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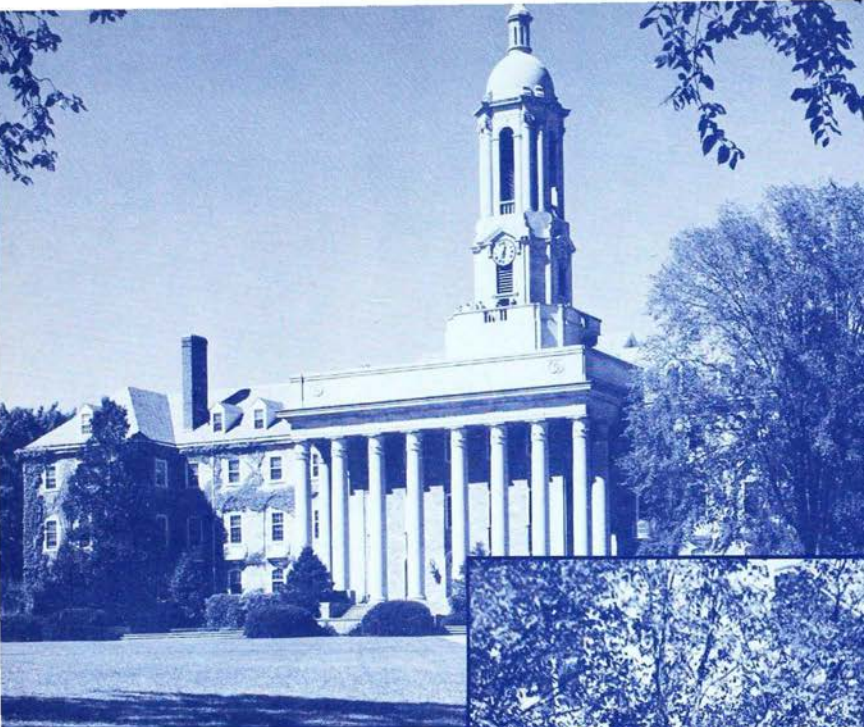

His E.E. degree was from Penn State in 1930. An instructor in electrical engineering at Harvard, then professor of electrical engineering at the U.S. Naval Academy for 10 years before coming to Penn State, he taught there from 1923 until his retirement in 1949. He then served 4 years as a half-time professor at Bucknell and as an interim professor at the University of Florida. Among his hobbies was oil painting, at which he won a number of awards, stamp collecting and travel.

He was a member of the Humboldt Country Cattleman's Association, the Commonwealth Club (San Francisco), Maple Creek School Board, the American Forestry Association and the Kerr Land and Timber Company, where he had an active part in re-planting redwood and douglas fir trees.

White Engineering, New York City. He had also been engaged in consulting work in Vietnam. His employers included the TVA, Rural Electrification Administration in Washington, D.C. and the Atomic Energy Commission.

*Epsilon* '28 on July 2, 1972 at home of cancer and arteriosclerosis. He had been a high school basketball coach and teacher from 1928-47, a high school principal from 1947-59 and an educational representative for several publishers including Golden Books and Colliers Encyclopedia from 1959-66 at which time he retired.

polis, Ind. He had been a special national sales representative for Blue Cross and Blue Shield before retiring in 1971.

### **Howard N. Watenpaugh**

*Sigma* '23. He received his BS at Oregon State and his MS at Montana State, studying later at Penn State and the University of Nebraska. He served as associate professor of soils at Penn State and New Mexico State Universities; professor at New Mexico State; extension agronomist and irrigation specialist at the University of Arizona, and chief of land classification for the Bureau of Reclamation at Boise Idaho. John G. Miers, *Beta '66* and Gary Stiles, *Zeta '63* were elected to the National Board of Directors at last fall's Convention. The need for two new directors was caused by the resignations of A. Lawrence Barr, *Xi '63* and Calvin Arter, *Alpha Alpha '60*.

