It was in August of 1987, and immediately following major surgery, that Brother Elmon M. Williams escorted by his delightful wife, Lucile, traveled to Washington, D.C. to attend his fraternity's Annual National Leadership School and Convention. The reason for this long and tedious journey was that it would offer the opportunity for Brother Williams to be present when his fraternity, Kappa Delta Rho, would recognize him as one of its outstanding alumni.

Brother Williams, Epsilon '27, began his career upon leaving Franklin College and receiving a L.L.B. degree in 1930 from the Indiana Law School. The Indiana Law School was later to become the Indiana University. Although Elmon did not receive his law degree until 1930, he was admitted to practice law in the State of Illinois in 1927. During the years from 1927 to 1930 he served three different judges of the Indiana Court of Appeals as a clerk and assistant. In 1930, he not only was admitted to practice in all Indiana Courts including the Federal Courts, but it was also during this year that he entered into a new partnership with

I find it unfortunate, that the current Colby administration has acted with what appears to me to be a sense of malicious vendetta in order to excuse every last vestige of the Colby fraternity and sorority system. The abolition of the system was particularly appalling in light of the fact that the student body had voted at the time the system was under review, to maintain a Greek system at the college. One of the key participants in the Baltic "revolution" and a "national hero" in Lithuania, Latvia, and Estonia is Brother William Hough III, Xi '78. Having spent time in the Peace Corps following his graduation from Colby College, he became a 1985 graduate of the New York Law School. While at Colby, he studied European history with special interest in the cultures, languages, and history of Eastern Europe. It should be mentioned that during his undergraduate days, he also spent one entire summer working on a dairy farm in Finland.

scholarly work done in law school with the decidedly un-Baltic name of William Jarrett Halowell Hough III) to be considered "more Baltic than the rest of us" by some native co-workers and observers.

As a student of law, he honed his interest by becoming a specialist in international corporate law and decided to write his paper reflecting this area in Eastern Europe. It was Serge Levitsky, professor of international law at the law school, who suggested that he consider a "human rights" topic centered around the annexation of the Baltic States by the Soviet Union in 1940. help. When his article, "The Annexation of the Baltic States and its Effects on the Development of Law Prohibiting Forcible Seizure of Territory" was published, it not only became the international law bible for the Baltic

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Dear KDR Brothers:

Hello...good ole United States!! It's great to be back safe and sound!! I'm sorry it has taken so long to get in touch with you after the war ended. And, I also must apologize for not sending a personal letter to all those people who were so caring and thoughtful, through their letters and care-packages. It would have taken the rest of this year to write everyone back. I hope I may speak for all the KDR's when I say we can't thank each of you enough for your thoughtfulness in writing while we were in Saudi Arabia. Receiving mail, of any kind, made our day and kept us going! THANKS so much for all of your support!!

As you may know, my Marine Corps Reserve unit was activated on December 2, 1990. We went to Camp Lejeuene, NC for a month to train and prepare for the war in the Gulf. On January 2, 1991, my unit boarded a plane enroute for Saudi Arabia. The first week in Saudi Arabia was spent unloading our equipment and gear, as well as acclimating our bodies to the weather change. My reserve unit was attached to an Artillery Battalion out of San Diego, CA. The unit was then sent approximately three hours away from the Kuwait border. Due to my job as a forward observer, I was detached from my reserve unit and attached to the infantry (grunts). This unit that I was now calling home was also from San Diego, CA. From January 7, 1991 until February 24, 1991, I spent my days training with the grunts for a ground assault on Kuwait. Our mission was to clear mine fields, trenches and fortified positions in order for rear parties" to continue moving across the border to set up closer positions. As it turned out, not only did we do this, but continued moving north sweeping the country. Before, during and even for awhile after the war we lived in holes in the ground, what we

called "hooches". We had to dig each we went, due to the cease fire, which hole for ourselves, plus other trenches overtime we moved to a new position. Needless to say I was digging most of the time. We survived on MRE's, meals-ready-to-eat, the famous food that television coverage was describing to all of you here in the state. Boy was it good !!! And you may be wondering how we kept clean, well, we didn't. Actually, we got to take some form of a shower about every two weeks. Because of the food, all the digging and constant moving around, I managed to loose quite a few pounds, which I needed to do.

