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From the President



CHANGE...few words in the English language strike fear in the hearts of people, regardless of whether they work in business, education, or industry, as this six-letter word does. People fear change for a variety of reasons, but mainly because it means doing things differently than they are used to. Despite the fear and discomfort periods of change cause, as the vice president of my university says, "Change is constant."

Last summer, we celebrated Kappa Delta Rho's 100th Anniversary. During that 100-year period, our society has dramatically transformed itself and technology has rapidly evolved, as have the expectations of what is and is not an acceptable part of the undergraduate fraternal experience. As the old adage goes, "If you always do what you've always done, then you'll always get what you've always got." That's why, in an effort to ensure that the Kappa Delta Rho experience is relevant in today's society and to today's undergraduate students, the National Board of Directors is embarking on a period of change, which we believe will help ensure the health and continued well being of our beloved Fraternity.

Right now, the Education Committee is working to create a continuous membership development program that will engage and challenge our undergraduate Brothers and will go beyond simply the history of the Fraternity and chapter operations. Highlights of the new program, currently under development, include an exploration of personal and fraternal values, a greater emphasis on etiquette and exercises to improve interview skills, as well as other soft skills that will help them succeed in their professional lives. The purpose statement for Kappa Delta Rho states that membership in "KAPPA DELTA RHO IS FOR LIFE." It is with this statement in mind that we are also seeking ways to re-engage our alumni Brothers. We are currently developing plans for the recruitment, training, and support of alumni volunteers on both the chapter and regional level, and we are partnering with the Kappa Delta Rho Foundation, Inc., on professional networking and job search programs exclusively for our Brothers.

These are just a small sampling of new initiatives currently in development on the national level. Although numerous changes to the Kappa Delta Rho experience are either in development or under discussion, one thing remains constant: *Honor Super Omnia*. Kappa Delta Rho is a living, breathing organization and therefore, must occasionally adjust some of its programs and processes to remain relevant, competitive, and vibrant. However, *Honor Super Omnia* must remain at the core of all that we do as a fraternity, as it is the essence of Kappa Delta Rho. This point will be reinforced at this summer's convention in Indianapolis when the "Precepts of Kappa Delta Rho" is brought before the deliberative body for consideration and adoption. This document is meant to serve as a public declaration of the values of the Fraternity and a reminder to all of our Brothers of the oath they swore to uphold when they were initiated.

While the National Board, its committees, and the National Staff have undertaken these initiatives, we need your help! Regardless of whether you are an undergraduate or alumni Brother, you can support these efforts to strengthen and preserve our Fraternity. Get involved on a committee, take part in a focus group, volunteer to support a chapter in your area, or make a donation to the Kappa Delta Rho Foundation, Inc. The future of

Kappa Delta Rho depends on all of us doing our part to honor the oath of membership we all swore when we were initiated.

I would be remiss if I closed this piece without commenting on the tragic loss Kappa Delta Rho suffered earlier this year. On January 3, 2006, Brother James F. Edgeworth, Sr., entered chapter eternal. Brother Edgeworth served as Kappa Delta Rho's National President from 1988 until 1998, was an inductee of the Ordo Honoris, and was a close personal friend and mentor. In his more than 50 years of membership in Kappa Delta Rho, Jim touched the lives of many of his Brothers and shepherded the Fraternity through some of the greatest highs and lows of its history. In an effort to honor the contributions and memory of Brother

Edgeworth properly, we are asking you to please share your fondest memories of Jim and send to the National Office for inclusion in the retrospective presentation we are planning for this year's convention.

Thank you for taking time to read this article and I hope we can count on your involvement and support to help make Kappa Delta Rho the nation's premier fraternity. Together, as a united Brotherhood, there is no limit to what we can achieve!