Brother Stiles is a graduate of Penn State with a degree in Dairy Science. He has been employed by Abbotts Dairies, Philadelphia since his graduation and is currently Sales Manager of the Southern Division of the Dairy. While at Zeta, he was Senior Tribune and Consul. He has been a member of Zeta's board since 1965 and served as president of the board from 1971-1974. He is Co-chairman of Zeta's Improvement Fund.

John G. Miers is a graduate of Cornell University, where he received an AB degree in Government in 1966, and a Masters in Business Administration in both Finance and Organizational Theory in 1968. During his two years in graduate school, he served as Beta's graduate resident advisor. He chairs the KDR Long

Range Planning Committee.

Miers is Vice-President of the Cornell Alumni Class of 1966.

## Beta's William I. Myers

Dr. William I. Myers, Beta '14, has devoted over 45 years of his life to the service of agriculture. Throughout his career, he has counseled students, professors, farmers and farm leaders, business executives and government leaders



including three Presidents of the United States.

Dr. Myers retired as Dean of the N.Y. State College of Agriculture at Cornell in June of 1959. The dean literally grew up with modern agriculture and helped to guide its destiny. His retirement marked the end of an era at Cornell. Among his outstanding contributions as dean, in 1946 he traveled to Europe and Mexico studying agricultural and industrial conditions. A year later, he was appointed by President Truman to a nonpartisan committee on foreign aid. In 1952 President Eisenhower appointed him chairman of an 18 man commission he established with the power to review administration farm policies and make recommendations.

Late in 1958, the N.Y. State Conference Board of Farm Organizations presented him with a citation for "outstanding service to agriculture". A week earlier he was honored by the N.Y. State Canners and Freezers' Association for being "the chief architect and key influence in bringing about major changes in the state's farm economy".

As of late Dr. Myers has served as a director in many outstanding corporations including Marine Midland Bank, N.Y. State Electric and Gas, Insular Lumber Co., American Agriculturist, Continental Can Co., Grand Union, P&C Food Markets, Avco and SCM. He also served as a trustee for the Carnegie Institution of Washington, The Mutual Life In-

surance Co. of N.Y., the Agricultural Development Council and the Rockefeller Foundation.

Through all this, Dr. Myers never lost touch with the soil. In 1950, he moved his growing family to an 84 acre farm on the east shore of Cayuga Lake, north of Ithaca and still resides there today.

A man whose influence has helped shape the course of events in government, business, education and agriculture, Bill Myers is one of the most renowned Beta alumni. He has and still is serving on the board of directors of Beta Corporation. We at Beta are proud that he is one of us and wish him and his family all the best in the future.

After this article was set in type we were notified that Brother Myers passed away on Jan. 31st, 1975.

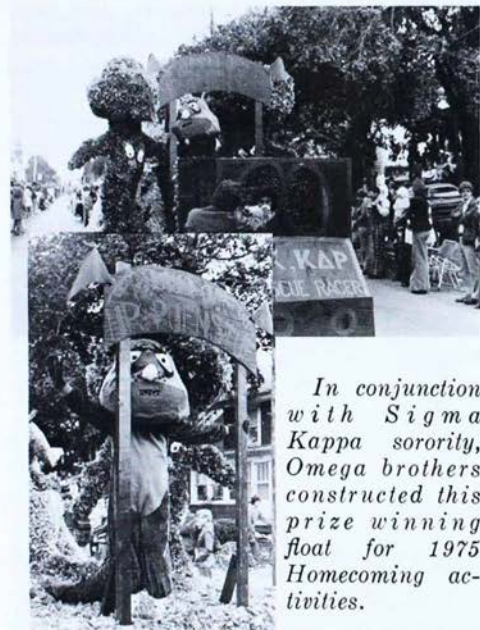

Everyone's into the Bicentennial thing this year, and from my observations we're all going to get pretty well annoyed, if we aren't already, at the outpouring of commercialism in the worst possible taste—items such as a machine to paint your parking lot stripes red, white and blue; fire plugs painted with a grotesque "colonial" figure or simply painted (sloppily) in the same colors; ad absurdum. Not to mention assorted pins, tie tacks, medals, tourist-trap gimcracks . . . and on a somewhat higher level, the plethora of special plates, coins, stamps, seals and crockery in limited editions.