On February 24, 1991 the ground war began. My unit moved into Kuwait clearing the trenches and mine fields. At first we did not encounter the enemy like they had expected. But as we continued, very rapidly, north we began to encounter the enemy. I was a part of about ten fire-fights, all of which we successfully defeated the enemy. My company took over 200 EPW's, enemy prisoner of war. The infantry battalion I was in took over 2,000 EPW's. My company was the first to reach the final objective at the time, which was Kuwait International Airport. This was also as far north as

ended the war. We stayed at the airport about a week after the cease fire then headed back to Saudi Arabia. There we waited another month and a half to come home.

When returning home, I received "Welcome Home" that I will never forget!! We had heard about all the yellow ribbons and all the American flags, but until we actually saw them ourselves, we did not understand the magnitude of patriotism this country was displaying. It made me feel so good that I was serving our country!! I know all of us appreciate all of your patriotism and support!!

Once again in behalf of all the KDR's I thank you all for your letters and care-packages that you sent to us while we were in the Persian Gulf. I can't explain just how important hearing from everyone was to me. Thanks so much ... It's great to be back!!!

Outlawing Greeks On Campus



Peter Henderson, Xi '60 Dean of Student Affairs - University of Maine Presque Isle, Maine

Brother Henderson received his bachelor degree from Colby College in 1960. It was while at Colby that he also was selected to become a member of Kappa Delta Rho and served his chapter of Xi as its consul during his senior year. Following graduation he entered the service and it was during this time he obtained his master's degree in Business Administration in 1966 from the Inter-American University in Puerto Rico and his doctorate in Higher Education from Auburn University in 1986. While at Auburn he was assigned to the R.O.T.C. detachment as an instructor and in addition served as the faculty advisor for the Chi Phi chapter.

Following his retirement as an Air Force Lt. Colonel he and his wife, Jane relocated back to his native state of Maine. Brother Henderson is presently the Dean of Student Affairs at the Presque Isle campus of the University of Maine and continues his interest and concern for bettering Greek affairs.

among the Greeks. The entire Greek system had become a source of acute embarrassment to the institution, and they simply could not stand it any longer. It is not hard to imagine the frustration of college officials at that time. They did what they felt they had to do.

Although I believe the decision was an incorrect one, the fault lies with the Greeks. They forced the institution into a corner and they were dealing with administrators who had no love for Greeks in the first place. Writing for the Fall 1990 issue of the NASPA Journal, a Colby administrator said that "fraternities are exclusionary by practice, sexist in nature, and gender specific by design." (1) Decrying the fall of fraternities from the high ideals with which they began their existence in American higher education in the early days of this country, the writer insisted that "it is difficult to find any consistent values fostered by today's fraternities and sororities that reinforce the original standards." The writer continued by noting that "alcohol abuse, sexism, racism, destruction of property and rape are...associated with the groups today." The writer found many examples of headlines in recent issues of The Chronicle of Higher Education to quote as illustrations of the point; such headlines as Fraternity Involved in Sex Assault," and "Drinking Themselves to Death." are quoted. Finally, the writer concluded by calling on colleges and universities "to take a stand against [these] organizations...and condemn the abhorrent behavior that plagues social fraternities and sororities today."

and has been under attack for several years. Among those who would not shed a tear if fraternities and sororities were to disappear tomorrow are higher education administrators. The most often expressed reason for this position is the perceived reluctance of Greeks to do anything concrete that would demonstrate acceptance and promotion of the ideals which are important to colleges and universities today: pluralism, equality of opportunity and acceptance, anti-discrimination, elimination of drug and alcohol abuse, disavowal of all vestiges of hazing, etc.

As a student affairs dean for a small public university in Maine I can verify that these issues are very important to college presidents, trustees, and state lawmakers. I can also verify that there is little evidence being presented to these officials that fraternities and sororities are even concerned about about these issues, let alone doing

The Greek system is under attack, anything about them. Indeed, on too many campuses the evidence points to s. Among those who would not the contrary.

A case in point is the well-publicized decision by Colby College to ban all Greek affiliation from the campus several years ago. Although I personally disagreed with the decision (and expressed that disagreement as an alumnus), such action was within the institutional prerogatives of the College. The decision is still being tested in the courts, but Colby's status as a private institution will determine the ultimate resolution.

