From the President

Nearly 100 years ago, ten young men met in Room 14 of Old Painter Hall at Middlebury College and formed Kappa Delta Rho. These young men lived at a place and time that is foreign to many of our still-living brotherhood. In 1905, Archduke Francis Ferdinand had not been assassinated. Pearl Harbor had not been attacked. Nazi Germany had not yet murdered millions. No one knew about the Cold War, MAD and the Domino Theory. And September 11, in 1905 meant only that the Chicago Cubs were 19 games behind the New York Giants. On the more positive side, do you think our Founders could have imagined the tremendous advances in medicine and technology that we now take for granted? Polio is now cured and smallpox eradicated. We live and work in space and use laptops, cell phones and TiVos. It would be easy to believe that our Founders lived completely different lives than today's Kappa Delta Rho Brother.

However, I believe that there are more similarities between the old and the new than initially meets the eye. The Founders, just like today's undergraduates, had a purpose. In creating Kappa Delta Rho, the Founders' primary aim was to attain true standards of manhood and brotherly love. The Founders sought to be unpretentious, sincere and humble. To our Founders, these goals were not high-sounding ideals, but guidelines for life. Essentially, the Founders wanted to build an organization that would enable them to be better men. An early version of our Constitution stated:

The primary focus of the fraternity shall be the promotion of good fellowship among its members and the advancement of truth, justice, and virtue, as exemplified by our Latin motto: Honor Super Omnia. . . It is the faith of the Fraternity that its worth may ever be shown by the lives of its individual members.

Today, we work through the Fraternity to make our Brothers' lives better. Through the national headquarters and the local chapters, our undergraduate and alumni Brothers focus on scholarship, philanthropy, community involvement and helping each other succeed. On the philanthropic front, alumni and undergraduates worked together during the August 2004 National Convention to support a highly successful toy drive for our KDR Kids philanthropy. We presented the Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh with toys, toys and more toys. The hospital's representative could barely sit in her car because it was so full of donations from our Brothers. On the fraternal front, leaders and alumni from our successful chapters help struggling chapters learn how to succeed. In our communities and campuses, our Brothers are leaders through their student bodies, intrafraternal organizations, governments and religious institutions. By demonstrating honor to our communities and our peers, we honor ourselves and our Fraternity.

This commitment to honor and Brotherhood is one of Kappa Delta Rho's best attributes.

Throughout 2005, we will be celebrating the Fraternity's Centennial. Many chapters are celebrating the Centennial in their own way, and the National Fraternity has plans of its own. As detailed elsewhere in the *Quill & Scroll*, the Fraternity will be hosting a Centennial Celebration during the weekend of August 4-7, 2005 at the Wyndham Baltimore - Inner Harbor. This celebration will be for the young and young-feeling alike. By holding the event in Baltimore, we not only cater to the geographic center of our membership base, but also provide an opportunity for alumni throughout the Atlantic coast to reconnect with their Brothers and reintroduce their families to Kappa Delta Rho. I urge everyone to come visit us in August.

Another exciting development is that the Fraternity is also issuing an updated alumni directory. Harris Publishing, the vendor we selected for this project, may have already contacted you. Because we want the directory to be a complete resource for Kappa Delta Rho Brothers nationwide, please cooperate with Harris.

We will also be publishing a 100-year history of Kappa Delta Rho. Some of you are old enough to have seen our 50-year history. Like that book, the 100-year history will be a bound and collectable keepsake. It will have pages for each chapter to include information and pictures. The National Headquarters staff is diligently working with undergraduate Brothers to ensure that every single chapter is represented. If you have information to include in our history, please contact the National Headquarters staff and they will assist you.

In closing, I believe that Kappa Delta Rho's second century will build on the successes of its first. However, we cannot succeed without the involvement and contributions of our alumni. Many thanks to the volunteers who help us on a daily and annual basis. If you want to get involved, but don't know how, or if you have any questions, suggestions or comments, please e-mail me. I love to hear from my Brothers. I'll get back to you.

Oh, one more thing: Happy Birthday KDR.

"Alpha Beta? Where are they from? THEY won five awards?" This seemed to be the sentiment of many attendees of this past National Convention in Pittsburgh. And rightfully so. After all, Kappa Delta Rho's Delaware Chapter has been quite far from the national spotlight in recent years, not even attending the previous Convention. So why the sudden change?

In the spring of 2003, the Alpha Betas took a fourteen-man pledge class, including myself. That May, twelve of our most influential Brothers graduated. The following December, I was elected as Consul and subsequently, I had many goals. Some of these included raising our chapter and pledge class grade-point average, renewing our alumni relations, conducting successful philanthropic and community service events and most importantly re-establishing our status with the University of

Delaware and our National Fraternity. My timetable for achieving these goals was my one year term as Consul.

At first glance, my goals seemed unrealistic. Many people told me it was just too much in too short of a time. Because of a weak performance in the past fall semester, our chapter was stripped of our social privileges by the University for the spring semester. It would have been easy to give up, but the men of Alpha Beta stood behind me.

