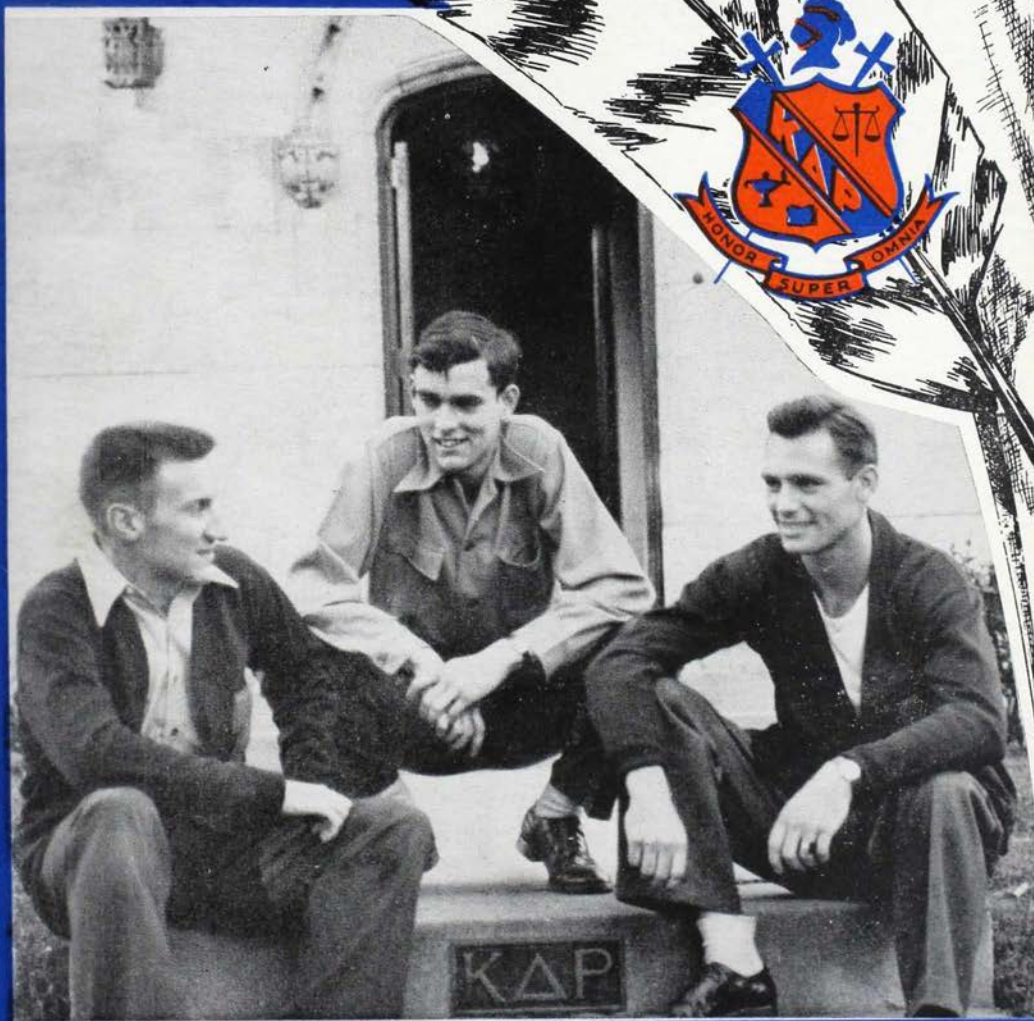

No dates have yet been submitted for future social events but during the first

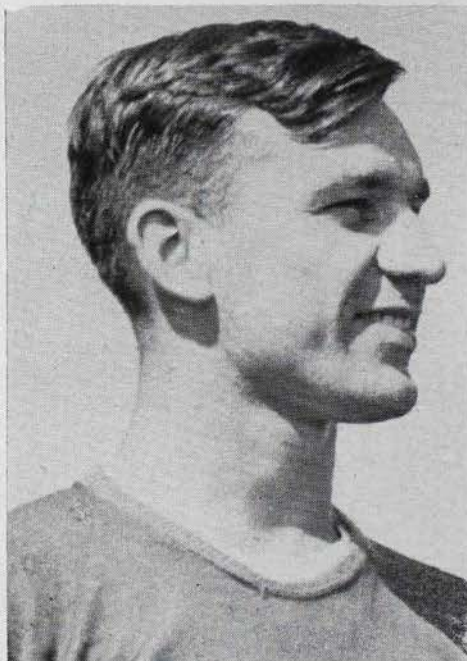

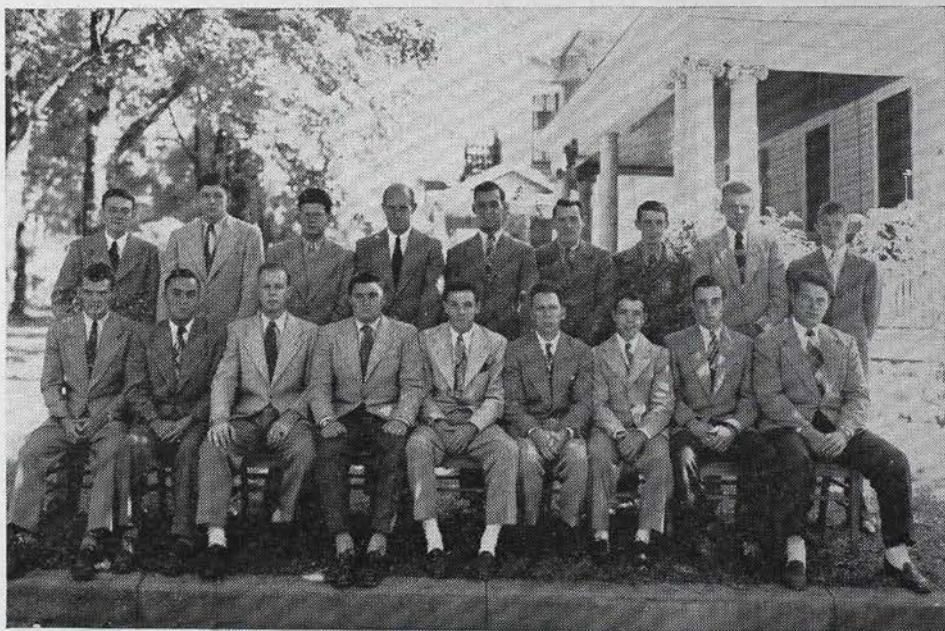
Initiation