An examination of the circumstances which led to that decision would be well worth the time of other campuses and Greek organizations interested in avoiding a similar event. In terms of the Greek environment, conditions at Colby were appalling in the years before the decision was made. "Animal House" was redefined. Institutional property was being destroyed. Alcoholism seemed out of control Greeks are catching some well-deserved heat for doing some very stupid things...

The author of that article is the Associate Dean of Students at Colby College and is a rising leader in the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators. She is taking her message to the people who wield the stick at other campuses: the student affairs officers...the ones who have to listen to the complaints of hazing, discrimination, etc. And they are listening because the pressure is on in higher education to stamp out the kinds of activities listed in that article.

The problem is not that Greeks are worse than any other category of college student, they simply present an easy target. They are well organized, they have high visibility, they operate as institutions within an institution, and they appear to have great control over their membership. Furthermore, they have developed a reputation for being beer-drinking societies which provide opportunity and structure for systematic over-consumption of alcohol within a protected environment. As long as these perceptions continue to operate, Greeks will remain under attack by college administrators.

Because of their visibility and reputation, Greeks play into the hands of the media whenever an unfortunate incident occurs. Whenever a Greeks gets into trouble, the headline reads John Doe, Greek member at State University" rather than "John Doe, student." Regardless of the incident, there is the implied assumption that somehow the student's Greek affiliation is at least partially responsible for the incident. Then when major parties get out of control, those assumptions are confirmed. Greeks are easy targets and have become their own worst enemies.

We need to see the situation as it is: fraternities and sororities are catching some well-deserved heat for doing some very stupid things on some campuses while their positive contributions to campus life are getting brushed aside. Furthermore, there is a great deal of pressure on student affairs officials at public universities to show programs promoting pluralism, justice, and civility on campuses. These are programs for which Greeks can and do make important contributions. But when the only news about Greeks is their continual flaunting of such ideals, the heat will simply increase.

Kappa Delta Rho does not condone the flaunting of campus requirements regarding discipline. Kappa Delta Rho supports the ideals that colleges and universities are trying to promote on campus. But will it make no difference that KDR takes these positions at the national level if the local chapters do not actively work to support them on campus. The resolution of the issue is not the abolition of Greek systems but rather a new partnership between local Greek systems and campus leadership. Speaking as a college administrator, I know that nothing would please an administrator more than a visit by a Greek delegation with the message that the Greeks had decided to promote the college and its ideals and would like some specific suggestions in that regard. At the same time, chapter leadership has got to bury the notion that the freedom to party is a right that must be protected at any cost. When university officials become convinced that fraternities and sororities are committed to a positive partnership for the de-velopment of mutually important ideals, then those officials will be-

come the Greek system's strongest supporters.

Therefore my message to the local KDR chapter is this: elect responsible chapter leaders, concentrate on the ideals of your chapter, use your organization for the purposes for which it was originally established, and open direct channels of communication with administration officials such as the President, the chief student affairs officer, the admissions counselors, and the campus tutorial services. Volunteer for (and show up for) campus activities which relate directly to the mission and goals of the university. An area of specific need on many campuses right now, for example, is the need for assistance for single parents in need of child care during daytime classes.

Fraternities and sororities are supposed to be in the business of nurturing leadership development and character growth through collegial organizations which are uniquely designed for those purposes. Instead they are seen by too many campus officials (and parents) as frivolous, expensive to join, exclusionary, and woefully misguided.

Concentrate on making your campus proud of its KDR chapter. That should become a primary goal. I can guarantee that if you concentrate on that goal, and enlist the active participation of fellow Greek organizations on campus, your campus will not make the tragic mistake that was made at Colby.



A History.....