There was no reward in sight, but a renewed commitment by our Brotherhood and a lot of hard work finally paid off. I am proud to say that in just one semester we accomplished all the goals that most said we could not do in a year. We raised our chapter GPA from 2.39 to 2.71 and our pledge class GPA from 1.97 to 3.09. We created a semi-annual "State of the Chapter" event in which we presented our goals, plans and achievements to our alumni; and had a separate Alumni/Active picnic. We raised over \$250 for the local Ronald McDonald House in a charity poker tournament, raising our total year contribution to over \$750. The Alpha Betas also continued our semi-annual tradition of donating an entire weekend of our

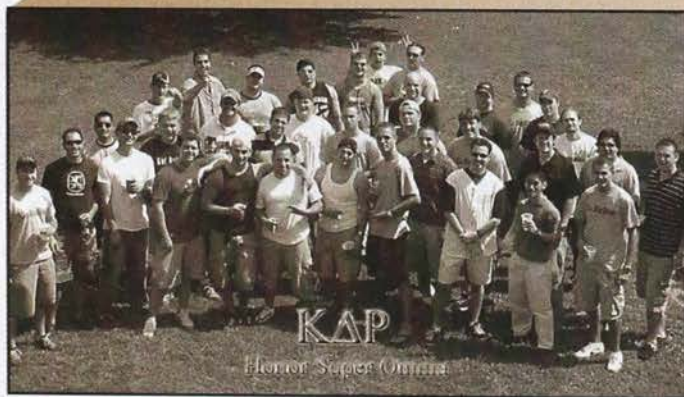
time to doing work at a local Boy Scout camp.

At the University of Delaware, every Greek organization is rated in the Chapter Assessment Program, which determines whether each chapter has social and other campus privileges. This program includes Academics, Membership Development, Chapter Management and Community Involvement. In the fall of 2003, we received the second lowest rating in the program. In just one semester, we bolted to Silver status, the second highest in a five-level scale.

In August, we saw the fruits of our labors on a grand scale. The Alpha Beta Chapter received five national awards including awards for Alumni Relations, Social Service, Philanthropy, Campus Participation and the prestigious O.D. Roberts Award for Chapter Improvement.

In a room full of surprise, we knew we had it all along.

THE 93RD ANNUAL KAPPA DELTA RHO NATIONAL CONVENTION

took place August 5-8, 2004 at the Pittsburgh Airport Hyatt. The Convention was a huge success and a good time was had by all. The hotel is connected to the airport, so for attendees who traveled by air, all that stood between the baggage claim and the hotel lobby was a short ride on the moving sidewalk.

The first two days of the Convention were reserved for the Elmon Williams Leadership Academy, in which undergraduate delegates took part in lectures and discussions covering topics ranging from recruitment to risk management. Among the keynote speakers were Jerry Stebbins, Scott Johnson and Shawn Hoke, all KDR Alumni, who gave presentations on financial responsibility, service learning and our Ritual, respectively. T.J. Sullivan of Pi Kappa Phi and Judge Mitch Crane of Sigma Phi Epsilon were brought in from CAMPUSPEAK to give presentations on member accountability, risk management and public image. Executive Director, J.R. Rees, gave the final address of the Academy, "Making Potential Kinetic," about chapter motivation.

In between presentations, the undergraduate attendees were divided into small groups to discuss what was learned in the presentations as well as other important topics relating to the fraternity world. A group of seven alumni acted as facilitators for these small groups, and their contribution in this capacity was certainly invaluable. Acting as facilitators were Shawn Hoke, Jerry Stebbins, Scott Johnson, Craig Coppaway, Jon Kapell, Matt Lenno and Pete Tartaro.

On Friday evening, a Pittsburgh area alumni event, was held at Shootz Café in Pittsburgh. The event was planned by a group of Phi Alpha (Clarion University) Chapter Alumni. Attendees had the opportunity to play billiards, snack on hors d'oeuvres, make new friends and catch up with old ones.

Saturday morning was the annual business meeting of the National Fraternity. ALPHA BETA CHAPTER

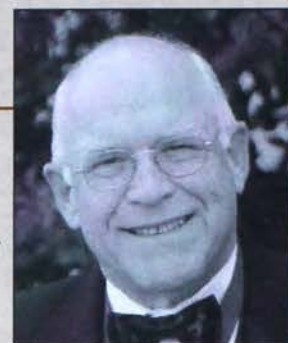
University of Delaware

Alpha Beta is an excellent example of a commitment to overall chapter improve-



ment. In the fall semester of 2003 this chapter had lost certain social privileges due to receiving only a satisfactory score on their university's chapter assessment program. After a semester of excellent programming, community service, philanthropy, diversity education, career programming and supporting many university events, they improved their score by nearly 60 points and moved to the rank of Silver. It was one of the most dramatic improvements their campus had ever seen. Furthermore, their Chapter GPA increased from 2.394 to a 2.708 from the Fall 2003 to the Spring 2004 semester. This increase was by far, the most dramatic on campus. The pledge/new member GPA increased from a 1.97 to a 3.088 from the Fall 2003 to the Spring 2004 semester. This increase