except for the fact that it needs painting badly, and 50% of the windows need replacing. When these repairs

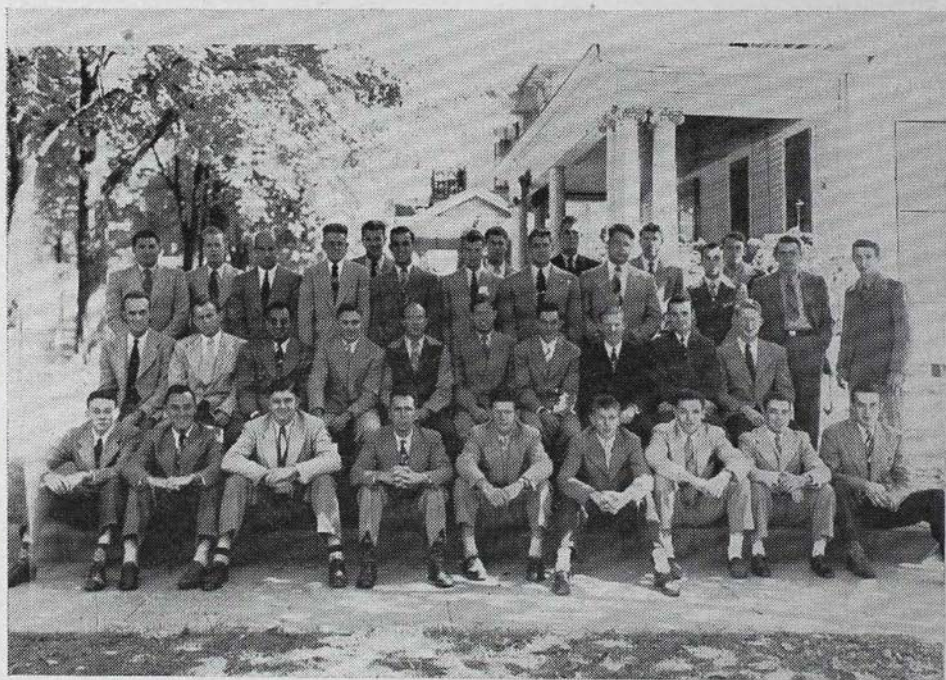
are made the Castle on the Hill will take her place along with all the shiny newly-decorated houses of our great national.

