sex, using a condom is 98% effective against pregnancy and is one of the best forms of protection against STDs, including HIV.

Exercise. Exercise can be as simple as a vigorous walk or climbing stairs. If done regularly it can improve quality of life. As reported in *Nutrition Action (June 1995)* researchers at Harvard School of Public Health monitored more than 10,000 Harvard alumni between the ages of 45 and 84 during the 1980s. Over an eight year period those who had been sedentary but who started doing exercise like swimming, jogging, or playing tennis were 234 percent less likely to die than those who were inactive.

Lose a Few and Keep them off. The benefits of maintaining a healthy weight are numerous. Following a diet low in fat and high in fiber is beneficial to achieving a healthy weight. And, regular activity can help to keep the weight off.

Lower your blood pressure. Men with mild or moderate hypertension (blood pressure of 140 to 180 over 90 to 105) who do regular, low-intensity exercise like brisk walking for 20 to 60 minutes three to five days a week can lower their blood pressure by an average of ten points.

Eat Right. You can reduce the risk for four of the ten leading causes of death, if you:

Cut back on fats, especially saturated and trans fats. Fat should comprise no more than 30 percent of your calorie intake. That means if you eat 2,100 calories a day, a maximum of 700 of those calories should be from fat. Fill up on fruits, vegetables and grains such as rice and pasta. Go easy on the fast food, french fries, and potato chips and use oils and butter sparingly. Additionally, eat less red meat, cheese, whole and 2% milk, chicken and turkey with skin, and foods made with butter or palm, coconut, or partially hydrogenated oils. If you eat red meat, make it no more than once a week.

Boost the fiber. Fiber is found in carbohydrate foods such as whole grains, cereal and certain fruits and vegetables. Load up on beans and whole-grain pasta, bread, rice and breakfast cereals. You'll reduce your risk of heart disease and cancer.

Eat five to nine servings of fruits and vegetables every day. The average American man barely manages to eat three. You'll be lowering your risk of colon, lung, stomach, prostate, pancreatic, oral, laryngeal, bladder, and esophageal cancers.

Cut your sodium to no more than about 2,400 mg a day, to lower your risk of high blood pressure.

If you drink, limit yourself to two drinks a day or less. If you don't drink, do not start.

So it's that simple. Make health your priority and follow these guidelines. By doing so, you will likely enhance the quality of your life.

Mike would be proud to read the second paragraph of this article. Brothers take advantage of your time together.

By the number in attendance at your funeral, it was clear that your influences run much deeper than just within our chapter. You have touched many people in your life and it was an honor to have you touch our lives in such a positive fashion. *You were our friend, you were our brother.* You will never be forgotten! We will miss you!

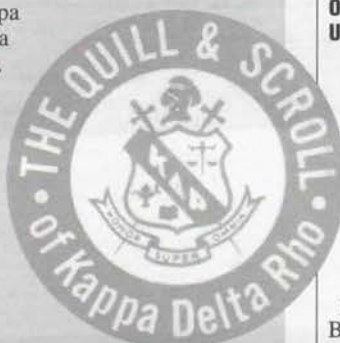
