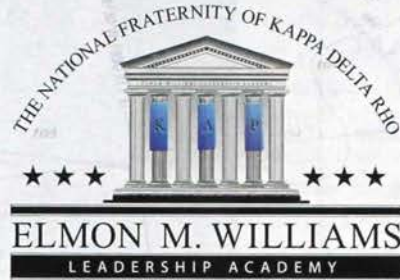


Chartering The Future

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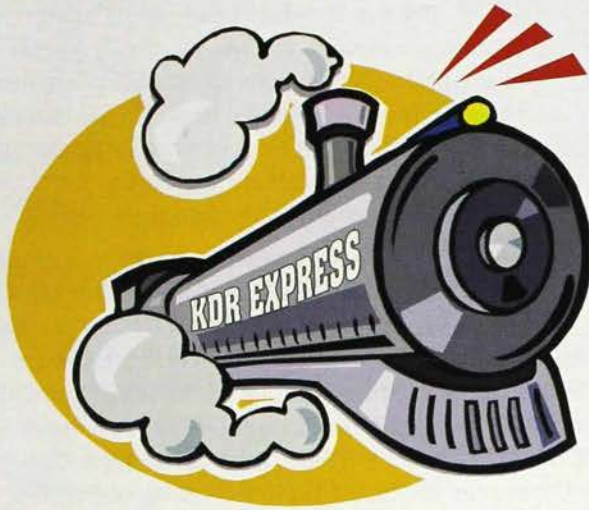

There are many ways to be involved with Kappa Delta Rho while in college and once you graduate. One rewarding method is to serve on the Fraternity Board of Directors. Made up of three undergraduates and 12 alumni volunteers, our board takes an active role in guiding the strategic direction of the Fraternity. Board members meet in person twice a year to conduct business meetings, assist the National Office by serving on functional committees, and often attend regional events such as the Regional Conclaves and chartering ceremonies.

Every two years, the National Convention elects directors to serve on the Board. This summer, the Convention will elect a total of nine directors, three of whom must be undergraduates. The Nominating Committee is tasked with reviewing candidates for the director slots and proposing a slate of nominees to the assembled convention.

Applying to be a nominee is easy. BY FEBRUARY 28, 2010, send an e-mail expressing your interest to Board2010@kdr.com with your name, college, year of graduation, and contact information. You will be contacted by the Nominating Committee and asked to provide some additional information to help us evaluate your application.

KDR LEADERSHIP ON CAMPUS

These young Brothers and their accomplishments tell the story of Kappa Delta Rho on today's college campuses. It also speaks volumes on the new generation of Kappa Delta Rho Gentlemen we are recruiting into our Fraternity. In this article, you will learn about four exceptional leaders on campus within Kappa Delta Rho. They are Brothers Allen Miller, Beta '11; Eric Wimer, Zeta '11; Doug Friedman, Gamma Beta '11; and Spenser Adams, Zeta Beta '10.

ALLEN MILLER



Brother Allen Miller arrived on campus for the spring 2008 semester during the formal Greek recruitment week. At the time the only thing on his mind was to spend time with some friends, enjoy all the free events Cornell's 42 fraternities would sponsor and have some fun before the Spring semester began. He never thought he would join a fraternity. Fortunately, for Kappa Delta Rho today he is a proud Brother of the Beta Chapter and the next president of Cornell's award-winning Interfraternity Council.

The idea to join a fraternity changed the day he met the Brothers at Kappa Delta Rho. According to Allen "I could tell from the moment I step foot in the chapter house that Brothers at KDR were very close friends. As a prospective member they went out of their way to include me in their conversations and make me feel at home. Most importantly, every single Brother from KDR was a unique individual with a unique story. Their interests ranged from biotechnology to sociology, from how to help people with depression to how to direct a major motion picture film. KDR wasn't the "football house" nor was it the "party house." It was a home of 40 incredible people that I now call Brothers."

