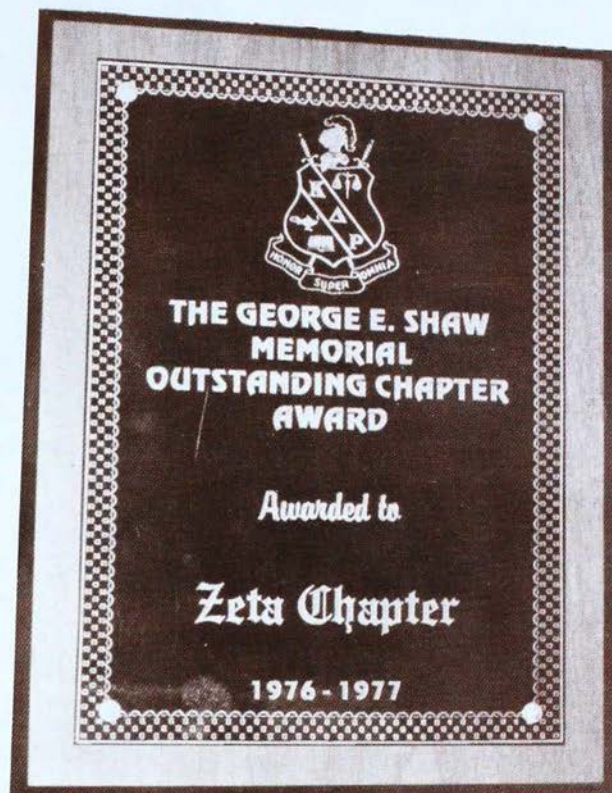

George E. Shaw, Alpha '10, Jan. 13, 1885/Dec. 19, 1976



Mr. K.D.R.

GEORGE E. SHAW was born January 13, 1885 in Moriah Center, N. Y. and graduated from Sherman Collegiate Institute in 1901. After taking a business course there and at Rochester Business Institute he worked for two years as a stenographer in Rochester, N. Y. In 1904 he went into the lumbering business at Moriah and kept this up all the time he was in Middlebury College which he entered as a freshman in the Fall of 1906.

George was the first K.D.R. pledge and was Consul in his senior year. He graduated in 1910 as a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He was responsible for the first issue of *The Scroll* in the Summer of 1909 which was just a duplicated sheet sent to some thirty brothers to advise about entering Freshmen. It was then called *The Scroll* and was the predecessor of *The Quill and Scroll*.

After settling his lumbering business interests George went to New York and got a job with the banking house of William Salomon & Co., as a statistician. This involved taking night courses in accounting at New

York University. He left this firm in 1916 to go with the Clark Estates at 149 Broadway. The Clark family was a wealthy Cooperstown, N. Y. group, most of whose monies were derived from textiles. He remained with them until he retired in 1939 with the exception of his army career as a Captain in the Chemical Warfare Service during World War I with service on the staff of the Director of C.W.S. in Washington and in the A.E.F. in France.

In April, 1920, George married Miss Laura J. Doyle who was then a high school teacher in New York. They had two sons, Robert and David, and five grandchildren.

George held many offices in the National Fraternity during the past sixty years.—Grand Emptor, National Director, National Historian, President of Alpha Alumni, President of New York Alumni, etc. The various charter revisions, the establishment of the Quill & Scroll Trust Fund, the 1955 National History and the "Credo" all show his interest and handiwork. He had also been active in com-

munity and college affairs and received the 1952 Alumni Award from his Alma Mater. At Middlebury he was chairman of the Annual Alumni Fund 1932-1935; class secretary 1910-1940; class agent 1935 and a member of the Association Alumni Council 1936-37.

George and Laura spent their summers at the old family farm in upstate New York and their winters in Scarsdale, N. Y. He used to travel to New York twice a week and busied himself as an Investment Consultant and as a Trustee of various trusts. *The Quill and Scroll* back in the 1930's called him "a busy and eminent figure in New York's financial world."

