

Columbus Ideal Convention City; Kappa To Be Host

COLUMBUS, Ohio, chosen as the meeting place for the 1946 convention, is the third largest capital city in the nation and the largest named for the discoverer, Christopher Columbus. It is one of the educational centers of the nation with Ohio State University, Capital University, Otterbein, Ohio Wesleyan, Wittenberg, and Dennison University being located within the city or in close proximity.

Columbus and its immediate area abounds in points of historic interest. Its central location, hotel accommodations, and the proverbial hospitality of its people makes it an outstanding convention city. For its first post-war convention Kappa Delta Rho has chosen a city rich in convention traditions and hospitality.

Members of Kappa Delta Rho visiting Columbus for the first time will want to include a visit to Ohio State on their program for the week-end of June 7.

Host to the 1946 Convention to be held in Columbus will be Kappa chapter, of Ohio State University. A committee has been formed to see that no hospitality is spared to the visiting delegates and brothers who will be there June 7 and 8. The chapter, through the editor of the chapter paper, M. D. Munn, has extended a cordial invitation to every member of KDR to attend the Convention, and visit the chapter house in between sessions at the Deshler-Wallick Hotel. Kappa alumni should make an inspection of the new house one of the items on their list of "musts" for this year's convention.

Representation of Every Chapter Important In 1946

Representation

Any chapter having any actives on the campus, whether the house is open or not, will be entitled to send one representative (expenses paid) to this year's convention at Columbus, according to a decision by the Executive Committee, who voted unanimously to liberalize the interpretation of the Constitution for the unusual conditions existing on most campuses today.

They have further voted that in case there are no actives on the campus the alumni be authorized to appoint someone to represent the chapter. If possible, this ought to be a KDR who will return in the fall. If further interpretation of this decision is desired contact should be made immediately with the executive secretary, Ferd B. Ensinger, 12 Fifth Ave., New Rochelle, N. Y.

May 1 Is Deadline

Authorization for representation at the National Convention must be in the hands of the Executive Secretary, Ferd B. Ensinger, 12 Fifth Avenue, New Rochelle, New York by May 1, if official delegates wish to be recognized on the program and also wish hotel reservations. Any difficulties in authorization should be taken up immediately with the secretary, as the Executive Committee deems it necessary that every chapter be represented.

Voting power of the delegates, according to the constitution, will be:

1946 CONVENTION TO ELECT THREE DIRECTORS

Delegates to the 1946 Convention will have, in addition to their voting on regular routine measures, the all-important task of choosing three members of the Board of Directors.

Three present directors find the expiration of their terms in 1946: John O. Boyd, Rho, and now National President; Walter E. Burnham, Nu; and R. M. Savage, Alpha. All have served their fraternity during the war period; the delegates to the 1946 Convention must choose three men to take them over the re-adjustment period that is now beginning. It will be an important task of this, the first postwar convention.



Dean Bates To Be Convention Banquet Speaker

Dr. Robert E. Bates, Dean of Men, Indiana University, home of Nu chapter of KDR, will deliver the principal address at the convention banquet on Friday evening, June 7 in the Deshler-Wallick hotel, Columbus. His subject "The Place of Fraternities in Post-war College Life," will serve to integrate and summarize the main theme of the 1946 convention.



DEAN ROBERT BATES

Dean Bates brings to Kappa Delta Rho a wealth of experience both in college and fraternity life. Newly appointed Grand Praetor of the Indiana Province of Sigma Chi, he also is a member of Sigma Xi, American Geophysical Union, Sigma Gamma Epsilon, geological fraternity, and Sigma Delta Psi, honorary athletic fraternity. He holds A.B. and A.M. degrees from Indiana University and a Ph.D. from Columbia University. In 1936, after serving for four years as assistant in geology at Columbia he became assistant professor in geology at Western Reserve University.

In 1939 he was appointed dean at Albert College of Western Reserve, and in 1941 became Associate Dean of Men at Indiana University. During this time he managed to spend some time with the U. S. Geological Survey and the U. S. Conservation Service.

In May 1942 he was granted a leave of absence to accept a commission as a second lieutenant in the Army Air Force. He served from September of that year to June 1945 in England as a photo interpreter, the last 10 months on the staff of the Eighth Air Force Reconnaissance Wing under Brigadier-General Elliott Roosevelt. Upon his release from service last September as a major he returned to Indiana where he was appointed Dean of Men.

Delegates to the 1946 Convention will be fortunate in having the opportunity of hearing this popular 35 year-old dean give a picture of the future of fraternities on the campus of the post-war college. Dean Bates' address promises to be one of the high-lights of the 1946 Convention.

determined by the action that results from these reports.



