

From the President



BROTHERS, Kappa Delta Rho needs your assistance in a national grassroots campaign in support of the Collegiate Housing and Infrastructure Act of 2007 (H.R. 643/S.713). This legislation will fundamentally improve the ability of college fraternities to improve their student housing.

The Collegiate Housing and Infrastructure Act would allow tax-deductible charitable contributions given to educational foundations (such as the Kappa Delta Rho Foundation) to be used to make improvements to housing owned and operated for the benefit of college students. This bill would make it substantially easier for fraternities and sororities nationwide to raise the money needed to install critical life-safety improvements in chapter housing, expand housing capacity, and otherwise modernize housing for undergraduate members.

According to the Capital Fraternal Caucus, "An earlier version of the Collegiate Housing and Infrastructure Act passed the House of Representatives in 2003 as part of a larger bill, but it failed to pass the Senate for political reasons beyond our control. When Congress ended its work in 2005, we had 151 House sponsors and 28 Senate sponsors, but we have to start all over again in 2007. As of March 20, 2007, we have 36 sponsors in the House and nine sponsors in the Senate."

From the Executive Director

INITIATION NIGHT, do you remember it? There was a sense of excitement and accomplishment. Many of us made pacts with our pledge Brothers regarding the new beginnings in our lives, the important role we would play, and the difference we would make in the Fraternity. We were excited to be a part of something different, something special, and had grand plans for the future. When we took the oath, we were too nervous to absorb the entire meaning of the oath completely, but we knew we had just made a commitment to Kappa Delta Rho for life. We later went back to our dorms with an excitement that our non-Greek friends could not understand. At the time we couldn't necessarily explain it, but darn it, if you cut us we would bleed orange and blue.

Then, in many cases, over the years and after graduation, that excitement gradually began to wane. Careers and families took a priority, in some cases our chapters were closed — at least temporarily — either for a violation of Fraternity policies or failing to live up to the standards of Kappa Delta Rho. KDR eventually became something that you were part of during college rather than the Fraternity of which you are a Brother.

I have a secret for you though. You are no less a Brother of Kappa Delta Rho today than the day you were initiated. Additionally, you can still play an important role in Kappa Delta Rho. In fact, your responsibility to do so is no less than when you first joined the Fraternity.

President Theodore Roosevelt made a statement in 1908 that is relevant for Brothers of Kappa Delta Rho. He said, "No man has a right to withhold his support from an organization that is striving to improve conditions within his sphere." Everyday there are Brothers working within the National Fraternity, within the Kappa Delta Rho Foundation, and even at chapters to impact positively the Kappa Delta Rho experience for her Brothers. However, Kappa Delta Rho will not be the absolutely best Fraternity it can be without the support of all of her members. There is no shortage of opportunities to support Kappa Delta Rho on a national, region-

al, and chapter level. You can (1) help coordinate regional alumni associations, (2) help advise and support existing chapters or expansion efforts, (3) become a Regional Senator, (4) register and get involved with the Capitol Fraternal Caucus at www.fraternalcaucus.com, (5) or support scholarships and educational programs by contributing to the Kappa Delta Rho Foundation. Those are a few, but not nearly all, ways that you can help support your Fraternity. There is a feeling among some Brothers that they cannot or should not get involved with Kappa Delta Rho if their chapter is not currently an active chapter or they do not live near the chapter they were initiated in. That is not true; KDR still welcomes and needs your support. Remember, the oath that we each took was to Kappa Delta Rho, we all agreed to place *Honor Above All Things*, and the oath was not chapter or campus specific. President John F. Kennedy said it best when he stated, "When the tide comes in... all the boats in the harbor rise."

The following pages in this issue of the *Quill & Scroll* highlight many exciting happenings in Kappa Delta Rho. Two new chapters were chartered in late 2006, there are new activities being planned by the Alumni Affairs Committee, we have entered into a number of licensing agreements that will allow Brothers to purchase a variety of quality Kappa Delta Rho merchandise, and much more. The tide is coming in, but in order for it to be the highest tide possible, we need your support!

