

The Area Support Group Concept *by Don Stohl*

Perhaps when you realize this article is about alumni work you will quickly flip by to other sections. The reputation alumni affairs has gotten is well-deserved if the only "work" you have been involved in has been digging into your checkbook. Before you decide that this article is leading to that same inevitable end, realize that this piece is focusing not simply upon financial support but upon new directions in Kappa Delta Rho alumni relations.

I recently attended the National Interfraternity Conference convention in St. Louis, and was totally amazed at the amount of alumni involvement shown in other national fraternities. It was obvious that this was one reason for their accomplishments in finances, chapter numbers, membership, scholarship awards, etc.

Kappa Delta Rho is presently in a state of limbo awaiting your permission to advance to this same position which is rightfully ours. We have recently granted charters to two new chapters and will install six more this spring. Three contacts have been received towards reactivations and five additional inquiries involving new areas.

Our Alumni Fund Drive has the present appearances of hitting an all-time high with the number of new contributors being outstanding. This present accomplish-

ment cannot continue without a total involvement of both actives and alumni.

If the future for the fraternity looks bright, how can an area alumni association help insure this progress? One area of great assistance would be in expansion. Should we be fortunate enough to establish a new group in an area covered by an alumni association, just the moral support and interest of alumni would be a step towards the success of this group. Yes, this is the responsibility of the national executive secretary but there are occasions when, because of distance, etc., a local helping hand giving advice could eliminate future problems. Potential expansion on the part of undergraduates to organize is much easier when an area association is already in existence. The college or university and local I.F.C. will also be more interested in accepting a new fraternity to their campus knowing that there is local, organized support.

This is fine, but what if I am in an area where expansion is not possible? One problem arising today is our competition has outstanding scholarship programs. Because of continued rising tuitions, such programs are playing an important part in rushing. We could aid our chapters by increasing our number of awards. This could be possible by asking each new association

to pledge \$1,000 to our national foundation. (In some areas this would mean no more than a \$5 contribution per member.) For each one time, \$1,000 area contribution we would be able to award a \$100 Sophomore Scholarship each year in the name of that association.

"This is great, but I am already involved and I just do not have the time." From past experience, depending on the wishes of an area association, only two meetings would be expected a year and both would be in a social form. It is suggested that one be with wives or friends to renew chapter friendships and meet members of other chapters. The other meeting should be held in the summer for the purpose of meeting area undergraduate members and their prospective rushees. This type of function has been held for years in Indiana and proven very successful P.E.

With this in mind, your time involved would be less than that of Rotary, Lions, and Kiwanis. I do not wish to be misleading. Naturally some members would be asked to give more of their time. This is to be expected and these officers can expect the complete cooperation of your national office.

Areas having sufficient alumni to support such an association are listed at the end of this article. If you are living in one of these areas and would like to discuss the possibilities, please contact the national office by writing to Kappa Delta Rho, Inc., 331 South Main Street, Greens-

burg, PA 15601, or by calling 412-838-7100.

Positive interest has already been established in New York City, Philadelphia, Southeastern Pennsylvania, Northeastern Ohio, Columbus or Central Ohio, San Francisco, Eugene, OR, Portland, OR, and Durham, NC. If you are from one of these

areas and would be interested in being part of the initial planning, please contact the National Office.

This program is not meant to be exclusive of those areas with small area population; should you live in an area not listed, please feel free to make your in-

terest known. We have opportunity knocking at our door. Let us take advantage of that knock. Our future, in part, is in your hands. Kappa Delta Rho will not only "survive the rigors of the next decades, but can thrive as well."

PROMINENT ALUMNI

Bill Stevenson, Camelback G.M.

In the 19 years since Camelback Ski Area opened in Tannersville, it has become the largest and most popular ski area in northeastern Pennsylvania.

William H. Stevenson, *Zeta '57*, has been employed at Camelback since its inception and, for the past 15 years, has held the position of vice president and general manager. Bill has been actively involved in every facet of the development of Camelback, including trail design, snowmaking, lift and lodge construction, ski school, special events programs and the summer operation (Alpine slide, water slide, grass skiing, etc.).

Camelback is noted for consistently good skiing conditions due to its massive snowmaking system. It provides 100 percent coverage on all slopes and trails.