With a theme set for the 1946 convention and an interest asserting itself that should definitely mark the meeting in Columbus as one of the most important in the history of Kappa Delta Rho, some thought is already crystallizing in the minds of both under-graduates and alumni as to our position in the post-war scheme of affairs collegiate.

Our answer to many public charges against fraternities may be one of the important policies formulated by the delegates to the 1946 convention. They will be concerned with some of them, since an answer may be necessary to assure their very existence.

At present there are five main criticisms of fraternities:

1. Their so-called exclusiveness.

2. The cost of membership.

3. The amount of money that goes to national organizations.

4. Hell week practices.

5. The belief that fraternity membership does not promote better scholarship. The over-all policy of any group is expressed in terms of the membership. Letters arriving every day in your national office express a deep faith and hope for Kappa Delta Rho. We must not, however let our ideals be eclipsed by hard cold facts. We must face the facts and build our organization so that it will be a part of the educational institution where it is located.

Alumni should know some of the answers. They have followed the trend of post-war thought, but have all of them kept abreast of the educational picture? If they have, they will help to see that the 1946 convention sets up a policy that will make KDR democratic, financially sound, academically beyond reproach, and socially an educational asset in the life of every member. KDR may not be the largest fraternity, but she can be the *best*, if we find the correct answers.

Ohio State University

Ohio State University, home of the Kappa chapter, host to the 1946 Convention, is situated within the northern corporate limits of the city of Columbus. Its extensive campus and imposing buildings offers brothers attending the convention one of many points that will be visited during their stay in Columbus.

A co-ed institution, Ohio State received a land-grant provision by an act of 1864. In 1870 Ohio Agricultural and Mechanical College, located at Columbus, was chartered by the state and the college was opened in 1873. In 1878 the name was changed to the Ohio State University.

It contains a graduate school, College of Agriculture, School of Arts and Sciences, and Schools of Commerce and Administration, Dentistry, Education, Engineering, Law, Medicine, Pharmacy, Veterinary Medicine, Home Economics, Journalism and Social Administration. Its laboratories embrace all branches of science and engineering. Its library contains 440,000 volumes. It also has numerous clinics, observatories and research bureaus and facilities.

Crumb Named President Of Potsdam Teacher's

Lieutenant Colonel Frederick W. Crumb, Gamma '30, on April 1 became president of State Teachers College at Potsdam, New York. Approved by the Board of Regents at its meeting in Albany January 18, Brother Crumb, a former principal of New York state central schools will succeed Dr. Clarence O. Lehman, who died October 22, 1945.

Doctor Crumb received the bachelor of arts and master of arts degrees from State College for Teachers at Albany and the doctor of education degree from Teachers' College, Columbia University. Before entering the service in 1942 he served as supervising principal of central schools in East Nassau, Narrowsburg, Burnt Hills and Whiteboro. His work in the Army included planning, organizing and supervising educational programs for the armed forces both in this country and overseas. He was stationed in Washington, D. C.

new position the many best wishes from his fraternity brothers all over the country.

Keen, Alpha Begins New Duties In Lowville

Lieut. Walter Keen, Alpha '35 returned to Lowville April 1 to take over his new duties as the Vocational Guidance Director of the Lowville Public Schools, a newly created position designed to give all junior and senior high students of Lowville complete school guidance.

Walt received his master of arts degree at the University of Rochester, and taught for eight years in Lowville Academy before entering the Navy. He was stationed in Washington where he worked on radio appliances. He and Mrs. Keen, together with their daughter, Betty Jane, will live on DeWitt Street after he assumes his new duties.

Maloney, Nu, Meets Volkmar, Alpha

E. Mayer Maloney, Nu '41, executive secretary before being inducted into the Army, is now S/Sgt. Edward M. Maloney. Stationed at Ft. McPherson, Atlanta, Georgia since June 1945, where he is in the E.M. Counseling Branch of the Separation Center, he is helping to complete the separatee's Army and Civilian Qualification Records.

Recognizing a name in the files one day Brother Maloney looked up the owner and had quite a chat with Bill Volkmar, Alpha '33, who was stationed there then.

Brother Maloney expected a furlough about April 1, but he is counting the days until he can return to Indiana permanently to take a more active part in the re-establishment of his chapter, which he has been advising by mail.

With Kappa Delta Rho's

Smith, PI '38, Was Surgeon On U.S.S. Evans

James M. Smith, Pi '38, when last heard from was at the Naval Hospital in Bathesda, Maryland, a comparatively quiet place after some of his experiences in the Pacific during the war.

Jim, a lieutenant in the Navy Medical Corps, was a surgeon on the U.S.S. Evans when she and the U.S.S. Hadley were attacked by Jap suicide planes on May 11, 1945. The two destroyers had a busy time of it for 86 minutes, but in that time their gunners succeeded in downing 42 Jap planes, thereby setting a record for destroyers in the War.