From the Executive Director

AS PRESIDENT HOKE states in his remarks, change is constant. Our society is in a state of constant and ongoing change. Moreover, the pace of change in our society is ever increasing. I received an invitation to my 10-year high school reunion, which is taking place this summer in my hometown of Lafayette, IN. Getting the invitation made me reflect on two things, first – 10 years goes by really fast, second – a lot has changed in just the past decade. In 1996, e-mail was just catching on in mainstream society, and if you had a 28.8K modem you were the envy of your peers. By 1998, AOL had introduced a free instant messaging program, and today's college students don't remember life without it. Over the years we've gone from rotary phones to touchtone phones to it being common for children having their own cell phone – tiny cell phones, not the bag phones that my father used to have in his car. Society has changed, colleges and higher education has changed, and college students have changed. This creates a dilemma. If we, as a Fraternity, fail to adapt to change when the world around us is changing, Kappa Delta Rho will become extinct. However, making rash, quick decisions under mind-racing conditions can lead to the same extinction. The challenge becomes knowing when to think and act quickly, and knowing when to think and act slowly. How then, does Kappa Delta Rho change fast enough to adapt to the needs of today's college students, yet ensure the Kappa Delta Rho experience remains relevant over the long haul?

The leadership of the National Fraternity is aggressively working to address that very question. As an immediate step, a joint committee comprised of members of Kappa Delta Rho's National Staff, Board of Directors, members of the Kappa Delta Rho Foundation Board of Trustees, and other volunteers are collaborating to create a professional networking program for members of the Fraternity. One thing Kappa Delta Rho

can immediately provide is a network among our collegiate and alumni Brothers who will provide professional development and networking. Eventually we hope to develop a section of kdr.com

where members can post their resumes online and job opening can be posted by KDR employers. This innovative approach will address a need to help Brothers in positions searching for valued employees or Brothers who are looking to begin their career or advance their career. We are dedicated to using technology to provide our chapters with the tools they need to prove to students that the KDR of today is the future.

Another area in which Kappa Delta Rho can adapt to the changing collegiate environment is in the area of member development. For the past year, the Education Committee has been working on a comprehensive member development program that will fundamentally enhance the skills our members develop during their collegiate experiences with Kappa Delta Rho. The program will be a four-year program in which skills are continually built upon to assist in the transition from high school through college and develop skills to assist in the transition into the "real" world. Each year of the program will focus on a central theme. The first year will focus on an introduction to KDR, expectations of membership, chapter operations, and the importance of Ritual. The second year will focus on personal and character development, the third year will focus on professional development, and the fourth year will focus on mentoring and future planning. The goal is to launch the program starting with the 2007-2008 academic year in a select focus group of chapters, and, over time, incorporate every chapter into the program.

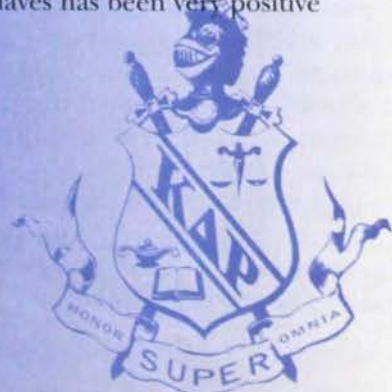

Along with the National Convention and individual chapter visits, the Regional Conclaves that take place during the spring semester and sponsored by the KDR Foundation are one of the biggest events that chapters look forward to each year. Regional Conclaves are traditionally one of the best opportunities for chapter representatives to sit down with each other and National Fraternity representatives to discuss chapter issues that arise during the course of an academic year and learn the best practices techniques to help address those issues.

This year, the National Staff put together three Regional Conclaves in the Central Region – held at the University of Pittsburgh, Johnstown, Midwestern Region – held at the University of Toledo, and Southern Region – held at Radford University, and one “Super” Regional Conclave in the Northeastern Region – held at Lafayette College. Each conclave consisted of day-long programs addressing a number of important issues ranging from chapter management and communication skills to event planning, fundraising, and risk management. The Northeastern Regional Conclave featured Josh Orendi from Phired Up Productions who conducted an intensive dynamic recruitment workshop – developing marketing skills, communication skills, and networking skills to teach chapters to make the switch from static “rush” to dynamic recruitment.