Pledging was one of the best experiences of his time at Cornell. Through the "Path" program established by the National Fraternity he was able to appreciate the value of pledging. As a new member, he bonded well with everyone in the Fraternity and got to know everyone on a much more personal level. The pledge program opened his eyes to the vast leadership opportunities on campus. During this period, he began attending IFC meetings with the chapter Consul David Lucas Brown '09 as a chapter representative. He was exposed to many different issues and problems that the Greek system faced at Cornell. He quickly became determined to do something to make a difference.

Allen was elected Executive Vice President of the IFC during his sophomore year. He was charged with the responsibility

of running new member education, Greek Awards and planning for the annual red-carpet A.D. White Leadership Conference. He also chaired the IFC Academics committee, which is responsible for proposing and passing resolutions for academic improvement—including a minimum GPA and penalties for fraternities with significant grade drops in their new member classes. In addition to all of these responsibilities he acted as the Greek Liaison to the Student Assembly in the Spring of 2009.

Recently, he worked with Gannet Health Resources and the University Administration to create a moratorium on social events in response to the development of H1N1 and the death of a member of the Greek system. He also acts as a representative to the following organizations: the Ithaca Journal, Cornell Daily Sun, Cornell Police Department, Ithaca Police Department, Cornell Board of Trustees, Ithaca Common Council, Colleges against Cancer and the Ithaca Youth Bureau among others.

At the conclusion of the fall 2009 semester Brother Allen Miller was elected the President of the IFC for 2010.

ERIC WIMER



Brother Eric Wimer chose KDR because of the positive attitudes of the current Brothers in the house. He felt that there was much room for growth and opportunities to hold leadership positions for him within the Zeta Chapter. He also chose KDR over other fraternities because of the beautiful house. The Zeta Chapter house was built almost 100 years ago and is one of the finest houses on Penn State's campus. He believed KDR was the right choice for him because the Brothers in the house reminded him of past friends from home and it really felt like they have a true Brotherhood. KDR means a lot to Eric, and he always tries to reflect the attributes of placing honor above all things. He puts a lot of time into improving the Zeta Chapter and KDR means everything to him. At times it can be a part time job, spending over 15 hours a week working on improvements and implementing new ideas into the chapter.

Spenser came into school not knowing anyone, and had a hard time trying to meet new people since he was pretty shy. He wanted that to change and went through rush that first year just to meet people, because he wasn't sure if a fraternity was the right thing for him. That week Spenser saw this group of Brothers that seemed to know everyone, they were the Brothers that he had seen all over campus at every event so far. As he got to know a few of the Brothers that week he found out that KDR was founded on some of the principles that his parents had instilled in him. When it came time to accept a bid or not, there was no question; it was KDR all the way! It was then that Spenser thought to himself that he might have found that something more than he had been looking for.

"Since I started in this organization I feel that I have grown much more as a person than I ever would have without it. My chapter's first goal was to get me to come out of my shell. 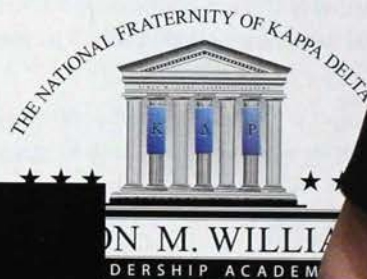

Other presenters at the leadership academy included Heather Evans, Associate Director for student activities and leadership at Radford University, with *One Star Versus the Galaxy* and *OH, My Stars! Lessons on Effective Communications*; Victoria Rosenberg, Delta Zeta, Xi Delta '07, presenting *Keeping Facebook from Being a Liability*; Joe M. Hamm, Beta Gamma '09 (Christopher Newport), leading *Beating with One Heart: KDR Drum Circle*; and Gene Spencer, Iota '76 (Bucknell University), with *Relationships with Those Who Care About the KDR Campus Experience* and *Campus Perceptions of KDR – They Are Everyone's Responsibility*.

ORDO HONORIS RECIPIENTS

KDR Educational Leadership Instructors Shane Henry, Zeta Beta '09 (Tarleton State University), and John Reynolds, Epsilon Beta '09 (Old Dominion University), taught undergraduate Brothers lessons on how to run a meeting effectively and putting Phired Up into practice.

