From the President

Our undergraduate Brothers left Josh's program with goals for their chapter's fall recruitment, a plan to achieve those goals and a great deal of excitement, optimism, and energy. While these Brothers have good plans and great attitudes, they can still use your help! Given the pace of life today, it is understandable that relatively few alumni will be able to attend chapter recruitment events. However, you can still help. In this magazine you will find a referral form. Is your son, a friend of his, or a young person from your neighborhood or your hometown going to an institution that has a KDR chapter? Then fill out the form and send it into the National Office so the staff can pass that lead on to the chapter. While the young men you refer are under no obligation to join, you may just be introducing them to one of the best experiences they will ever have in their life!
- Expansion While in Indianapolis, I also had the opportunity to meet
 the young men from our expansion groups at Christopher Newport
 University, York College, and Virginia Tech. Kappa Delta Rho can be
 proud of the caliber of young men that we have carrying the flag forward on these campuses.
- The Chapter Awards Luncheon I was privileged to help recognize the many impressive accomplishments of our undergraduate chapters. Often, we hear a great deal of negativity about college students in general, and fraternity men in particular. It was refreshing to focus time on the good that our undergraduate Brothers are doing. Congratulations to all of the award winners!
- NCCA Hall of Champions This year's alumni event was pretty unique.
 Not only did we have some time for casual conversation about KDR with
 alumni from across the country, but we were in the NCAA Hall of
 Champions! You would have had to absolutely hate all college athletics
 not to have had a good time.
- The Convention Meeting The delegates to this year's convention meeting had the unfortunate pleasure of sitting through my first meeting as chair (thank you for your understanding and patience). It was definitely a learning experience, which will help me next year. At this year's convention meeting, the Kappa Delta Rho Foundation announced a Recruitment Scholarship Program. Beginning this year, each new KDR member who attains at least a 3.0 GPA during their pledge semester will receive a \$100 academic scholarship from the Foundation. This program makes a statement about Kappa Delta Rho's commitment the academic progress of our members. Also, it will be a valuable asset to our chapters as they recruit. In addition to thanking the Foundation for moving forward with this program, I would also like to thank each and every member and friend of the Fraternity who contribute to the Foundation's various giving programs. Without your continued support, the Foundation would not be able to make programs like this one possible, nor would it be able to provide over \$55,000 in scholarships to help our members further their education.

whose lives and achievements I can only hope to emulate.

From the Executive Director

Make the most of your membership!



By all means . . . make the most of your membership. To me, and most KDRs, this is a simple, but very powerful statement. In fact, I did not understand the "true" meaning of that phrase until I experienced it for myself — especially with regards to Kappa Delta Rho.

I joined Kappa Delta Rho with great hopes of filling a void that I knew was missing from my lackluster life — and my college experience up to that point — but I really did not know what to expect. I understood that fraternities were supposed to help you grow and mature, but I did not understand the deeper meaning and benefit behind a fraternity. I went through a brief education about the history of Kappa Delta Rho, but to be completely honest, I doubt those men, who were seniors when I was pledging, really remembered me.

The following year, I was appointed to be the chapter praetor, because the Brother elected to that position did not return to college. That position and intramural sports were the extent of my involvement in chapter activities. I essentially did the bare minimum and went through all the motions of being a KDR gentleman. As the year progressed, I realized that I was not satisfied with my Kappa Delta Rho experience, but, I could not figure out why. That changed the following year after I had been convinced to run for, and elected to, the office of consul. By necessity, my involvement in the chapter increased exponentially — that tends to happen to chapter consuls.

Sometime in that same time period it hit me that the reason I had not been happy with my Kappa Delta Rho experience was because I had not been actively doing anything to contribute to my experience as a Kappa Delta Rho Brother. Over time, I expanded my involvement with the Fraternity beyond the chapter level. With

increased involvement, I learned the more I did in the Fraternity, the more I got out of the Fraternity. Finally, I understood what it meant to "make the most of your membership."

When I encounter any young Brother who is discouraged or feels like something is missing from his or her fraternal experience, the first advice I give is to get more involved. I firmly believe there is a proportional relationship to your level of involvement with Kappa Delta Rho to your level of satisfaction with your experience in Kappa Delta Rho. It is just that simple!

That very special relationship does not end the moment you become an alumnus member of the chapter. The more you continue to stay involved with Kappa Delta Rho after you graduate, the more you will continue to grow as a result of your membership in Kappa Delta Rho.