Lambda Claims Better Decorated House In '47

There is probably no group on campus this semester that is prouder of its house than Lambda chapter. At the beginning of the summer our living room was placed in the hands of John Breuner Co., figuratively speaking. The redecorating job that they did has been drawing a steady stream of praise from alumni and guests since the opening of the house this fall. The color scheme is red, maroon and green, used in the materials, mohair and Dupont Durand (a superb plastic material used instead of leather). The corner, end and coffee tables are bleached oak and the entire scheme is held together by a deep-pile beige carpet.



The dining room chairs (new last spring) have been distinguished by the addition of three-inch, full color KDR crests. The Mothers' Club put their female touch and a lot of chintz to use very effectively in the refinishing of the girls' powder room.

Downstairs, the coal bin has become the chapter office, since the new initiates so graciously consented to remove the coal one evening last fall.

The greatest amount of physical effort went into the building of a chapter-recreation room in the basement. From the digging of the dirt to the installa-

tion of recessed lighting fixtures, the entire job was done by KDR's, and we are justly proud of it. In conjunction with this room, which opens into the back yard, the barbecue pit was finished and a gravel terrace installed. The entire set-up was christened at a barbecue held before the Navy game.

In the process of completion are a lawn for the remainder of the back yard and a twenty-one inch terra cotta crest for the front of the chapter house. The latter is the handiwork of Brothers Jara and Haworth and is now being glazed in full color.

All of which adds up to a KDR Chapter at the University of California that is bigger and better than ever before.