At the end of the program, each attendee was able to provide feedback on the conclave they attended. Feedback from the conclaves has been very positive

INDIANAPOLIS MOTOR SPEEDWAY 4790 West 16th Street

Built in 1909, this is one of the most celebrated auto raceways in the world. Each May, more than 400,000 spectators throng to the 2.5-mile oval course to watch the Indianapolis 500, the largest single-day sporting event in the world, boasting the largest purse in motor racing. The speedway also hosts the NASCAR Brickyard 400 in August and the Senior PGA Brickyard Crossing Tournament in September.



The Indianapolis Motor Speedway Hall of Fame Museum (open daily 9:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.; \$3 adults, \$1 children 6-15) is within the track's oval. The 433-acre speedway also features a PGA course (four holes inside the track and 14 outside).

NCAA HALL OF CHAMPIONS

College sports are more than a pastime; they're a way of life. After all, who hasn't caught March Madness after watching an unbelievable come-from-behind upset in the NCAA basketball tournament? Or, spent part of New Year's Day cheering for the underdog in the big bowl game? The action and enthusiasm, the heartbreak and triumph, the athletes playing for the simple love of the game — it doesn't matter what the sport is, college athletics will make you a fan.

In Indianapolis, IN, the best of college sports has been captured under one roof, at the NCAA Hall of Champions.

INDIANAPOLIS MUSEUM OF ART

This world-class museum has notable paintings by El Greco, Rubens, American impressionists, and European neo-impressionists. Other strengths include African art, Japanese Edo-period paintings, American furniture, textiles, costumes, and a superb collection of Turner works on paper. The sculpture garden includes Robert Indiana's famed LOVE.

In summer, the museum hosts Summer on the Terrace, which is actually a swinging scene for singles. Outdoor movies are shown on the lawn during the summer; you can see one of your favorite camp classics while enjoying a picnic with friends.

INDIANAPOLIS ZOO 1200 West Washington Street

The Indianapolis Zoo is the only major new zoo in recent decades anywhere in the nation. This \$64-million, 64-acre facility houses 2,000 animals roaming through simulated environments. Don't miss the world's largest enclosed Whale and Dolphin Pavilion. The zoo is in the 250-acre White River State Park, 801 W. Washington St. (317) 634-4567; www.inwhiteriver.com.

The new White River Botanical Gardens are also located on the zoo grounds. Admission to the gardens is \$6.50 adults, \$5.50 seniors, \$4.50 children.

CHILDREN'S MUSEUM OF INDIANAPOLIS 3000 North Meridian Street

It seems fitting that a life-sized model of a Tyrannosaurus Rex greets visitors at the entrance to the Children's Museum of Indianapolis. With more than 110,000 artifacts, it is home to the largest children's museum collection on the planet. Installations are divided into three major areas: the Natural World Domain that includes specimens from animal fossils to precious gems; the Cultural World Domain where folk toys and other objects are on display; and the American Experience Domain, a collection of artifacts that span more than 150 years. Many of the exhibits are hands-on and encourage learning through play. The newly opened "Dinosphere" exhibit immerses visitors in the world of dinosaurs, featuring a collection of skeletons and other artifacts, complete with the sounds and surroundings

of the Cretaceous Period – a must see. While there, don't miss the "All Aboard" exhibit that features a 19th-Century steam engine and a sizeable collection of toy train sets, as well as "Story Avenue," an exhibit dedicated to the African American oral tradition. (317) 334-3322.