In a way it has to be expected, because of the lack of any real governmental plan for a celebration. The average citizen and businessman was free to go his own way without direction, and some of the directions taken are bound to be tasteless.

The link of the fraternity system to the Bicentennial is stronger by far than many would suspect, and yet I



doubt that very much publicity will surround it. The first fraternity established in the United States was Phi Beta Kappa, which has since become an honorary. Its founding date of 1776 makes the system eligible for a 200th birthday party of its own. Kappa Delta Rho can claim no such longevity, of course, but as members of a 200-year old institution, that relatively unknown fact is worth a few words of mention in the year 1976.

The 1976 National Leadership Conference will be held in conjunction with the sixty-fifth National Convention of Kappa Delta Rho at Zeta Chapter, Pennsylvania State University, State College, Pa. The first session of the Leadership Conference will be held after dinner on Thursday, August 19th. ## TALES OF THE UNKNOWN

# Picture, picture off the wall . . .

MY GOOD GRANDFATHER, Wesley Newcomb, of whom I wrote in a previous "Tales", — was born in 1854. He had a younger brother, Willard, who was born in 1856, and the two looked so much alike that in later years Wesley grew a mustache in order to be identified from Willard. The two boys were born and brought up in a little back-woods village of Maine known as Golden Ridge, but when they were old enough to be on their own, they separated, — Wesley moving southerly to the "citified" section of the State, — Gardiner, Hallowell and Augusta, — and Willard following Horace Greeley's advice, moving out West, to Nevada. For many years, they corresponded, but gradually, as each went about his ways, they sort of lost track of each other. I will never forget the lovely,

enlarged picture of Uncle Willard which was about two feet by three feet in dimension and, in keeping with the custom of the day, was mounted on a bamboo easel in the living room in one corner of our homestead in Gardiner, where I was born and brought up.

My father, Samuel, was a professional pianist and piano-teacher, and it was he who taught me to play piano, beginning at my tender age of eight. By the time I was ten, I was playing in a dance band, an all-boys' orchestra, which fact is only incidental in that I was obliged, albeit willingly as I love music, to put in a daily stint of practice on our old upright. And so I became quite friendly with the ennobled framed and eased picture of our Uncle Willard who had made good out West on a cattle farm, or



"ranch", as we know them today. One day in June of the year 1915, I was sitting at the piano in our parlor practising my scales, arpeggios and chords, and I recall that it was comfortably warm, possibly around 75 degrees or so, and I had a window open a bit. Some of my young friends were assembling to play a game of baseball in a neighboring lot, and as they went past my window they called to me to come join them. I refused for the moment, saying I would come out after I finished practicing. I had no sooner gotten the words out of my mouth when I heard a crash in back of me. Turning about quickly, I saw to my surprise that Uncle Willard's picture had fallen from its easel and was lying face down on the floor, the glass shattered. I went immediately to the kitchen to report this oddity and bumped into my step-mother who had heard the noise and was on her way to investigate. We had a family cat, "Tom" by name, who had been napping on the parlor sofa, but who now had disappeared. My stepmother blamed the incident on poor "Tom", although there was no evidence whatsoever of his guilt. She cleaned up the glass and placed the picture in a closet,

saying that they would have it reframed and put back in place. It must have been approximately 2 P.M., as that was my usual Saturday afternoon piano practice time.

Well, nothing further was thought about the incident until the next day when we received a telegram from Aunt Sophronia, Willard's wife, stating that he was killed the day before, Saturday, around 2 P.M. while riding his horse across a prairie. The horse accidentally stepped into a gopher hole and stumbled, throwing his passenger to the ground with the horse on top of him. Another cowboy, who was not far behind, witnessed the event and tried to assist, but was too late. The horse's leg was broken, and Uncle Willard had breathed his last.

P.S.: Incidentally, the picture was reframed and put back on the easel in the parlor, and the last time I was there, it was still in the old homestead. My father still holds sway there although his wife has passed on, and he no longer can play piano due to arthritis. And, — the old upright I learned to play on is also still there. It was made by Jacob Brothers, Chicago, and sounds just fine.