In a high risk business, i.e., one that depends on weather as well as economic conditions, Camelback has enjoyed financial success as well as a reputation among the skiing public as the best place to ski south of New England. The area has grown steadily over the years, and now has 22 trails and 10 lifts. In the 1980-81 season, 285,000 skiers used Camelback's facilities. Over 350 people are employed on a sea-

sonal basis. In the summer, the Alpine Slide has become one of the more popular attractions for the thousands of tourists who frequent the Poconos. (The resort business is the second largest industry in the state of Pennsylvania.)

Bill is married to the former Linda Kelley, of Pittsburgh, and has three daughters and one son. Valerie, 24, graduated from the University of Florida with a master's degree in public administration. Marjorie, 22, graduated from Susquehanna University, magna cum laude, with a degree in biology. She hopes to become a veterinarian. Katie, 19, is a freshman at the University of Vermont, pursuing a B.S. in nursing. David, 18, is a senior at Pocono Mountain High School.

Bill and Linda own a small farm in the heart of the Poconos and devote their leisure time to their assortment of dogs, cats, and horses. (Their newest addition is Alfred, an Old English Mastiff puppy weighing 165 lbs. and still growing.)

In addition to some light commercial farming, Bill has done occasional contracting work and especially enjoys colonial era fireplace construction. He collects antique tractors, jeeps and firearms.

Scott Bailey, Zeta '69

has been appointed vice president in charge of corporate services for Southeast First National Bank of Miami.

In his new position, Bailey is responsible for managing the non-credit banking services Southeast provides to corporate customers and for planning and implementing Southeast's corporate services strategy throughout Florida.

Bailey is a graduate of the Stonier Graduate School of Banking. He holds a Master of Business Administration degree in finance and accounting from Drexel University and a Bachelor of Science degree in finance from Penn State.

He is a member of the National Corporate Cash Management Association and program chairman for Robert Morris Associates.

Timothy W. Christy, Rho '74

has been named manager-gas turbine services for the installation and service engineering international department of General Electric's Technical Services Co. Tim is located in London, England, and covers the areas of Europe and Libya.

Robert J. Dankanyin, Zeta '56

is an assistant division manager of Missile Development Division group of Hughes Aircraft Company.

Gerald W. Gran, Sigma '53

works in sales and product development for Towle Sigma Giftware Corporation in New York City. On Sept. 12, he went to Mainland China for 2-3 weeks, calling on silk flower factories as assistant buyer. This was his second trip there; the first being in '74, needless to say, somewhat premature for the needs of the American market.

Rev. Robert C. Hamlyn, Rho '50

Co-founder of the Foundation for Religion and Mental Health resigned his position as founding president and continues as chairman of the board.

Robert H. Jones, Sigma '52

has accepted a position as a civilian special agent with the Naval Investigative Service, Office of Naval Intelligence. Henry recently attended the NIS Agent's Academy and graduated 3rd in his class. He has been assigned to the Norfolk, Virginia, office, and



Annual Alumni Fund by Robert Corrie

The 1981-1982 Alumni Fund at half-way mark has reached 59 % of this year's goal. As of January 31, 1982, 612 alumni had contributed \$14,660 towards a final goal of \$25,000. With a goal of 1,100 contributors by the end of the drive, another 488 contributors are needed to insure the success of this year's campaign. As of this date, 559 alumni who contributed to the 1980-1981 Alumni Fund have not yet contributed. Since our expansion program depends on the success of the Alumni Fund for its continued momentum, all alumni who have not yet contributed are urged to do so today by using the coupon found on page 4.

At the present time, Lambda Chapter (California) leads in dollars contributed with \$1,665 and also in number of contributors with 70 alumni and friends. This is the first time in the history of the Fund that Lambda Chapter has led in both categories and it will be interesting to see if her Alumni can continue to maintain this lead. Following closely behind is Theta Chapter (Purdue) with \$1,610 from 56 contributors. Eta Chapter (Illinois) is in third place with contributions of

\$1,408 from 59 contributors. Last year's leader Kappa Chapter (Ohio State), at the present time is in fourth place with \$1,261 from 30 contributors. However, it would not surprise us if before the end of the drive, Kappa Chapter gives Lambda Chapter a spirited contest for first place. In fifth position is Zeta Chapter (Penn State) with 44 members contributing \$1,095.

Each year we strive to reach the goal of at least 10 percent of our living alumni listed as contributors. Last year we fell short by only reaching 9.2 %. However, 13 chapters individually did exceed this goal, led by Omicron with 24.4 % contributing. At this time Omicron is barely in the lead again.