EITELJORG MUSEUM 500 West Washington Street

The Eiteljorg Museum, a museum of American Indian and western art is conveniently located in White River State Park, which offers many cultural, educational and recreational attractions. In addition to the Eiteljorg Museum, the Park is home to the Indianapolis Zoo, White River Gardens, Indiana State Museum, IMAX® Theater, NCAA Hall of Champions, Victory Field and Congressional Medal of Honor Memorial.

THERE'S A CERTAIN MYSTIQUE or perceived sense of glamour to Hollywood. We watch actors and actresses arriving on the Red Carpet for various awards shows and easily forget that they are just people, too.

I recently had an opportunity to sit down for lunch with a fellow KDR, who also happens to be an up-and-coming actor, to get a little perspective on his experience. We met at a popular, low-key restaurant and bar in West Hollywood. Like any guy on a day off, Danny arrived in jeans and a sweatshirt. He apologized for his scruffy appearance maintaining he's usually clean shaven, but was headed out to a film site in New Mexico for a couple of weeks.

Daniel Spink graduated in 2000 from Iota Chapter at Bucknell University. His film credits include: "Fanboys" (not yet released); "Invincible" (not yet released); "Red Eye," "Fifty Pills," "The Hollow," "American Wedding," "A Midsummer Night's Rave," "Until Morning," "American Pie 2," "Not Another Teen Movie," "Slackers," and "American Pie."

He's also had guest appearances on NBC's "ER," and on the MTV show, "Undressed."



Q&S: *Why did you choose Bucknell?*

Spink: My two older brothers both went to Bucknell, so all during high school we'd go visit them and I really fell in love with the campus. It's a great school and a great environment.

Q&S: *What made you choose KDR?*

Spink: When I came to campus I wasn't really thinking I would or would not join a fraternity. My two older Brothers were both in different houses. My oldest brother, JC, was a TKE and my middle brother, Brian, was an SAE. When it came time for rush, six of my buddies from freshman year were all joining KDR. KDR had a really solid reputation, I liked the guys, it was a really diverse group and I liked that so I decided to join.

Q&S: *Do you get back to Bucknell or keep in touch with any chapter Brothers?*

Spink: A couple of my closest friends are Brothers. About a year ago we went back to Bucknell. When we got to the house, it was a mess, and we all pitched in for a couple of hours and cleaned it up so we could enjoy it with our friends. I've been up to date on the efforts of the new alumni corporation group, stepping in to support the chapter, clean up the house, and really commend them for their effort. From what I've heard, the undergraduate chapter members are also starting to step up and take some pride. That's really encouraging, too. I'm really proud of the chapter Brothers I was in school with, and looking back, it was a really positive experience. I hope the chapter members today, can have the same positive feelings and experience.



Q&S: *Did you start out planning to pursue acting?*

Spink: Not really. I majored in biology and art history. While at Bucknell, I tried out for a school play, and got the lead. Over four years, I had the lead in five different plays and I guess I just got the bug.

Q&S: *There's a big leap from college play to Hollywood, how'd that happen?*

Spink: I didn't realize it at the time, but I got really lucky. The summer after my freshman year, I came to California. My oldest brother has a production/management company, BenderSpink, and I was basically doing an internship with his firm. He was working on the first "American Pie" movie, the producer was there, and I just asked if I could try out for a part. I gave it one shot, and got cast in a small role.

Q&S: *How did that role impact you?*

Spink: Just being in the movie was a good experience. The role was small, most people just remember me as the guy with the monkey. But, since I'd been in a movie, I was able to join the Screen Actors Guild. It sounds crazy, but most casting agents or films will only cast actors who are members of the Guild. But, the only way to be a member of the Guild is to have actually been cast in a role. That small role, for me, opened a lot of doors.

Q&S: *Do you have any projects ready for release?*

Spink: I finished filming a movie called "Invincible" in summer '05. It's a Disney production starring Greg Kinnear and Mark Wahlberg. I'm not sure when it's scheduled for release. I'm also heading to New Mexico for a few weeks of filming on a film called "Fan Boys." It's a Harvey Weinstein production that should be really interesting.