Undergraduates were not the only ones benefiting from the leadership academy. Programs were offered for alumni Brothers taught by Jon D. Kapell, Eta Beta '95 (West Chester University), who presented *How to Advise Your Advisory Board* and *Advisory Board & Accountability*, and Kappa Sigma fraternity alumni Matt Noble with the *7 Habits of Successful Housing Corporations*.

Throughout the academy undergraduate Brothers were split into their respective regions and assigned a facilitator who led open discussions and insured a further understanding of the sessions the delegates had participated in. The facilitator team was composed of six of the finest Kappa Delta Rho Brothers: W. Scott Bradley, Zeta Beta '99 (Tarleton State University); Matthew R. Lenno, Alpha Beta '95 (University of Delaware); Joseph E. Reese II, Nu '01 (Indiana University-Bloomington); Peter J. Tartaro, Lambda Beta '00 (James Madison University); Jeremy S. Votaw, Epsilon '06 (Franklin College); and Brian J. Winters, Iota Alpha '88 (University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown).

As Friday night came to an end so did the Elmon M. Williams Leadership Academy. Undergraduate Brothers and alumni were exhausted from two intense days of valuable programming and Brotherhood bonding. The experiences and knowledge gained from this leadership academy will propel the men of our Brotherhood to the front lines of everything they do both in Kappa Delta Rho and in life.

THE ELMON M. WILLIAMS LEADERSHIP ACADEMY had concluded and all of the awards had been handed out signifying only one last item of business on the schedule for the 98th National Convention — the Ordo Honoris Banquet.

Once a year the Kappa Delta Rho Brotherhood celebrates the induction of the newest class of Ordo Honoris members. The Ordo Honoris is the highest ranking mark of distinction that a Brother can receive. It denotes a man who has lived an honorable life and exemplifies the values that were prescribed many years ago by our Founding Fathers.

Brother Robert Corrie, Beta '53, took the stage to introduce the 2009 inductees. With a presence and demeanor of a true KDR Gentleman, Brother Corrie reminded the undergraduate delegates and alumni alike that as men sworn into this Brotherhood we are held to a higher standard of excellence. This shared commitment does not dissolve with the completion of our undergraduate work but must be demonstrated throughout our lives just as our oath to Kappa Delta Rho is an eternal commitment.

As Brother Corrie began to recite our fraternity Credo a flame of excitement sparked inside of each of us as if we were hearing these words for the very first time. With a long pause and a deep breath the first recipient of the Delta Alpha Ordo Honoris Class was announced: **John Dempsey**, Upsilon Alpha '90. Brother Dempsey graduated from Parks College of St. Louis University where he joined the Upsilon Alpha Chapter in 1988 with the "hope of growing with good people." Not only did he grow with his Brothers, but he also developed his personality and a bond with lifelong friends. As an alumni Brother he served as the president of the Upsilon Alpha Alumni Corporation for many years. On the National level Brother Dempsey worked as the KDR website creator and was instrumental in developing National Office technologies. He also served the National Fraternity as a member of the Board of Directors in the role of vice president of finance. While on the board Brother Dempsey performed financial plannings and reviews, provided a technology voice, and was an advocate for direct chapter support. Twelve years ago Brother Dempsey was recognized and rewarded for his efforts with the KDR chapter website award created and named

after him: The Dempsey Cup. Brother Dempsey currently lives in Christiansburg, Virginia where he strives to be an excellent husband for his lovely wife Melinda and an exceptional father for his two very active sons, Alex and Patrick.