ALONG WITH THE ELMON WILLIAMS LEADERSHIP ACADEMY AND INDIVIDUAL CHAPTER VISITS, the Regional Conclaves that take place during the spring semester and sponsored by the KDR Foundation are one of the biggest events that chapters look forward to each year. Regional Conclaves are traditionally one of the best opportunities for chapter representatives to sit down with each other and National Fraternity representatives to discuss chapter issues that arise during the course of an academic year and best practices and techniques to help address those issues.

This year, the national staff partnered with former Executive Director Ben Willis to put together four Regional Conclaves in the Central Region – held at Robert Morris University; Midwestern Region – held at Franklin College; Southern Region – held at Radford University; and Northeastern Region – held at Bucknell University. Each conclave consisted of day-long programs addressing a number of important issues. Attendees spent the


morning learning about themselves by learning their personality type and characteristics about that personality type in accordance with Myers-Briggs and Kearsley personality testing. Attendees then learned how to communicate with and manage their chapter Brothers that fall into the various different personality types. From there, attendees focused on creating, influencing, and managing change within organizations and their chapters.

At the end of the program, each attendee was able to provide feedback on the conclave they attended. Feedback from the conclaves has been very positive. Barrett Amos, consul of the Beta Chapter (Cornell University) stated, "I enjoyed the day and came away with ideas to try back at my chapter. Getting to meet and interact with some of our other local chapters was also a great boon — one that we hope to capitalize on in the future."





Brothers from the Alpha Chapter of the Kappa Delta Rho Society participate in the Northeastern Conclave at Bucknell University.


Midwestern Conclave - February 17

Ordo Honoris (Order of Honor) is the highest honor presented to Fraternity brothers recognizing life-long achievement in career and community, as well as dedication to Kappa Delta Rho and to represent the ideals of the organization for current and future members.


Brother Booth was inducted at the 2006 Elmon Williams Leadership Academy and National Convention in Indianapolis, IN. Due to scheduling conflicts, Brother Booth could not attend the ceremony, but was formally presented at his Zippo office with the Ordo Honoris medallion and certificate from Kappa Delta Rho National President Shawn Hoke.

"I was flattered when notified of my nomination and thrilled when told I was selected as one of this year's award recipients. I loved my four years at IUP and will fondly remember my affiliation with KDR and the Brothers who helped make my college years so enjoyable," Brother Booth said.

Brother Booth was appointed president and CEO of Zippo Manufacturing Company in February 2001. A graduate of Indiana University of Pennsylvania with a Bachelor of Arts degree, he spent nearly 30 years with Kendall Motor Oil in a variety of sales, marketing, and



management positions before joining Zippo. After nearly three decades in the petroleum industry, Brother Booth, in June 1999, accepted the position of president and chief operating officer of W.R. Case and Sons Cutlery, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Zippo Manufacturing Company.

In February 2001, Brother Booth was promoted to his current position of president and CEO. He is chairman of the board of W.R. Case and Sons Cutlery, and chairman of the board of Zippo Fashion Italia, both wholly-owned subsidiaries of Zippo Manufacturing Company. In addition, Brother Booth has held numerous board of directors positions at organizations in the community and was named 2005 Businessperson of the Year by the Bradford Area Chamber of Commerce.

Brother Booth and his wife, Cherie, reside in Bradford. They have four children and nine grandchildren.

What I was really pleased to learn is that this group of men are not only aware of just my chapter, but the others as well and are truly looking at ways to strengthen and improve KDR! The "kicker" was that while it was work and I stayed up later than my kids ever knew I could...it's a really fun and great group of guys each of whom had a great experience of their own in KDR, in their chapter, and that's something we all want for the kids that follow us!"