Q&S: *Are most of your projects big movies?*

Spink: Not at all. In fact, as a young actor, much of what I do, and what most young actors do, are a lot of independent films. I was part of a film called "Fifty Pills" that just got approval to be part of the TriBeCa film festival in New York.

Q&S: *What does the future hold?*

Spink: I don't really know. I really like what I'm doing and right now I'd say I'll keep trying to grow my career. But, it's really hard to say how it will all turn out.

I recently read this powerful statement:

Commitment is one of the key ingredients of a KDR!

When we were initiated into the Brotherhood of Kappa Delta Rho we made certain commitments to ourselves, our Brothers, and mankind. These were not idle promises, but were made from the hearts and minds of each of us. Two such commitments were *dedication* and *loyalty*. Loyalty to the ideals and dedication to the cause and perpetuation of Kappa Delta Rho. Another ingredient of commitment is giving of oneself, either through sharing one's time and/or treasures. We have many KDR's who consistently share one or the other, or both. Sadly, however, there are many more who share neither.

Today, we have more than 17,500 living alumni of KDR; however, less than 10 percent make annual or

special gifts to the Fraternity through the Foundation — a dismal showing at best! We should have 30-40 percent of our membership providing some amount of financial commitment to KDR so that its ideals and programs will be perpetuated into the future. KDR's should take a look sometime to see what other fraternities are doing in the area of gifting and it may well open some eyes and hearts as to what should be happening. It makes no difference as to the amount of the gift — some can always give more than others. More importantly, however, it is the COMMITMENT that counts.

I am asking — imploring — each of you who have not made a financial commitment to your Fraternity to do so on an annual basis through the Annual Fund and to support the Centennial Recognition Program (an endowment) with your one-time gift. ***Four Thousand (4,000) additional alumni donors at a modest \$25 each would produce \$100,000 of additional funding annually — funding that is desperately needed by your Fraternity to provide critical undergraduate programming, leadership training and chapter development.*** Do you have the KDR COMMITMENT and are you willing to share a very small portion of yourself with your Fraternity? I pray that you do.

IN THE BEGINNING

As Brian reflects back, he remembers the time when he was approached by his resident advisor about how he felt about the Greek community.

"We talked for a while," Brian recalls, "and I decided to check out a new group that was trying to start a fraternity chapter. The focus of the group from the beginning was to bring scholarship, community service, and a gentlemen's attitude to campus. We had several

fraternities make a presentation. I will never forget the first meeting I had with the KDR representative. His poise, professionalism, and explanation of KDR struck such a cord with me and the other men. Needless to say, we selected to affiliate with KDR, and in 1990 we became the Iota Beta Chapter."

Janet's experience with KDR has been somewhat different. Brian and she met on a blind date arranged by an undergraduate Brother who was dating a coworker of hers. When her friend asked if she would be willing to go, her initial response was that she did not date "frat" boys.

"I was assured," says Janet, "that KDR was NOT a frat, it was a Fraternity. I was skeptical about there being a difference, but agreed to go. Our first date was a Red Rose Formal, and it didn't take long to understand the difference. The undergraduates and alumni were gentlemen, and showed respect to their dates. I was impressed by what I saw then, and continue to be impressed each year as we attend the Annual Convention."

Janet has attended eight conventions.

"As the wife of a KDR," Janet says with pride, "I have had the privilege of meeting Brothers from all over the country. The other women went out of their way to seek me out and make me feel welcome as they went to explore the city during my first convention. And, I have tried to do the same for others in return. I have been asked more than once 'why on earth would you want to go to a fraternity convention?' My answer has been, and will continue to be — where else can you be surrounded by good looking men who have been trained in the art of

being a gentleman? This has truly been my experience. KDR values the lost art of moral and gentlemanly behavior, and the Brothers I have met are proof of that conviction. *Honor Above All Things* is more than a quaint idea from the past.