LIBERTY magazine for Sept. 8, 1945 gave a graphic description of the encounter in a letter written by Ensign Allderige of the Evans. He sums up the action of which Brother Smith was a part in these words "I was only a spectator, but a rather involved one. I saw guns shoot, I saw planes get blown sky-high, I saw planes hit us, I saw guys get hit, I saw guys die. My part never was particularly outstanding either for doing things or for not doing what was expected of me. I don't know yet whether I was ever afraid. There wasn't time for much of anything like that.

"I'm bursting with pride at being attached to such a group of men. Not so much for the record that was set in splashing planes, but for their individual acts of heroism—their little acts of bravery that came a dime a dozen that day—it would be impossible to tell of 'em all.

"The official records show that we splashed nineteen planes. The Hadley accounted for twenty-three. I suppose that will go down as one of the minor incidents of the war. But those of us that were in it can't pass it off like that."

To this description Brother Smith just says "Amen." Thus closes one of the "minor" incidents of the war in which another member of KDR has distinguished himself in American history. Pi chapter is justly proud of Jim's accomplishments.

High School Boys Copy KAP

Among the memoirs of Percy E. Fellows,, Alpha '20, appears an account of finding a group of high school boys in Wethersfield, Conn., wearing the KDR fraternity seal. Taking over name, motto, colors and everything, they told Brother Fellows that they had asked the Secretary of State for a charter and he had told them they could get one. A check with the Secretary of State revealed that we were not protected.

The story has a happy ending since Brother Fellows succeeded in convincing the boys that we could sue them, since we held a charter. No more KDR seals have appeared on Wethersfield sweaters since then.

MYERS, PI, RETURNS AS CIVILIAN

Francis B. Myers, Pi '33, who has been stationed on the U.S.S. Klondike as chaplain will return to civilian status on April 8 and after that date will be located at 6435 Lebanon Avenue, Philadelphia 31, Pennsylvania. He writes that he is hoping to get back into the activities of Pi chapter when he returns.

In a previous letter he took your editor to task for omitting Pi's name on the list of chapters, and has already accepted some very humble apologies. In part his story is a part of KDR's fight for life during the war. He writes: "I am disappointed not to see Pi's name on the list of active chapters. I believe it was one of the few to remain active and retain its house and organization during the lean years. Fact is, while I was at theological school in Gettysburg from 1941 to 1944, the chapter was comprised of myself and one active brother in the college; the house was rented and my apartment was the scene of rushing activities; my wife was a combination house mother and corresponding secretary. They were real times.'

Brother Myers, like so many other members of KDR, served his fraternity and his country with distinction during World War II.

ALPHA

Middlebury

With sixteen men back from the war and with rushing going on apace, Alpha chapter is again showing signs of life. Since the second semester began February 18, weekly meetings have been held to complete plans for the re-opening of the house next fall. A big financial campaign is now under way in order to make this possible. In connection with the drive a letter has been sent to every Alpha alumnus.

The letter explains the present physical and financial condition of the house and outlines the plans decided upon by the Alumni at a meeting held February 16, 1946. "An investigation of the property and financial condition of the chapter is most discouraging. The house was in need of repair when we left, and due to its being unoccupied most of the time, it is now in need of rather extensive repairs. A reliable architect has made an appraisal and the cost will run to about \$7500 to put the house in competing class with the other houses. We have about \$2000 in bills, both board and room, outstanding. We have initiated motions to collect these bills. Some money is coming in on them already. . . . The plan is this: we are attempting to raise by June 1st. \$6000. If we don't reach that goal, all of the donations will be returned to the donors and the fraternity will go out of existence ... The contribution we are seeking from each man, both active and alumni, is fifty dollars. . . . In any case, if the goal of \$6000 is not reached by June 1st, the money will be returned in full."

During the Alumni meeting mentioned in the letter a committee was appointed to organize and proceed with a fundraising drive. The committee is as follows: Edward Adams '45 and Charles Bobertz '44, co-chairmen; Thomas H. Moore '42, John C. Lorini '45, and Ray H. Walch '45.

At the Alumni meeting, which included twenty-three persons, the sum of \$1005 was raised. Since then more than \$1800 has been realized from the financial drive, and it can scarcely be considered as being actually underway as yet. If there are any Alpha alumni who have not yet received the above-mentioned letter or who have not learned of the plight of the Alpha chapter, this report should clarify the situation. Checks may be made out to H. D. Bicknell and S. J. House, Trustees.

Plans for the redecoration of the house includes a new roof, new floors, new plaster and wallpaper, repainting inside, new heating plant, and repairs to the plumbing. These changes should make the house liveable once again and put it in a condition to compete with the other houses.