On June 14, 1952, Middlebury College cited him in the following language:

"George Edward Shaw, born and bred in the Champlain Valley, graduate of Middlebury in the Class of 1910, member of Phi Beta Kappa, for forty years engaged as investment banker and consultant in the City of New York, yet in your modest and unassuming way ever ready to assist and counsel young graduates. Above all, always a loyal son of Middlebury and generous contributor to her

By his multiple efforts in behalf of the Fraternity, George earned membership in the K.D.R. Half Century Club and, more important, the designation from those who knew him best of "Mr. K.D.R." He was one of the most loyal members of this organization and will be sorely missed.

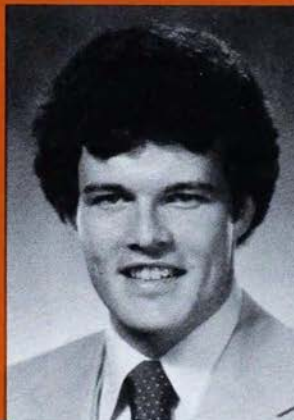

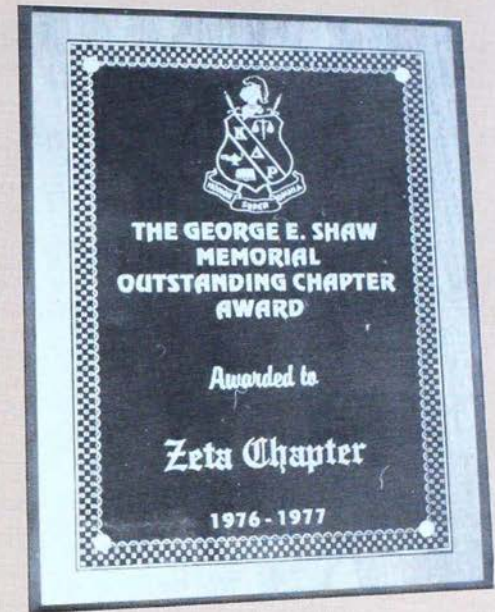


Gary Brooder Holcomb, Beta, '78, a mechanical engineering major working on a B.S. degree, is the 1977 recipient of the Stewart J. Meyers Scholarship. Through his first five semesters he received only one B; two A— and three As; all other grades were A+. He has a 4.17 GPA on a 4.3 system ($4.3 = A+$).

Last year he received the Scott Paper Company Foundation Award for Leadership. It is presented annually to a Cornell engineering student who combines academic excellence with outstanding leadership qualities. The recipient receives \$2,000 per year during his Junior and Senior years.

Gary is president of the Cornell Chapter of Tau Beta Pi, a national engineering honorary. He is also a member of the Cornell Student Section of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers and last spring he was elected to receive the "Outstanding Junior Award".

He has played trombone for two years in the Cornell Big Red Band and is a member of Beta Rho Beta, a music honorary. He is captain of the Allen Raiders, an independent softball team at Cornell.

Sixty-sixth National Convention

The Sixty Sixth National Convention was held at the Airport Hilton Inn in Indianapolis, Indiana, on August 27. Those present were President Robert D. Lynd, *Iota '67*; Treasurer Edward K. Hoffman, Jr., *Iota '68*; Directors Kenneth R. Gesner, *Xi '53*; Richard W. Nolan, *Theta '59*; Alan T. Lord, *Kappa '72*; Paul S. Royer, *Lambda '73*; Gerald L. Murray, *Theta '66*; Richard DeBernardo, *Alpha Alpha '75*; John Miers, *Beta '66* and Samuel C. Koch, *Xi '79*. Thomas J. Mangan, *Beta '77* represented Beta Alumni Corporation and Jon Kaplan, *Beta '75* represented Epsilon Alumni Corporation.

Proxies were received from the following chapters: Alpha, Zeta, Eta, Iota, Nu, Xi, Rho, Psi and Epsilon Alpha. The following Alumni Corporations were represented either by proxy or by a Director: Theta, Iota, Kappa, Lambda, Nu, Xi, Psi and Alpha Alpha. The voting strength of the convention was computed to be 85.

Treasurer Hoffman presented the

financial report showing only a deficit of \$147.00 for the 1976-77 school year. Robert Corrie sent a report on the 1976-77 Annual Alumni which stated the campaign this year broke all existing records. In all a total of \$14,227.00 was received from 1029 loyal Alumni. The average contribution was \$13.82.

