Kappa Delta Rho has just finished one of the most successful years of its history. Although somewhat hampered by a limited budget (see budget for 1947-48) its officers and directors witnessed the achievement of many KDR aims. A full program of reactivation was carried out under the leadership of Executive-secretary Ferd Ensinger, culminating in the reorganization of Upsilon chapter in May. Other chapters were aided in many ways by the national organization, but many tasks in their reactivation program have yet to be completed. Many of these are planned for early action in the coming year.

Publications received much attention during the past year with publicity appearing often in the two magazines serving the frater-nity world, THE FRATERNITY MONTH and BANTA'S GREEK EXCHANGE. Numerous articles printed in the official KDR QUILL AND SCROLL received official notice in the Greek world by being digested in these magazines. The publicity afforded to the frater-nity helped to place her among the most active Greek societies of the

A pledge MANUAL, acquainting the future KDR member with every phase of the organization, was completed early this year and is already receiving wide use among the chapters. Book matches with the official seal are available with the official seal are available in the national office. Their use for rushing parties, alumni get-togethers, formals, dinners and dances should find all chapters with another weapon in their publicity drive.

All these services add up to one thing: that the national organiza-tion is providing more services than ever before with one aim in mind: to make KDR the greatest small fraternity in the country. Convention Votes To Continue \$2 Fee; Present Services Must Stay In Face Of Rising Costs

Continuance of the \$2 a year dues was voted at the annual convention in the Hotel Commodore, New York City, on May 24. After a careful study of the budget for next year the delegates present felt that the aid of the alumni was essential for the growth of the new KDR, and voted unanimously to ask the alumni for further support of the program.

An element in the decision was in the records of many other fraternities having regular dues. KDR dues were first started as an emergency measure to provide some means of support during the war when most of the actives were in the service. It has to be voted on at each yearly convention. The officers feel that just as soon as the financial condition warrants, it will be discontinued but that time has not yet arrived.

Factors which call for support from alumni members are only too obvious to most of them. Printing costs have doubled and most other services have increased greatly. An alumni directory is slated for early release but current expenses have as yet left little money to provide for its publication. KDR is fortufor its publication. KDR is fortu-nate in not having any office rent at present but secretarial work on members' files should be increased greatly if the alumni are to be kept informed of the national doings. Alumni mail is increasing with the rising interest in a new KDR program and its proper answering requires the services of a full-time secretary. As yet the budget is unable to provide this service.

KDR must provide the same service as other active fraternities or be left far behind in the educational picture. Your dues are needed to see that the prosperity has been serviced during the period. she has enjoyed during the period of reactivation be continued to a period of greater growth and service than she has ever had in the past. You may not have time to give to the program, but you must have an extra \$2 somewhere to perpetuate the principals on which KDR was founded.

Of the 307 KDR alumni who sent in dues for 1946-47, 161 also paid their dues for the year 1945-46. (1) Obviously the Alumni Dues fell behind the forecast, which we thought was conservative, and well behind last year's record: \$929.00.

(2) This was an unusual year in the number of initiations. We can hardly expect as many every year. Many chapters initiated far above their average in their effort to get started again after the war.

(3) The large amount received from Jewelry Rebates reflects in part the large number of initiations. However not all chapters are supporting this part of our national program wholeheartedly. Every bit of KDR jewelry bought outside of regular channels represents a loss to your nat'l organization.

(4) The total for this year includes \$400 set up to cover the Spring Issue of Quill and Scroll, whose publication was delayed by the scarcity of paper.

(5) This amount is larger than forecast because it seemed advisable, if not necessary, this past spring to have the Executive Secretary visit the West Coast chapters as a vital part of the reactivation program.

(6) These two items are always in proportion to the Initiation Fees, hence are larger than forecast.

(1) The only reason there is any cash in the current funds is that we have not yet paid over to the Trust Fund all the money due for this year's initiations. As you will see if you grance at Current Liabilities, if we paid that fund all we owe it, we would exhaust current cash and the better part of the Cash Reserve Fund. We need to show an excess of Income over Expenditures for several years at a substantial figure before we can fully remedy this situation. Alumni Dues can help provide part of the necessary margin.