Fraternity, we have from time to time recognized alumni for notable accomplish-ments. Until recently, however, recognition had not been awarded in any formal way. Word of outstanding achievements by Fraternity Alumni members was left to an occasional biography printed in the Quill & Scroll when information was available, or a personal appearance before but a few at a National Convention. The National Fraternity has corrected this lack of formal recognition by the founding of Ordo Honorium. The general idea, as intended by the National Board of Directors, is the establishment of a sort of "Hall

of Fame" for distinguished alumni. In 1980, shortly after becoming Ex-ecutive Director, Donald Stohl (Zeta '54), set about the inception of Ordo Honorium. Eager to formally recognize the rather impressive achievements of various alumni members, Brother Stohl also saw the opportunity for these outstanding accomplishments to serve as an inspiration to present and future members. Many of the alumni that have been honored by the fraternity have indicated that KDR has made an early and lasting impression on them which helped in their development. An important factor, however, was the notion of "Hall of Fame." While it carries with it the general idea of what the National Board wanted to accomplish, the

In our growing history as a National notion, hackneyed and over-used, has the less desirable connotation of, perhaps, an annual prize for top sales producers. Instead, the Board sought to develop a meaningful basis for the recognition of outstanding alumni.

The obvious path was to follow the tradition of the KDR Ritual and Ceremonies which are based on the model of the ancient Roman Republic. Upon the suggestion of a Benedictine Monk at the Archabbey of St. Vincent College in Western Pennsylvania, the Board finally decided on the distinction or Ordo Honorium. "Order of Honor", the honor awarded to Roman citizens for their contribution to

state and community. On August 14, 1982, the initial class of inductees to Ordo Honorium were greeted with the official citation: "Brother, we salute you. being persuaded of your honor, fidelity and concern for your fellowman, we have caused these letters to be issued ... " The initial class of inductees, designated Alpha Class, includes 81 mem bers and recognizes notable accomplishments made during the first 75 years of our Fraternity's history. Each subsequent year, a new class of select inductees, designated by consecutive letters of Greek alphabet, is chosen

Selection of membership in Ordo Honorium is rightfully placed in the hands of one's peers. Each year, the individual

chapter alumni organizations are asked to submit two nominations for induction into Ordo Honorium. After the nominations are submitted, each nominee is contacted for his acceptance and as these nominations are accepted, the name and biography of each nominee is submitted to the Ordo Selection Committee. This Committee, consisting of current Ordo Honorium members, provides the final selection which is announced at the Annual Convention. Their biographies are published in this issue of the Quill & Scroll. Not all those nominated each year are selected but may be renominated by their chapter in subse-quent years. The criteria for selection are based on accomplishment in career, com-

munity, and/or optimally, the Fraternity. Specifically, nominations for Ordo Honorium are made in one of three categories:

1. Personal or professional accom-plishments, (including community involvement)

2. National recognition, (sports, entertainment, politics, etc.)

3. Outstanding Fraternity involve-

ment, (Chapter or National) It is felt that KDRs worthy of the honor and distinction will rise to the top and the selection process will easily recognize their accomplishments. Kappa Delta Rho hopes that all her members will become worthy to join those members currently in Ordo Honorium.


Brother Moore Gets Distinguished Alum At Indiana University of Pennsylvania





Alpha Alpha Alumni Corporation Purchases New Chapter House.....

The Alpha Alpha Chapter at Lock Haven University has long practiced a good neighbor policy through its many community service and philanthropic projects in the city of Lock Haven. But since June, when the chapter's alumni corporation became homeowners, that policy has taken on an added dimension.

The Alpha Alpha Chapter Alumni Corporation of Kappa Delta Rho, Inc., purchased a large, three-story, brick building at 602 Bellefonte Avenue, just a few short blocks from campus, to house its undergraduates. The 15bedroom house has three kitchens,

three baths, several large social rooms, a detached garage and an off-street parking lot. It can accommodate 23 live-in brothers and it is at capacity in its first semester of use.

The house was purchased from Lock Haven alumnus Don Faulkner, who is a practicing attorney in Lock Haven, and his business partner. The alumni corporation owes Brother Faulkner a debt of gratitude. He demonstrated a great deal of faith in the alumni corporation and the undergraduate chapter by his willingness to be flexible in arranging some "creative financing" to allow the purchase to take place.

Also instrumental in making the purchase a reality was Don Stohl, the

National Fraternity Executive Director, who arranged initial legal consultation for the Alumni Corporation Board of Directors in setting up the purchase.