There is no shortage of volunteer opportunities within Kappa Delta Rho on a national, regional, and chapter level. Volunteer opportunities are available to help (1) coordinate regional alumni associations, (2) expansion efforts, (3) website development, (4) graphic design, and (5) marketing, to name a few. Additionally, if your interests gravitate toward working hands-on with chapters and collegiate members, you can volunteer as a regional senator or you can work with a chapter in your area. Make no mistake, every KDR chapter needs sound and consistent advice and counsel from alumni, and every chapter needs an active and supportive alumni corporation.

In my travels, I meet a number of alumni who feel they are not at a point in their life where they can donate a lot of money each year to the KDR Foundation, but they do have time and talent they can donate. This

Are We Congruent?

In a 2005 interview with *The Oracle*, the University of Southern Florida's student newspaper, Tom Kane, director of residence life services, said,

"If you ask any fraternity and sorority what they stand for, it's philanthropy. That's really cool; that's very admirable. Brotherhood, leadership – they'll throw a million adjectives and adverbs at you, but if you say 'Do you want to be dry?' (They say,) 'Oh no, that'll kill the whole organization.' Well then, why isn't alcohol somewhere in those top 10 words that this is what it's all about?"

Unfortunately, Mr. Kane is not alone in his criticism of fraternities and sororities. Over the years, university administrators, educational researchers and the public at large have questioned whether or not the college fraternity movement had outlived its usefulness. These criticisms came to a head in 2003 when a group of college and university presidents, fraternity and sorority executive directors and representatives from a variety of coordinating organizations met at the Franklin Square in Washington, DC, and issued a document entitled A Call for Values Congruence. This document notes the apparent disconnect between the stated values and ideals of fraternities and sororities and the actual behaviors of some of their undergraduate members nationwide and proposes several recommendations aimed at lessening the disparity.

Oftentimes criticism of this nature is met with a negative response, particularly from undergraduate members, but also from some alumni. They say things like "The administration hates Greeks;" "Why do they pick on us;" "They expect more from us than from (fill

in the blank student organization/athletic team), "We're a social fraternity." But if you look at actual events that have occurred on college and university campuses across this country you will see that young men and women are being seriously injured, and even dying, in the name of fraternity. Greek-letter organizations are guests on the campuses of their host institutions and if they wish to continue to exist and silence their critics, more must be done to ensure congruence between the stated values of the organization and the behavior of its members.

In order for a change of this nature to occur, a paradigm shift is required. For far too long, members of the greater fraternity and sorority community have allowed Animal House antics to be perpetuated as the primary image those outside of our chapters see. This mentality is perpetuated, in some small part, because most Greek-letter organizations continue to refer to themselves as "social" fraternities/sororities. When you ask someone for the first thing that comes to mind when they hear the word "social," they respond with the word "party." However, *Baird's Manual of American College Fraternities* offers a different interpretation of the word "social."

"The fraternity, whether for men or women — the latter typically known as a sorority — is considered a general fraternity if it offers membership to students without regard to field of study, class year or grade attainment above the typical minimum requirement.

"General fraternities are commonly called 'social' fraternities, but while the initial use of the term social referred to social development, the term as been mistakenly thought to refer to social functions by members and non-members alike. Actually, the intent was to suggest that a student needed to be 'socialized,' that is, directed with proper consideration of one's future responsibilities in society. (p. I-9)"

"Support my Alma Mater, that she may view Kappa Delta Rho as a partner in the development of her students."

As I speak these words I once again affirm to my Brothers, and all who hear me, that I am a KDR Gentleman and I will place *Honor Above All Things*.



Kappa Delta Rho has lost one of its most venerable Brothers with the passing of Rochester, NY alumnus William M. Steinfeld, Theta '38, who died on September 4, 2006, at the age of 89. In the mid-1990's, Brother Steinfeldt generously donated funds to establish the Theta Chapter Veterans Memorial Scholarship awarded annually at the KDR Foundation Luncheon during the National Convention.

Brother Steinfeldt was a chemical engineer with Eastman Kodak for many years before entering county and state politics. He served with distinction in the Monroe County Legislature in the late 1970's to mid-1980's, in the New York State Assembly from 1969-1974, and later in the New York State Senate. He was a formidable figure in numerous Rochester-area community organizations.

According to his son, Philip, also a Theta Chapter alumnus, his father had an intense sense of community — he knew how everything worked. Philip points out that his father's membership in Kappa Delta Rho during his college years "really developed his charge sense of community that greatly influence his life." his strong sense of community that greatly influence his life.