As the banquet continued and everyone took their seats from their standing ovation, Brother Corrie continued to reading excerpts from the Credo and emotions were high as the second recipient was announced. **Lieutenant Colonel Matt Louis Urban** was to receive his Ordo Honoris recognition posthumously. Brother Urban attended Cornell University where he received degrees in history and government and pledged as a member of the Beta Chapter. He served as a U.S. Army officer with distinction in World War II. Brother Urban was belatedly awarded the Medal of Honor in 1980 for repeated acts of heroism in combat in 1944. Brother Urban is the most decorated American serviceman according to the Guinness Book of World Records. An excerpt of Brother Urban's Medal of Honor citation reads:

Lieutenant Colonel (then Captain) Matt Urban, 1 12-22-2414, United States Army, who distinguished himself by a series of bold, heroic actions, exemplified by singularly outstanding combat leadership, personal bravery, and tenacious devotion to duty, during the period June 14, to September 3, 1944, while assigned to the 2d Battalion, 60th Infantry Regiment, 9th Infantry Division.

Our Brother, Matt Urban, will be remembered not only as a leader and dedicated man to his country but as an honorable and virtuous man for his Fraternity.

Brother Corrie once again dutifully took his post to finish reading the Credo and to introduce the third and final Ordo Honoris recipient: **Matt Lenno**. Brother Lenno attended the University of Delaware where he pledged the Alpha Beta Chapter 18 years ago. During his time as an undergraduate Brother he served his chapter as the risk manager, junior tribune, and finally served on the Advisory Board. Brother Lenno has been heavily involved with the National Fraternity since the summer of 2004, when he was asked to serve as a facilitator for the Elmon M. Williams Leadership Academy. He has served in that capacity ever since as well as sitting on the National Education and Judiciary committees. Brother Lenno credits the decision to serve as a facilitator as a moment that changed his life and kicked off his career as a professional in higher education. In fact, he is now working with other fraternities and sororities at their own national conventions. He currently serves as the Greek advisor at his Alma Mater where he has been responsible for perfecting and implementing the University Chapter Assessment Program. Over the last several years Brother Lenno has successfully brought the focus of all the chapters on his campus back to scholarship, service, academics, integrity, and leadership. This has not been an easy task and a majority of his peers doubted he could accomplish it, but by living his life with courage, honor, and integrity he has served as a role model and consistent challenger demanding the very best from his Greek community. Under his leadership and guidance the UD Greek community has received four national awards and 65 individual chapter awards. In his closing remarks, Brother Lenno challenged the undergraduate Brothers to take risks, tell people "no," and never back down because it is how you walk through the fire that makes you the man you are, do it with honor and integrity.

For the third time that evening every person in the audience was on its feet applauding. As a group we were celebrating the achievements of three outstanding Brothers who brought honor to Kappa Delta Rho. However, as the applause continued it was as if the audience had begun to celebrate the ideas of what we stood for as a Fraternity. Very few of us will ever be inducted into the Ordo Honoris but every Brother who wears the badge stands apart from other men. Our Founders had uniquely defined a Fraternity that would inspire men to change the world by living a life of Honor Above All Things.

On January 1, 2010, Kappa Delta Rho will launch its Cyber Career Center for the entire Brotherhood. It is our effort to help our members in this depressed economic period to gain a better advantage in securing a job or an internship and the knowledge and skills to perform well during the interview process. The Cyber Career Center will be located on the KDR website within the Brother's Only section. You will need to sign up for an account to access the center.

According to the U.S. Department of Labor we are at 10% unemployment and the hardest segment hit within the population are adult males at 10.7 percent. By providing this site we intend to use our networking opportunities to provide a secure venue for Brothers to post resumes; post employment opportunities they are aware of due to their companies hiring or a colleague looking for good people to employ; and post possible internship opportunities for our undergraduates. In addition to the ability to post and view employment opportunities and resumes there will be educational resources to secure employment.

The National Fraternity has partnered with JobBound, the leading career consulting company in the nation to create and provide 10 educational videos on our site to help our Brothers secure employment. The videos focus on the following topics:

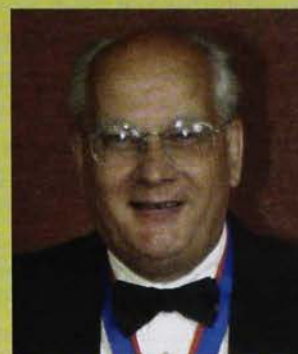