Brother Gerald Murray, Chairman of the Awards Committee recommended the following chapters be recognized for their accomplishments during the past year and that they be awarded Certificates of Merit as follows: Beta Chapter for an outstanding newsletter. Zeta for their community service activity of winning the Penn State Dance Marathon for the fourth year in a row and being responsible for the collection of \$6,000.00 for the Cancer Fund. Zeta was also recognized for their first place standing in Intramural Football. Eta was recognized for their efforts of planning and hosting the "Spring Fling" for the Midwestern Chapters. Theta was

awarded a certificate for improvement in scholarship having risen from 46th place on campus to 6th. Nu was recognized for their community service activity of collecting \$1,600.00 for the Cancer Drive. Xi Chapter was awarded three certificates of merit. The first was for scholastic improvement, placing second on campus. They also fielded three undefeated softball teams and their effort in the Alumni Newsletter, the *Xi Crier*, was recognized. Psi was awarded a certificate of merit for their second place standing in the overall interfraternity sports program. They also were recognized for their membership improvement by pledging 27 pledges during 1976-77.

Omega was awarded outstanding recognition for their 14th Walk to Pittsburgh for the benefit of the Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh. Last year the chapter collected \$22,000.00 which brought their 14th year total to \$116,000.00.

The May 1977 issue of *The Quill and Scroll* prompts this voice from the past to say something in the present. The announcement of George Shaw's passing, within a matter of months after Orrin Judd and Bill Myers, seems to shout a timeless message for KDRs both past and present. For me . . . because I was privileged to know them all . . . it begs a new appraisal of the fraternity to which these giant figures contributed so much for so long.

George Shaw came from humble beginnings in the farm country of upstate New York to become one of Wall Street's most respected 20th century figures and one of Middlebury's most honored alumni. His commitment to the *meaning* of Kappa Delta Rho was to manifest itself in seventy long years of undiminished service to Alpha and to the National

body. His "Credo" which was published as the preamble to the first edition of *The Pathfinder* manual might well be the most inspired expression of the meaning of fraternity ever recorded. His editorship of the first KDR History will remain still another monument to his dedication. His piercing mind was recognized as far back as 1910 by Phi Beta Kappa. It may be time for his KDR to look again into why he gave and how much he derived.

Orrin Judd's life and career have been extolled in the journals of his profession as one of our nation's foremost attorney-jurists . . . in pages of his academia as one of Colgate's most prominent and dedicated servants . . . in Harvard Law's history as the giant of his class and the protege of Judge Learned Hand . . . in the minutes of The Baptist Church which he served from its highest lay posts . . . in countless communications of Kappa Delta Rho which he inspired for over a half century in leadership roles at Delta and in the National. His work as KDR's National Treasurer during the critical years just before and during World War II ranks as one of the finest achievements in the fraternity's

history. Orrin is another Phi Beta Kappa who gave so much to Kappa Delta Rho. It may be time for us to look again into why he gave and how much he derived.

Dr. William I. Myers was recognized by the Cornell Class of 1914 as its most distinguished member. Among agricultural economists and educators, that rank could well be broadened to include the nation itself. Bill's lineage in *Who's Who in America* over the past four decades would rival any U.S. President . . . and he advised Roosevelt, Truman and Eisenhower during his brilliant career. The recovery of our farm economy from the Great Depression of the 30s is frequently credited to the genius of Bill Myers whom President Roosevelt tapped for the principal role in reconstruction finance. He sat on the boards of well over a dozen of America's leading corporations while cherishing his longtime role as Trustee of Beta Chapter's Corporation. It may be time for KDR to look again into why he gave and how much he derived.

their continued outstanding scholastic achievement. They have led the Lock Haven Campus in scholarship since the 1972-73 school year. Epsilon Alpha was cited for their community service project for Muscular Dystrophy. They collected \$700.00 by sponsoring a dance. They were also given a certificate of recognition for being first in the interfraternity basketball competition at Lewis University.

