New Executive-Secretary

Hugh Penman Elevated From Field Office

New executive-secretary for Kappa Delta Rho is Hugh Penman, elevated from the position of West Coast Field Secretary to that of general executive for the entire national. His experience in organizing the West Coast Regional Conference of last year, and his knowledge of the West Coast chapters bring to KΔP a new outlook in executive positions, as he is the first one from the West Coast to hold the office.

He succeeds Ferd Ensinger, who served five full years during the re-activation period following the War. Problems of expansion and consolidation fill the agenda now, and he has already devoted time to the solving of these problems.

As the son of a construction engineer, Penman received his primary education in fourteen different schools in the U.S. and Hawaii, graduating from John Marshall Highschool in Los Angeles in 1947. In highschool he was editor of the creative-writing book, a member of the Hi-Y, active in dramatics, and a scholastic honorary.

After enrolling at the University of California he was initiated into KAP in 1948 at the end of his freshman year. He received his degree in 1951 with an A.B. in history and graduate work in teaching.

In Lambda Chapter he held the offices of Pontifex, Propraetor, and Consul. In 1950 he succeeded Norman Carmichael as West Coast Field Secretary, and held that office until taking over the



duties as executive-secretary during the summer of 1951. His office is located in Rahway, New Jersey.

A MESSAGE

Kappa Delta Rho is in danger! As we gain more chapters, we, as a national fraternity, run the risk of over-extending our lines of supply and communication. History shows us how other nations and other national fraternities have fallen due to over-expansion. We are no different. KAP is growing in the number of chapters, and a serious effort must be made by every alumnus and active undergraduate and pledge to see that we grow internally as well as externally.

Many of you have heard me say that the U.S. mail is the life's blood of our fraternity. One thrombus could prove disastrous.

We must stimulate and maintain our circulation by frequent letters to national officers by chapters and to the chapters by the national. Close contact and association is most essential. I cannot over-emphasize the importance of inter-chapter relations. Nor can I lay great enough stress upon the need of close communication between chapter and national.

In order to foster a closelyknit fraternity, chapter visitation is an important factor. As far as it is possible, the national office hopes to have a national officer visit each chapter at least twice a year. Close communication with the national officer will make these visits more profitable to the chapter and to Kappa Delta Rho. By all means, we must be on our guard to avoid the danger of expanding without unifying ourselves within. 1952 is likely to be our greatest year. Will you do your part?

(The foregoing message was written by the new executive-secretary, who addresses it to all members of KΔP, whether actives or alumni. He takes this method of introducing himself to the alumni especially, since he is able to meet most of the actives on his chapter visits. The Quill and Scroll invites the alumni to write to him about chapter problems.



The National Office of Kappa Delta Rho endeavors to enhance the status of the fraternity as a mature organization. It can never condone such immature action as this, for it is such incidents that harm the fraternity everywhere. Maturity in little things should lead to a solution of bigger questions.