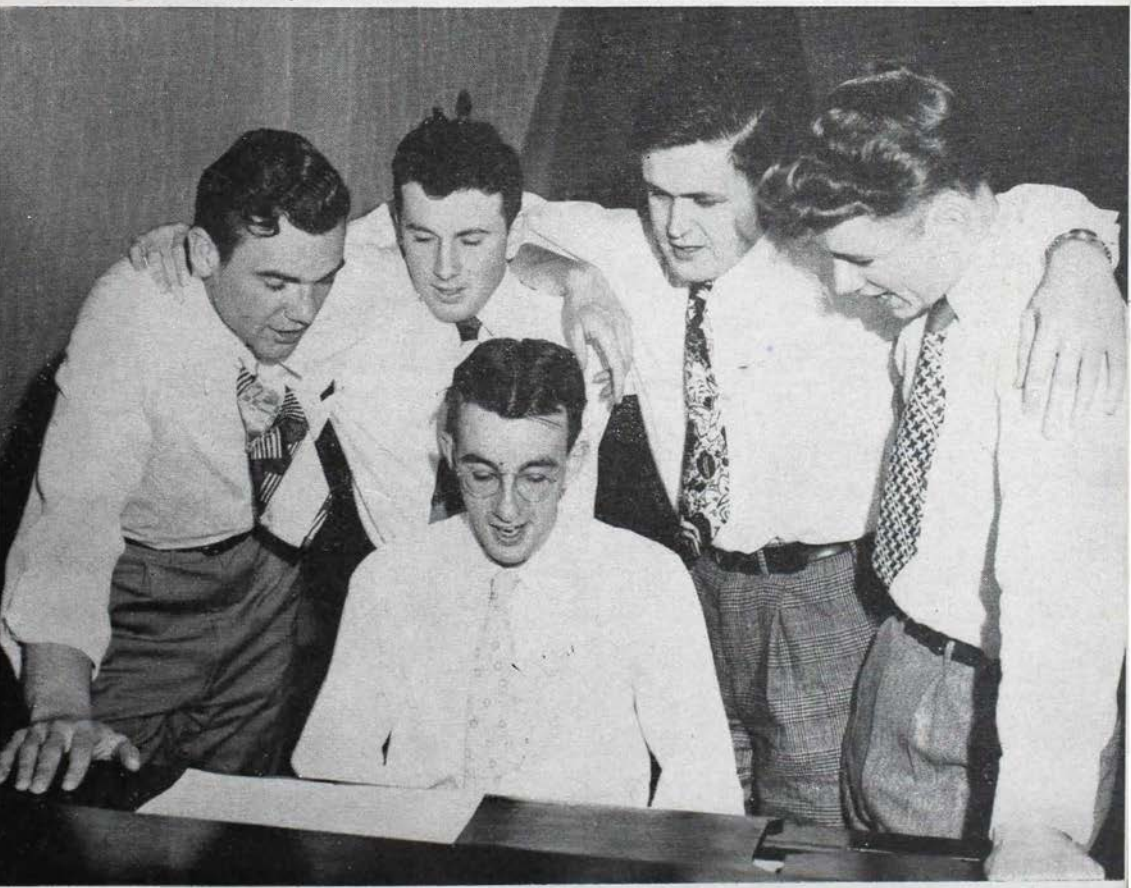

Events

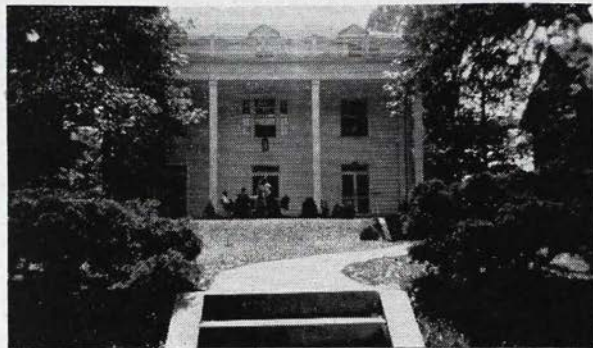

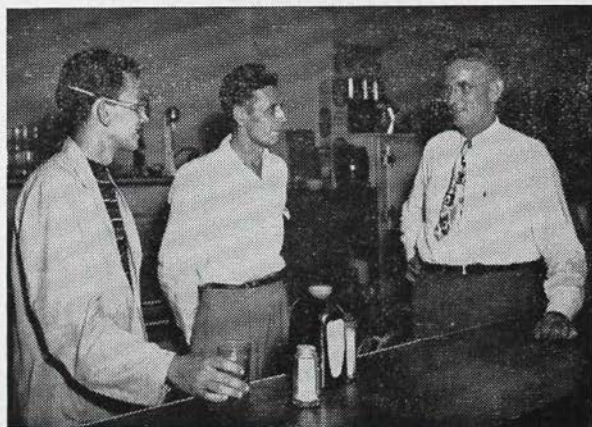

We left Jack Ditto's home in Portland the morning of July 9 in Keith Young's car, one of the Dodge Brothers' relics of 1933 vintage. Loaded with all the necessities for living on the road for several months, we were on our way.