Future's Quest Scholarship Awarded

BROTHER ANDREW THORNTON, who was recently initiated into the Iota Beta Chapter at the Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT), received a Foundation scholarship to participate in the Future's Quest Program conducted by the North-American Interfraternity Conference (NIC). The Futures Quest Program is designed to impact chapter initiates within the past year. The National Fraternity leadership believes this program can have a tremendous impact on individual new members as well as the chapters. They have partnered together with the Foundation to provide scholarship support for new members to participate in the program.



IN ANDREW'S WORDS...

During the weekend of January 5-7, I attended the Xi Session of Futures Quest based in Indianapolis, IN. Futures Quest is a unique, fraternity-oriented leadership training program. My experience at Futures Quest was very informative, motivational, and beneficial.

With three or four dozen Greeks from various fraternities across the country in attendance, Futures Quest offers hands-on experience with not only leadership, but with Greek knowledge and awareness as a whole. For the sake of the experience for those who may attend a future session, I will not disclose certain details of the activities, but have faith that it was beyond impressive. The first day consisted of interesting and meaningful ice-breakers that demonstrated the diversity of opinions and backgrounds of everyone there. This was followed by the formation of groups of a dozen or so for enjoyable teambuilding activities. In the evening, we discussed, as a whole, personal values and the values of the Greek society, and how the two relate. Developing concepts of our values made the foundation for the rest of the weekend, because good leaders have good values! The second day delved into problem solving, risk taking, and challenges, a high ropes course, and a night walk, in which we summed what we learned thus far and prepared for the conclusion the next day. The last day was the most motivational of the three, and has personally given me the drive to strive for the best for my Fraternity. *(more)*

Futures Quest has been the pinnacle of my Fraternity experience thus far. Outside of the primary leadership training, I gained a second core of experience with being Greek. It has given me knowledge not only of leadership qualities, but how, why, and where they are needed most in regards to life and Fraternity. I learned all the major accomplishments and flaws of the Greek society as a whole. I learned the dire importance of Ritual, Brotherhood and Club, the three main aspects of every fraternity. I met many brothers from other fraternities and learned from our similarities and differences. The Futures Quest experience is one that no Greek should turn down if they have the opportunity to go.

New Member Academic Achievement Scholarship Program a Success!

THE NATIONAL FRATERNITY'S VISION of rededication to the core principals and values of the Fraternity, which include scholastic excellence, is beginning to gain momentum.

Alumni may recall that the National Fraternity partnered with the Foundation to create an Academic Achievement Scholarship for our new members. The goals:


- Stronger Recruitment

Kappa Delta Rho Licensed Products and Services

Nike. Jeep. Timberland. These brands and their logos have trademark laws protecting them from misuse. Our Fraternity name is no different. It is our right and responsibility to protect our name and the symbols that we have valued for more than 102 years. Therefore, Kappa Delta Rho registers its marks with the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office and is taking measures to ensure our marks are used appropriately in marketing and merchandising.

Kappa Delta Rho and AMC

Kappa Delta Rho has aligned with 56 other Greek organizations through working with Affinity Marketing Consultants (AMC), a company founded to help organizations protect the integrity and ownership of their trademarks. AMC will work with Kappa Delta Rho in granting licenses to companies that manufacture merchandise bearing our name, Greek letters, and coat of arms. Through the licensing program, vendors submit all products and designs for approval to insure that our marks are not associated with any products and/or designs that glorify alcohol abuse, sexism, hazing, drugs, or discrimination.

Why Work with Licensed Vendors?

The relationship between the Fraternity and licensed vendors is a win-win situation. A licensed vendor agrees to work with Kappa Delta Rho to insure proper use of our trademarks and to sell high-quality products at reasonable prices and to offer good customer service. In exchange, approved vendors are given the approval to

produce products and/or services in association with our organization.