The undergraduates have been busy repairing and remodeling the building to suit its purposes as a chapter house, and their efforts have been complemented by a number by a number of alumni who have returned on weekends to assist in the manual labor. Their work was rewarded with high praise by duly impressed alumni who returned for Homecoming Weekend activities October 19.

When Alpha Alpha lost its charter due to disciplinary problems, and its previous chapter-owned house through financial difficulties eight years ago, the alumni corporation was formed to oversee the rechartering process. Once the charter was returned, housing became a priority. A few leads were investigated by a committee set up by the Alumni Board of Directors, but the houses were deemed unsuitable. Last spring, Faculty Advisor Ernest Jackson learned the house at 604 Bellefonte Avenue was available, and the corporate board immediately began negotiations with Brother Faulkner and his associate. The brothers enthusiastically assisted in much of the investigatory legwork, setting up appraisals and various inspections that were necessary to complete the deal.

Since moving into the new quarters, the brothers have been warmly accepted by their neighbors, and were even commended at a City Council meeting for their work in improving the condition of the house, which had deteriorated from abuse by the former tenants.


KDR Makes It To The Minors



independence movement, but nearly overnight acclaimed William Hough III as the expert in Baltic affairs.

As a direct result of the article, he was invited to speak before the Canadian Parliament during a session on the Baltics at which the only other speakers were the Canadian Secretary of the State for External Affairs and the former Prime Minister, Joe Clark. Bill also gave prepared testimony before the Congressional Helsinki Watch Commission and spoke at a recent special State Department seminar on Baltic affairs. As changes began to sweep through Eastern Europe, he became a close and trusted advisor to presidents and prime ministers including Lithuania's President, Vytautus Landsbergis. It was also during this time that he made many trips to the Baltics while on leave from his international corporate work at the Manhattan firm of Walter, Conston, Alexander and Green.

As a result of these many trips, his work became more wildly known (and more effective) which in turn was the cause of his being deported twice by the Soviet Union. To further emphasize his effectiveness in the freedom movement; while traveling between Warsaw and Lithuania, he was ordered from a train, questioned for more than two hours by border police, and returned to Poland on the next westbound train. On another trip he was denied permission by Soviet border guards to disembark from a ship carrying him to Estonia.

Both incidents occurred despite invitations from the Estonian and Latvian governments and valid visas obtained from the Soviet consulates in New York and Warsaw. It was this action, along with many others, as Bill describes, that demonstrates how the KGB operated as a "State within a State." Regardless of what the Soviet government said - if the KGB did not want you in, you did not get in! It also illustrated the diplomatic and economic blockade that was thrown around the Baltic States once these people announced their declarations of independence. It was also these actions that earned Brother Hough a place on the KGB's "watch list."

Prior to his "watch list" placement, which restricted future travel, he had been advising the newly vigorous Baltic governments on the establishment of their legal systems; especially in the areas of corporate and commercial law, land reform, environmental law, and historic preservation law. In addition, he had also advised the government and nongovernment organizations on the right of Baltic citizens to refuse conscription into the Soviet armed forces.

Brother Hough was always optimistic about the eventual success of the Baltic independence movements. He also felt that because of the democratic tradition established by the Baltic States between 1920 and 1940, it would eventually serve as an important example to other Soviet Republics seeking information.

In March of 1991, Bill was honored in Los Angeles by the Baltic America Freedom League, during their annual "Human Rights Dinner," with a special award. This honor was awarded to Bill in appreciation for his involvement in the freedom of the Baltic States. On August 10, 1991, he was honored with a similar award by the Knights of Lithuania. This organization is the oldest fraternal organization outside of Lithuania dedicated to the freedom of their native country.

Although Brother Hough's publications have come true and the Baltic States are free of Soviet intervention, he still keeps communication with his friends and government leaders as is confirmed by the letter by President Landsbergis.

When an institution of higher education which is presently being viewed by some as depriving its students of certain constitutional freedoms, one has to wonder how it could produce an alumnus who gained international recognition for fighting to obtain for others these same freedoms. After reading his letter (front page) one has to assume that his fraternity affiliation has played that important role in recognizing not only human rights, but "Honor before all things." It is with this that Kappa Delta Rho looks to Brother William Jarrett Halowell Hough III with pride when it states "This is my son."