The first leg of the trip was up the scenic Columbia River Highway through the farm lands to Yellowstone National Park. All the natural phenomena of the park were seen in several days of wandering and camping.

Chicago was our next stop, achieved after the usual difficulties of distance travel. We saw a few highlights but did not stay very long. Illinois was our home for a few days where we saw part of the state. We had a nice visit with a few of the brothers of Eta chapter who showed us a good time. We did what every college student would have done; wired home for some more money. It was fortunate that our parents sympathized with us under these circumstances. We spent a night at Keith's home, then headed for Portland just a week before school opened.

We would like to thank all KDR's at the places we were fortunate enough to be able to stop. Believe us, this is one way, although not the only one, to appreciate that we have a national fraternity. There's one thing that surprised us on our trip. If one took a cross section of Kappa Delta Rho throughout the country he would find, as we did, that every house has similar ideals, similar organization, and members similar to those in our own house. We only hope that some day it will be possible for every KDR to see his national fraternity as we have. It's truly a great organization.

To date the roster of actives shows a grand total of 502, the highest in the history of Kappa Delta Rho. The grand total of 702 (with more to come) puts KDR at the peak in her history. At no other time has the number of actives and pledges ever gone beyond this number.

Statistics can prove almost anything, but one thing is evident, the actives for 1947-48 total 15% of the entire membership since 1905. With the graduation of the present group of actives the membership roll will be well over 5,000.

No officer can neglect a group so large, no facility of the National Office should be withheld from them. Their enthusiasm and spirit are of the highest and it should not under any circumstances be cooled. Every alumnus can help to maintain that true spirit of cameraderie that has made KDR so revered through the years. With 4500 personal advertisers and 702 actives, Kappa Delta Rho will prove what real brotherhood means.

But the record that we in the National Office are proud of is the fact that chapter cooperation with the Office has been just about perfect. With our ear to the ground we predict a great year for every active chapter. Chapter Eternal

Cpl. Donald Wells Eddy, Gamma '34

Died in the service of his country
June 21, 1944, in Greenland.

Brother Eddy was born on November 5, 1913, in Saratoga Springs, New York. After graduating from the Saratoga High School in 1930 he matriculated at New York State Teachers College at Albany, from which he graduated in 1934. He was initiated into KDR on February 28, 1932.

Little is known of his activities in Greenland since strict secrecy was maintained at that time. His parents and wife did not hear from him for months, and news then was still very scarce. One thing is known, that he served his country well and faithfully, taking to his grave the nature of his mission in Greenland.

Major Robert B. Sykes, Jr., wrote in part to Donald's mother:

"I am glad to inform you that you need only be proud of your son's performance of duty while there. His work merited only commendation. Prior to his death he had been awarded the good conduct medal. . . . Corporal Eddy contributed to the welfare of the station to which he had been assigned. . . . I am expressing the feelings of his associates when I say that it was a pleasure to have known Corporal Eddy."

(Brother Eddy brings to 67 the number of KDR's who died in the service of their country in World War II.)

Clyde W. Johnson, Eta '28

Eta chapter and Kappa Delta Rho were shocked to learn of the passing to Chapter Eternal of our esteemed brother, Clyde W. Johnson, Eta '28. He passed away suddenly on the evening of July 28 at Jacksonville, Illinois, where he had resided for many years. The sympathy of his brothers everywhere go to his wife, Betty, and his two children, aged 9 and 5.

A native of Geneva, Illinois, Brother Johnson was initiated into KDR in the fall of 1925. While at the University of Illinois he made an enviable scholastic record, besides serving as editor of the Daily Illini. Upon graduating he became Associated Press Correspondent, but deafness cut short a promising career in the newspaper field after several years. Clyde then took up the work which made him famous.

He entered the State of Illinois School for the Deaf at Jacksonville and became a member of the staff. His work among the deaf was outstanding. Articles relating to deafness were published under his name in The Saturday Evening Post, Reader's Digest, and many other publications.