How You Can Help

Alumni and collegians play an important role in the success of the licensing program. Licensed manufacturers will place a special Greek Licensed Product Logo (see below) designed for members of AMC on all items bearing Kappa Delta Rho symbols. Look for this logo when shopping in campus bookstores, Greek specialty stores, catalogs, and websites. Members who buy products with this special seal can do so with confidence, knowing the Fraternity has approved the product and they are purchasing from a licensed vendor. In addition, chapters and alumni associations can support the program by having special items produced only by licensed vendors.

Two New Chapters in Kappa Delta Rho

The Beta Gamma and Gamma Gamma Chapters Receive Their Charters

Few things in life are as rewarding as creating something that will establish a legacy for the future. Kappa Delta Rho's founders did this in 1905, and two groups of men have followed in their footsteps at Christopher Newport University and York College of Pennsylvania. Kappa Delta Rho chartered these two new chapters in the fall of 2006 and is very proud to include them among the ranks of Brothers of Kappa Delta Rho. Both chapters are excellent representations of the ideals of Kappa Delta Rho and have worked hard to establish a tradition of excellence on their respective campuses.

A HISTORY OF THE BETA GAMMA CHAPTER

Ideas for the Fraternity began to circulate in 2003 among a group of five men: Greg Hawkins, John Clifford, Greg Dale, Matthew Haselton, and Berin Furest to bring a new fraternity to Christopher Newport University in Newport News, VA. Hawkins had a friend who is a Brother in Kappa Delta Rho, so the idea to start a chapter at CNU was born. This group began to work tirelessly to recruit other men to help establish an interest group. As the number of potential members grew, Hawkins began talks with the National Fraternity and campus officials to have KDR recognized on campus. In February 2004, 24 men were inducted into the Christopher Newport Provisional Chapter of Kappa Delta Rho.

Over the next two years, the provisional chapter learned the difficulty of creating and establishing a chapter. Graduation and attrition took its toll on the fledgling group. It was at this time the remaining

Brothers learned the dedication and perseverance that is needed for Kappa Delta Rho Brothers. These men continued to be dedicated to Kappa Delta Rho and recruited other determined men. As membership grew and the provisional chapter developed strong operations, KDR began to dominate campus events such as Greek Week. The provisional chapter made a popular recruitment video, revamped their approach to recruitment to have one of the most effective recruitment systems on campus, and had the highest GPA among fraternities at CNU.

In the spring of 2006, with a membership of 31 Brothers, the Christopher Newport Provisional Chapter petitioned the National Fraternity for a charter. The petition was granted and on October 28, 2006, the Christopher Newport Provisional Chapter became the Beta Gamma Chapter of Kappa Delta Rho.

A HISTORY OF THE GAMMA GAMMA CHAPTER

In December 2004, a group of men led by Matt Simpson and Frank Cragle approached the National Fraternity to inquire about starting a chapter at York College of Pennsylvania. These men strongly believed in the purposes of Kappa Delta Rho and our motto, *Honor Above All Things*. In March 2005, after meeting with a representative from the National Fraternity, the group petitioned for Group of Intent status. After approval from the student senate to form a new chapter on campus the group then petitioned for provisional chapter status. During the fall of 2005, 28 men were inducted into the York College Provisional Chapter of Kappa Delta Rho.

Throughout the next year the provisional chapter worked diligently on academics, as well as community service. The chapter completed two successful philanthropic events. In the fall of 2005 the provisional chapter collected more than 200 toys and \$400 for the York Helping Hands for the Homeless. In the spring of 2006, the provisional chapter raised more than \$1000 for the Foundation for Peace. The chapter was also given an award from the college for having the highest GPA among all social organizations on campus.

In the summer of 2006, the York College Provisional Chapter petitioned the National Fraternity for a charter. The petition was granted and on December 2, 2006, the York College Provisional Chapter became the Gamma Gamma Chapter of Kappa Delta Rho.

RHO CHAPTER (Lafayette College)





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