Brother Murray recommended we establish an award to be known as the "George E. Shaw Outstanding Chapter Award". The award was to honor the first pledge of the fraternity who died December 19, 1976. This is an award which is to be given when the need to recognize a chapter arises, and not necessarily to be awarded annually. He recommended that the first award be given this year to Zeta Chapter, Penn State University, in recognition of the two previously named recognitions which they received and in addition Zeta was recognized by the Penn State Interfraternity by being awarded the Omega Epsilon Award. This annual award is given jointly by the Interfraternity Council and the Pennsylvania Lambda Educational Foundation to the one fraternity achieving overall excellence. The criteria of the award includes the area of scholarship, chapter activities, and demonstration of leadership by individual members.

The Convention adopted Brother Murray's recommendation that we establish a George E. Shaw Outstanding Chapter Award and that Zeta Chapter be the first recipient. □

Psi '54 on May 1, 1976 at Lapeer, MI.

Gamma '29 at Albany, NY on June 17, 1977. In college he had been sophomore class president, business manager of the college paper and manager of the basketball team. At the time of his death he was a guidance counsellor at Albany High School.

Dr. Francis M. Fargher

Nu '32 of Michigan City, Indiana, on July 8, 1977. He interned at Methodist Hospital for a year then became a resident in anaesthesiology before taking a position with Evansville State Hospital. After only a few months he came to Michigan City in 1934 where he was admitted to the staff of St. Anthony's Hospital, only resigning from that post in 1975. At retirement he gave his practice, complete with all equipment, to another M.D. so his patients would have records intact. His death came after an operation for an aneurism.

Harry D. French

Lambda '45 of a sudden massive heart attack on November 19, 1976 at Sonoma, CA. He had been in the insurance business for

20 years. Hobbies included skiing, back-packing, photography, wood-working, and furniture building.

Ralph A. Gerhart

Beta '19 on April 7, 1977.

Artemas P. Goodwin

Delta '22, retired Baptist minister, died June 14, 1977 when a tree fell on him in the woods near his home. He earned his B.D. at Rochester Theological Seminary in 1927. His pastorates were Newfane, Buffalo and Oswego, N. Y. and Providence, R. I., and he served as president of the Rhode Island Council of Churches. He was the author of *A Trilogy* and was a contributor to *The Hills Beyond the Hills*. The Goodwins had lived at "Serendipity," their retirement farm near Keuka Lake, since his retirement in 1966. Most recently, he had served as chairman of 1922's 55th reunion and as class editor.

He received an LL.B. from National University of Law, now George Washington University, in 1935, and later earned a doctorate in law from that school. After entering private legal practice in Washington, D. C., Lagerson was a lawyer for Aetna Insurance Co. until his retirement in 1974.

Kappa '26 a Washington Court House (Ohio) attorney, on June 8, 1977.

Dr. Roy R. McCoy

Nu '34 of Fort Wayne, Indiana, on March 22, 1977. He and his wife had been on vacation in Mesa, Arizona when he suffered a massive heart attack after sightseeing in Oakwood Canyon. He survived the initial attack but passed away nine days later.

Peter G. Murphy

Gamma '39, June 1, 1974.

Sigma '38 on May 27, 1977 at Diamond Lake, OR. He had worked for the State Forestry Department for 35 years. He was a district supervisor and fire-control specialist before retiring in 1972 because of ill health. Betz '14 a former Batavia (NY) town justice, councilman and assessor died May 29, 1977 after a long illness. Three of his grandchildren have or are attending Cornell.

Donald M. Tower

Gamma '23 retired president of the State University College at Brockport (NY) died August 11, 1977. During his career he taught English at Olean High School, was head of the speech department at Central High School, Binghamton, principal of the Junior High School in Binghamton and then directed that city's public schools division of instruction. Later he was superintendent of

the Rye Neck Schools at Mamaroneck, then director of training at Oswego Teachers College. He became president of Brockport in 1944, retiring in 1964. Dr. Tower received his PhD from New York University and was author of several books and a contributor to many educational journals.

Theodore H. Townsend

Beta '17 a columnist and agricultural writer for the *Utica Daily Press* for more than 10 years passed away June 20, 1976 in West Palm Beach, FL. From 1925-27 he was editor of the *Waterville* (NY) *Times* and later edited the *Mid-York Weekly* in Hamilton. As editor of the *Waterville* paper, he was involved with the formation of the *Waterville* Central School system. He retired in 1958, moving to Florida in 1971.