A life of service has ended for Clyde Johnson but the memory of his achievements will live on with those who were fortunate enough to know him. The world is better since Clyde paid it a visit; Kappa Delta Rho is the richer for being able to call him BROTHER.

Harold A. Severy, Alpha '09

Harold Allen Severy was born in Leicester, Vermont, on March 6, 1886, and died in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, on July 9, 1947.

Brother Severy entered Middlebury College from Brandon High School in 1905 and became one of the first men to be initiated into Alpha chapter of Kappa Delta Rho. After graduation from Middlebury in 1909 he taught in various New England schools until 1912 when he entered Cornell for post-graduate work in science. From 1914 until 1916 he was instructor in botany at Cornell, from which institution he received his M.S. degree in 1916. From 1919 to 1946 he was a teacher of science in the Milwaukee High School and the president of various scientific and teachers' organizations, as well as being actively interested in Milwaukee real estate. He lived at 3253 North Downer Ave., Milwaukee.

It was during his four years at Cornell that Brother Severy gathered together the group of men (many of whom were members of the Methodist Church where he was the organist) who became the second or Beta chapter of Kappa Delta Rho.

On July 14, 1918, Brother Severy married Miss May Burraby, who survives him.

Hal was a good friend and a loyal alumnus. Through his kindly influence many boys from the Middle West found their way to Middlebury and have since gone on to make their mark in the world. No appeal in behalf of his college or his fraternity was ever turned down. We who knew him so well salute his passing and know that the Master Workman will say, "This is my son of whom I am justly proud."

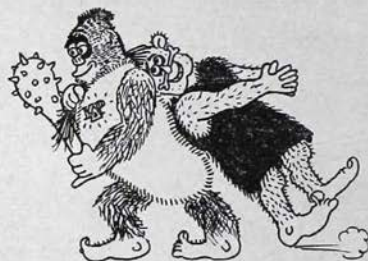
The funeral was held the following Saturday at the Forest Grove Funeral