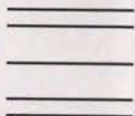

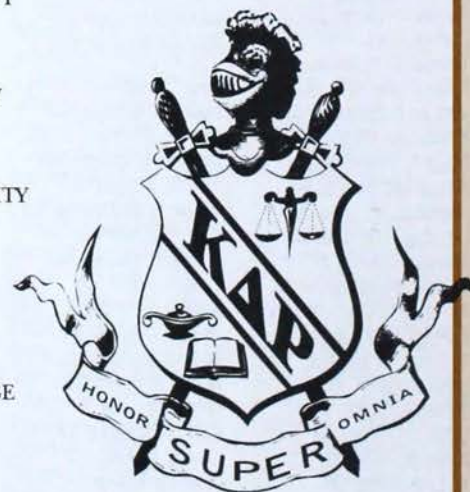

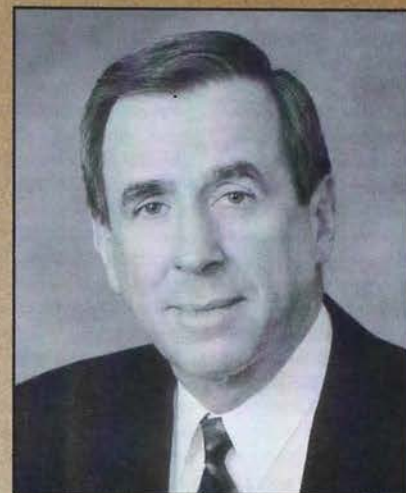
very fond memory. Also, living in the chapter house was a terrific experience for me, and holding the office of Social Chairman. We had a lot of fun in those days!"

Anthony R. Pasquinelli co-founded Pasquinelli, Inc., in 1956, with his brother Bruno. Since then, the company has built more than 20,000 homes in the Chicago area and has expanded to North Carolina, South Carolina, Indiana, Ohio, Georgia and Texas. At one time, the company produced only single-family homes, but now Pasquinelli builds town home communities and semi-custom homes, as well.

As chairman of the board of Beverly Bank, Tony took it public, overseeing the merger with St. Paul Federal, which merged with Charter One Financial. He is also a longtime member and director of the Homebuilder's Association of Greater Chicago, a board member and major supporter of the Center for Performing Arts at Governor's State University, and most recently, has become very involved with Roosevelt University, where he is a member of the board of trustees and a founding member of the School of Real Estate's MBA program. As one of the school's major contributors, Tony has helped shaped its strategic planning, emphasizing the value of its mentorships, training programs and other pragmatic dimensions.

KDR Experience

In August 1998, the summer before my senior year in college, I attended my first National Convention. My chapter was asked to present on recruitment and retention. It was the first time I truly realized the depth of the KDR Brotherhood. Members from all across the country were sharing ideas and asking everyone's opinions. It was at that time that I realized that a job with the fraternity could be in my future.

What a ride it has been since that trip to Pittsburgh. It all started in the fall of 1995 when a young freshman decided to join a fraternity of 12 members. From that point there has been no looking back. There were 12 of us in that pledge class. The chapter outlook was not the best, but we had a vision and the mentality that the "ship would not sink on our watch." The next fall we recruited 19 pledges and the year after that we brought in 21 pledges. In three years the chapter went from small and in debt, to the largest chapter on campus and over \$5,000 in the bank.

This change can be attributed to the attitude the older members instilled in us. I still look back on those days and wonder what would have happened if we had not worked so hard. One thing I know for sure, I would not be where I am today had I not gone through that experience. It led to me taking a position with the National Office and learning more than I could have ever imagined.

Who would have thought that this boy from Texas would move to Pennsylvania (in January no less) and live out of his truck for the better part of a year? Every day I am glad I made the choice I did. I will never forget the hours I spent on the road between Rochester, NY, and Pittsburgh, making wrong turns in Illinois while trying to get to Iowa, going to watch the Super Bowl in 18 inches of snow or riding the subway in New York. I will

also never forget the many different people I have met and conversations I had about the direction each chapter was headed in.

Today I work for a mortgage company in Fort Worth, TX, called World Savings. I have eight employees under me, six loan officers, a processor and an underwriter. They look to me everyday for answers and ideas on how to increase our business in a competitive market. But I also must ensure we are moving in the right direction. Just as when I would visit a chapter, everyday I must make sure my employees are using their full potential and are focused on the correct goals. If it ever looks as if someone is moving away from our goals I must right the ship.

Every week I have conversations that closely resemble ones I had with chapter members. Are we doing the right things to be productive? Are we looking in the right places for loans (new members)? Are we preparing ourselves daily (studying)? Are we holding the right events? Even though I am in a totally different business the same type of questions still apply.

My time working for KDR has proven to be invaluable. It taught me that if someone is not headed in the right direction you must help and show them the way. Know when to speak and when to let others speak. Never slow down, always hold your head high, always ask questions and never let up. And the most important question for a manager is, would the people under them rather be doing something else? If they would, you should be helping them get there.