Under the revised rules of the Interfraternity Council each fraternity has access to the freshmen for only one 3/4 hour period. This presents an unusual handicap in convincing the men of the greater desirability of joining Kappa Delta Rho. To meet this situation, Alpha chapter has developed a unique method of dealing with the freshmen. After Bill Neale, our Worthy Consul, introduces all the active men of the house, Ed Adams jumps to his feet and announces, "Well, men, you've just met the biggest bunch of jerks on campus!" This goes over big. By the time the freshmen get to our smoker they have heard so much high-pressure salesmanship from the other fraternities they're sick and tired of it. So when the KDR's make fun of themselves and give the old horse-laugh to some of the more highsounding catch-words of the fraternities, the freshmen eat if up. Eddie spiels a continuous line of chatter kidding the house, most of the men in it, fraternities in general. "Yeah," he says, "we're going to redecorate the house completely this summer-going to put a roof on it." He goes on to point out the disadvantages of living in "marble halls" close to the campus with all the other drunks. Instead, the KDR's live in a comfortable old house remote from the campus in the midst of a crowd of "intellectual drunks"-the professors. Just how successful this de-pressurized rushing will turn out remains to be seen. Right now it looks as though the prestige of Kappa Delta Rho at Middlebury is at a new high point. The rushing is being ably directed this year by Ray Walsh.

Active men in Alpha include: "Chuck" Morse '42, "T. T." Thomas '42, Frank Goldsmith '43, Jean Hebert '44, Bill Neale '44, John Lorini '45, Dave Otis '45, Art Kelley '45, Ed Adams '45, "Chuck" Gries '46, all of whom returned this semester. Bud Moore '42, "Chuck" Bobertz '44, Tony Romeo '44 and Ray Walch '45 returned last semester. "Summy" House '41 and Harry Walch '43 are graduate students and returned last semester.

Several of the boys have married since they were last at Middlebury. "T.T." Thomas, "Squire" Lorini, Bud Moore, "Summy" House, and Tony Romeo have married. "T.T." Thomas has a daughter and Bud Moore has a son.

Above are the following four reports: (1) Income and Expenditures from January 1, 1946 through March 31, 1946; (2) Total Income and Expenditures for the fiscal year through March 31, 1946; (3) the comparison with the same period a year ago; and (4) The revised budget for the present fiscal year.

The increased demands of this reactivation period on the National Offices, particularly on the Executive Secretary, are reflected in the greatly increased expenses of the last quarter, resulting in an excess of Expenditures over Income for the quarter of approximately \$800. We anticipated some of this, since new income from Initiation Fees and Active Chapter Dues has not yet begun to pick up. Fortunately the lag in these items has been partly offset by the excellent response of the alumni, who are continuing to rally marvelously to the support of Kappa Delta Rho. However the expenses of the period have been somewhat more than expected, and will necessarily continue so if anything approaching the service needed is performed by the Executive Secretary. You will undoubtedly notice that one of the larger items of expense is for the Convention. This is the year for a full convention and it seems to your directors that a good convention this year is essential. I fear that the estimate is still too low, but we will do our best to keep the expenses reasonable.

At a special meeting of the Executive Committee on March 30 the Budget was considered very carefully item by item. Every figure of expense represents the lowest estimate that we believed is compatible with what you would want done. The income items are based on the best conservative estimate of the Executive Secretary, as a result of his contacts with the chapters. The final result does not look too good. As stated in my last report, we have a \$2,000. cash reserve, with which to meet an anticipated \$2,700. deficit in our year's operations to June 30.

If the fraternity is to enter the next fiscal year with even \$1. of current funds on

hand, a minimum of \$700. additional income must be obtained. In this first term of reopening chapters and partial reorganization of these, I do not believe we can look to the active chapters to substantially increase the amounts estimated. The conclusion becomes pretty obvious that this \$700. additional income must come from the alumni. You have already more than doubled the \$300. that I put in my first estimate. Can you do it again?

Here are some facts:

Up to April 1, 325 of you had sent in your alumni dues. To you and to any others whose dues reach me while this issue is being printed, I say a very sincere "Thank you!" (If I have not yet acknowledged your payment personally, please accept this general acknowledgement in the interim.) But 325 is only slightly over 10% of our 3,000 alumni. What about the other 2,675 of you? You represent a potential \$5,350.—almost enough to swing the year's budget alone. Surely you are too interested in seeing Kappa Delta Rho weather this storm and become ready to embark in good shape on the post-war college sea! Then dig up the Postage Paid addressed envelope sent you in December, enclose your check or cash for \$2, and be sure to put your return address and chapter on the envelope. You are never too late to help and your help right now will mean much more to KDR than the \$2, does to you.