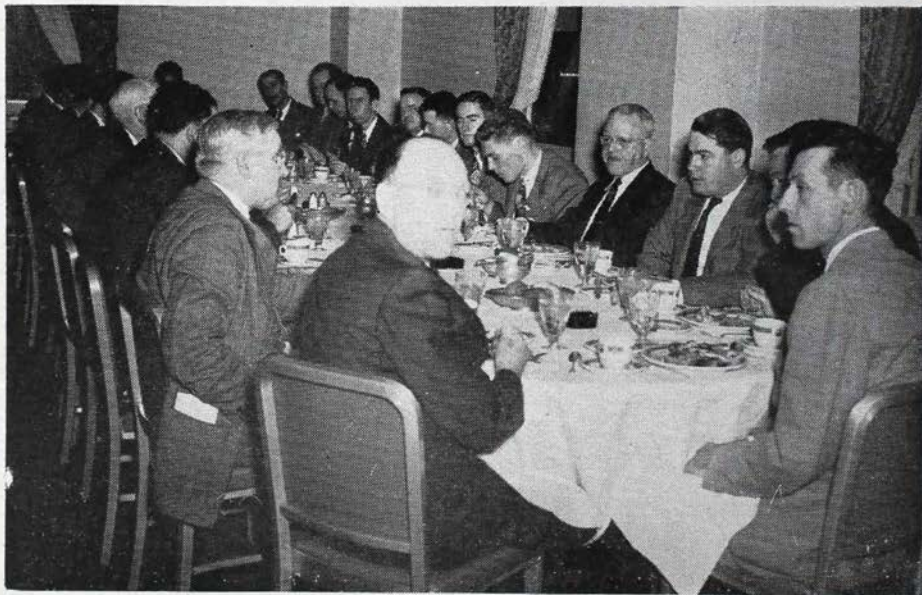
CHAPTER NOTES

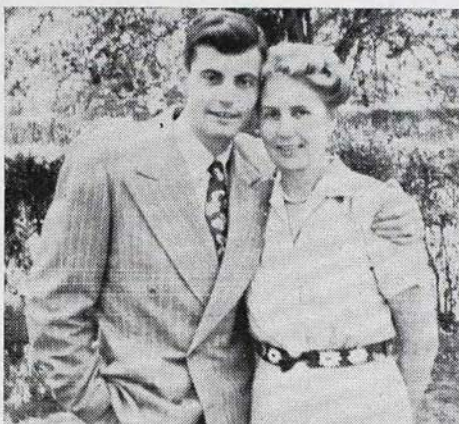

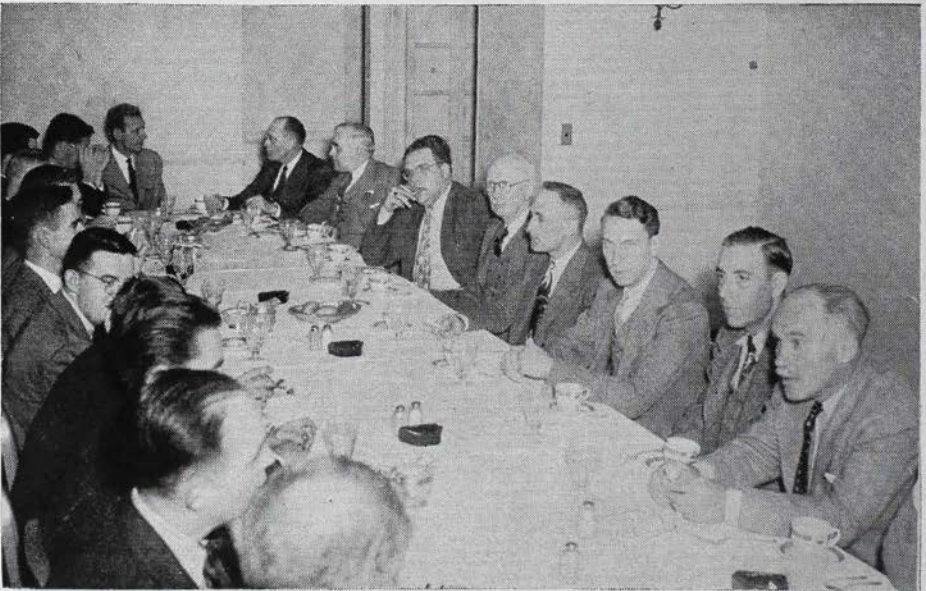
Southern Cal. Alumni Meet With Exec. Sec'y Ensinger

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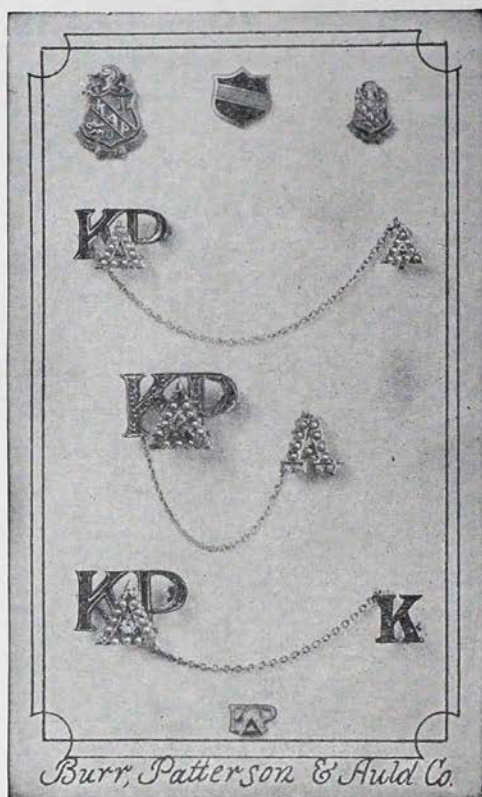
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
